Radio-Thon For Special Olympics


The Annual Radio-Thon for Special Olympics will be Wed., Apr. 7th, on Radio Station WTRB, 1570 AM.

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

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TCAP Testing In Lauderdale County

Each spring, Tennessee students in grades 3-8 take an Achievement Test as part of the Tennessee Comprehensive Assessment Program (TCAP). The Achievement Test has fresh, non-redundant test items and is customized yearly to measure the academic basic skills in reading, language arts, math ematics, science and social studies. Content knowledge, as well as the application of that knowledge in these subject areas, is assessed. The TCAP Achievement

The TCAP Achievement Test provides both normcriterionreferenced and referenced performance information. Norm-referenced information permits the achievement of students to be compared with the performance of students nationwide with similar circumgrade level.

with a criterion-referenced component on the Achievement Tests. This new component was implemented in order to comply with federal mandates of "No Child Left Behind." On criterion-referenced reports, a student's performance is measured according to standards, as defined by the State of Tennes- ers. see. The criterion-referenced assesses how component well a student has mastered grade level objectives and

skills.



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Jobs Tax Credit Bill Passes

Rep. Craig Fitzhugh, who represents Lauderdale, Crockett, and Dyer counties, brought forth the "Jobs Tax Credit" bill Monday, April 12th. This legislation passed the House by a unanimous vote.

HB 3480 broadens the scope of the Job Tax Credit to include higher skilled, better paying jobs, as defined by the Job Skills Act, and redefines distressed counties in order to recognize and better serve their needs. In economically distressed counties, the legislation would offer businesses, such as cellular phone manufactures, not traditionally categorized as part of the manufacturing industry, to receive increased incentives to create new jobs.

"One of the top concerns of West Tennesseans today is the lagging economy and shrinking job market," Rep. Fitzhugh said. "This legislation seeks to address that issue. By offering job credits to companies who create new jobs in Tennessee, we are encouraging a growth in the local job market."

The bill, as amended, requires that a county not currently classified as economically distressed, as defined by the Department of Economic and Community Development, must have experienced in any one month of the last twentyfour above average unemployment and below average per capita income based on Tennessee's overall averages. The bill expands the definition of qualified business enterprise to include businesses and industry that are high-skill and highwage yet outside of the current definition, which primarily encompasses manufacturing, warehousing or headquarters facilities.

The bill would include those businesses that may not create the large number of jobs that manufacturing, warehousing or headquarters facilities offer, but do create higher-skilled, better paying jobs and increase the overall level of employment. Additionally, the bill raises the current jobs tax credit available to businesses in economically distressed areas as an incentive for those businesses to create and/or expand jobs that will assist those areas.
