Two County Deaths Under Investigation

According to Tennessee Bureau of Investigation information officer, Jennifer Johnson, Trina Lynn Windham, 26, of Gates, was reported dead at 6 a.m. Monday after her body was discovered at a home on Nance Street in Gates. The case is being investigated as a homicide. No charges are pending and no one is being held in connection with the case. The matter is still under investigation.

Services for Windham are pending, Thompson's Mortuary, Ripley, in charge.

She leaves two sons, Robert Williams, of Union City, and Derrick Owens, of Gates; two daughters, Kyonna and Laquinda Windham, of Gates; her parents, Coleen Barnett, of Gates, and John E. Barnett, Jr.; three brothers, Michael Brown, William Barnett, and Jermone Barnett, of Union City; two sisters, Freda Brown, of Nashville, and Tonya Brown, of Halls; and her grandmothers, Nannie Roach, of Martin, and Mary Barnett, of Lake Center, Ky.

According to Lauderdale County Sheriff Louis Craig, officers at the sheriff's department received a call at approximately 11 a.m. Tuesday reporting Earnest J. Maxwell, 56, of Ripley, was killed from an apparent self-inflicted gunshot wound on Great River Road, near Halls. The case is still under investigation.

Services for Maxwell are incomplete.

County's Justice System Hit By 2 More Law-Suits

Robert L. Hutton, an attorney with the Memphis law firm of Glankler Brown, PLLC, already suing Lauderdale County, County Sheriff Louis Craig, and two sheriff's deputies for \$100,000,000 plus punitive damages in the alleged beating of Christopher Lee Scallions, has filed two additional suits in US. District Court in Memphis—

- A motion to hold Lauderdale County and its officers in contempt of Judge Jon McCalla's order April 28, 1998, which specified that "defendants may only use 'Freeze,' Mace, or other chemical agents when absolutely necessary to prevent harm by an inmate to another person or to prevent substantial property damage."

The suit says Lemon Russell, mentally ill and jailed since Dec. 4th, for failure to pay \$1,209.92 in fines and court costs, has sometimes been deprived of his prescriptions for psychiatric medication, including Anotripline and Zolofit, has had his cell filled at least six times with tear gas or some similar chemical agent; has been denied water; and has been hog-tied and left in a solitary cell for hours.

The suit says Ernie McCage, jailed June 21st, for disorderly conduct and resisting arrest, is also mentally ill, and that he was hog-

tied, then sprayed with a chemical agent, and left in a single cell for hours.

The suit asks the County be fined \$50,000 for each violation of the Court's order, plus a civil contempt fine, amount not specified.

- Another suit against the County, and in their official capacities, General Sessions Judge Janice Craig, General Sessions Court Clerk Richard Jennings, and Sheriff Louis Craig alleges that it is their "regular policy and practice...to threaten and impose incarceration [jail] upon citizens who are assessed court costs in dismissed criminal cases.

The suit says court costs are "civil debt", not collectible by threat or fact of jail.

The suit asks \$50,000 in damages for Lester Curtis Smith, of Ripley, who paid \$270 when threatened with 10 days in jail, and William M. Robinson, of Henning, for whom an arrest warrant is

Record Numbers For Early Voting

outstanding for non-payment of \$220, neither of whom had any legal representation in General Sessions Court.

It asks that Judge Craig, Sheriff Craig, and Clerk Jennings be prohibited to participate in any criminal arrest or jailing of a person solely because of failure to pay court costs.

And it opens a wide door beyond the \$50,000 each for Smith and Robinson.

It asks the judge to certify as plaintiffs against the County "all persons who presently, or in the future, are liable for court costs arising from dismissed criminal cases from Lauderdale County General Sessions Court."

FUNDS FOR TEACHERS

The Tennessee Department of Education has been awarded \$98,900 in federal funds to help teachers gain certification through the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards.

The funds, distributed by the U.S. Department of Education, will provide subsidy awards of \$1,150 to 86 Tennessee teachers to offset half of their National Board Certification fee.

Teachers are eligible for a subsidy if they have at least three years of full-time teaching experience, currently teach in a Tennessee Public school, and hold a Tennessee professional teacher license. Priority is given to teachers from schools listed as high priority under No Child Left Behind (NCLB) standards.

We are extremely pleased to be able to offer financial assistance to these educators who have chosen to go through such a rigorous, demanding professional program in order to better serve their students," said Education Commissioner Lana C. Seivers.

Currently, 91 Tennessee teachers have achieved National Board Certification. The number is expected to increase in December when the National Board for Professional Teaching Standards announces the names of the 2003 candidates who achieved certification.

Teachers who achieve National Board Certification in their teaching areas are considered highly qualified teachers under NCLB standards. Like professionals in other fields, teachers can achieve distinction by demonstrating that they meet high and rigorous standards. National Board Certification is a two-part assessment process, requiring a portfolio of materials that demonstrates how candidates meet National Board standards

and an assessment center experience where teachers respond to questions about classroom situations and subject matter. The process continues for several

months of the school year. Applications for subsidy awards are now being accepted for the 2004-05 school year. For more information, contact Dr. Carol Groppe at 615-253-5206. A

To The Residents of Lauderdale County

June 24, 2004, a person was arrested by two of the Lauderdale County Sheriff's Deputies. Since his arrest, a lawsuit has been filed against the two Deputies and me, as the Sheriff of Lauderdale County. There have been several articles in our local newspapers about the incident and the allegations made in the suit.

Many people have ask questions about the incident and actions taken after the arrest. I was advised by our Attorney not to discuss the incident because of the pending litigation. However, I believe the people of Lauderdale County have the right to know the answers to some of their questions. The most asked question was "why were the two Deputies involved in the incident not suspended?". The County Attorney, who has adequately represented Lauderdale County for many years, advised not to suspend the Deputies. Since Dyer County Deputies were also involved, I called the District Attorney General and requested an investigation by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation. The T. B. I. Agents are investigating the incident. As soon as their report is received, appropriate action will be taken, if needed

The lawsuit also alleges that I have personally beaten an individual while Sheriff. I emphatically deny those allegations. I do not approve or condone the use of excessive force being used by the Lauderdale County Sheriff's employees or any other Law Enforcement Officer. All full-time Lauderdale County Sheriff's Deputies have completed ten (10) weeks of training at the Tennessee State Law Enforcement Academy. They are taught the fundamentals of law enforcement and also taught the consequences of using excessive force.

Since being elected Sheriff in 1998, I have tried hard to improve the integrity of the Lauderdale County Sheriff's Department. I work 10 to 12 hours each day, seven days each week, to provide the best protection and law enforcement principles to the people of Lauderdale County. I will continue to serve all the people of Lauderdale County the very best I can.

I appreciate the many calls and words of understanding and encouragement. Please remember there are two sides to every story and the allegations made in the lawsuit are something alleged without proof.

Gene Leggett defeated Greg Medford and David Richmond, 224 votes to 114 for Medford and 166 for Richmond for Dist. 2 Constable.

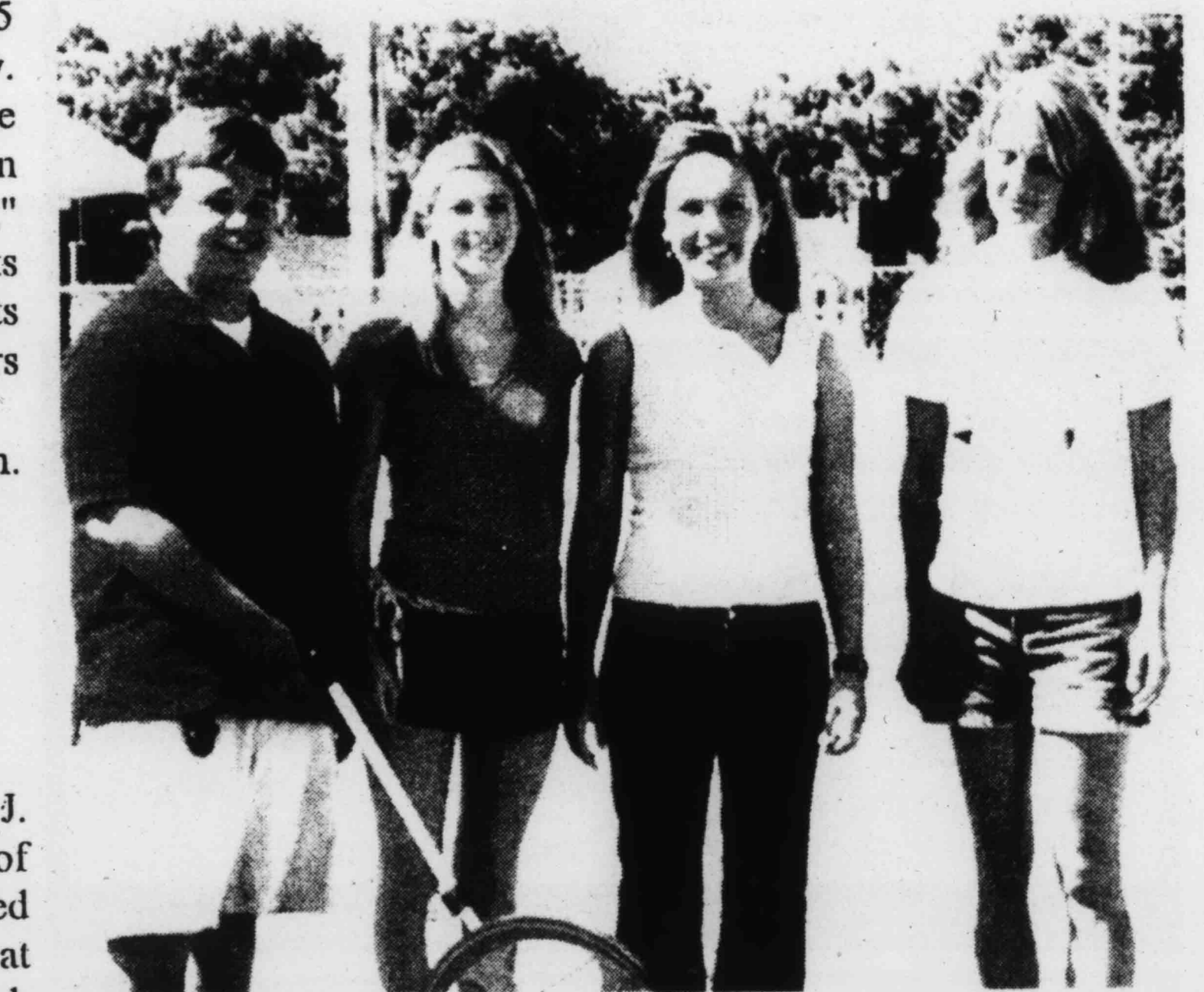
Delene Spray ran unopposed, 364 votes, for Dist. 3 Constable.

If you have not completed all steps listed below, you should do so before attempting to register for classes!

Complete a DSCC Application for Admission and return it to the Office of Admissions & Records, DSCC, 1510 Lake Road, Dyersburg, TN 38024. With your Application for Admission, send a \$10.00 check or money order for payment of a non-refundable application fee.

Have an official copy of your high school transcript or official copy of your GED scores or official copy of an American Council on Education (ACE) External Diploma mailed to the Office of Admissions & Records.

If you have had college courses, have an official copy of all college transcripts and an official copy of your high school transcript or official copy of your GED scores mailed to the Office of Admissions & Records.

If you are under 21, have your ACT scores sent to the Office of Admissions & Records or contact the Testing Office at (731) 286-3355 to set up a time to take a residual ACT. For information about testing dates, see “ACT” in the General Information section.

Unless exempted under Tennessee Code Annotated, proof of immunization with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. Students who are required to provide proof of immunization will be contacted by the Office of Admissions & Records.

The General Assembly of the State of Tennessee mandates that each public or private postsecondary institution in the state provide information concerning Hepatitis B infection to all students matriculating for the first time. Tennessee law requires that such students complete and sign a waiver form provided by the institution that includes detailed information about the disease. The required information includes the risk factors and dangers of the disease as well as information on the availability and effectiveness of the vaccine for persons who are at-risk for the disease. Before you can register, you will be directed as to how you can comply with this law.

STUDENTS INTENDING TO REGISTER IN DYERSBURG

Tennessee state employees wishing to use the Public Higher Education Fee Waiver for employees of the State of Tennessee and TBR/UT employees wishing to use the PC191 can register no earlier than four weeks prior to the first day of classes.

GENERAL INFORMATION for all Students

ACT

The ACT is required if you are a first-time college student under 21 years of age and plan to work toward a degree. There is no minimum score for the ACT; however, official scores must be submitted to the Office of Admissions & Records if you are under 21. ACT scores will be used to determine if you will be required to complete developmental studies classes prior to taking college-level classes.

Any student scoring below 19 on the English subtest will be required to register for Basic or Developmental Writing, depending on the exact score. Students scoring below 19 on the Mathematics subtest will register for Basic Mathematics, Basic Algebra, or Intermediate Algebra according to the score received. Students scoring below 19 on the Reading subtest will register for either Basic or Developmental Reading. Students who are required to register for any two disciplines (English, Mathematics, or Reading) will also be required to complete a Learning Strategies course.

If you are under 21 and degree-seeking but have not taken the ACT, you can take a Residual ACT.

Residual ACT Testing

- Cost is \$23.00.
- Appointments necessary.
- Residual ACT scores cannot be transferred to other institutions.
- Residual ACT scores cannot be used for consideration of eligibility for any Tennessee Educational Lottery Scholarships.

Adding Classes

If you need to add a class, the addition will be possible provided it is within the class-add period and space is available in the desired class. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for the deadline to add. Adding DSCC Fall classes is available on the Web through September 5; adding RODP Fall classes is available through August 25. After this date, you must complete a Change of Registration form and follow the procedures listed on the form. Forms may be obtained in the Office of Admissions & Records or from your academic advisor or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. A student is not officially added to a course until this form is processed in the Office of Admissions & Records. If assistance is needed in adding, check with the Office of Admissions & Records or with the Gibson County Center or the Tipton County Center for more information.

Advanced Studies Program

High school students who qualify for Dyersburg State's Advanced Studies Program should apply for admission, and, with their guidance counselor's assistance, complete all admissions requirements prior to registering. Students who are eligible for this program may be admitted for either joint or dual enrollment. Dual enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in one or more specified college courses for which the student will be awarded both high school and college credit; joint enrollment is for college credit only. For more information, contact the Office of Admissions & Records at (731) 286-3330 or your guidance counselor.

Auditing a Class

If you wish to audit a class, you may not register for the class until after the official registration day at the campus on which the desired course is being offered. For Dyersburg classes, you may not register to audit before August 26. Individuals under the age of 17 may not audit any class without the written permission of the

instructor and the Division Dean. Developmental Studies courses cannot be taken for audit. Only those 60 years of age or older may audit Physical Education activity courses.

Class Attendance & Outside Study

Successful completion of college-level courses requires a specified amount of study outside the classroom as well as within the classroom. Successful completion of a degree program is dependent upon your commitment to study beyond the classroom.

Notice: When you register for a class and do not attend, you will receive a grade of "F" unless you properly drop. Refer to the DSCC Bulletin or contact the Office of Admissions & Records for more information.

Class Cancellations and Changes

Dyersburg State Community College reserves the right to cancel classes that do not have sufficient enrollment. Divisions offering more than one section of the same course may close sections as necessary to promote the most effective instruction. Instructor assignments are also subject to change.

While this schedule of classes has been prepared on the basis of the most current information at the time of printing, the schedule is subject to change without notice, obligation, or liability.

COL 101 – The College Experience: Teamwork

Effective 2004 Fall, COL 101 is required for all degree-seeking freshmen who begin their college experience at Dyersburg State Community College and all degree-seeking transfer students who have not earned any college-level hours. This course promotes and develops success in college and the workplace through an orientation to the educational process and teamwork and leadership practices. Readings and class assignments are designed to maximize benefits gained from the college experience and demonstrate the connection between success in college and the workplace.

Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) Test

The Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) test measures competency in English, reading, and mathematics. Degree-seeking students who are 21 or over may be required to take the COMPASS test. There is no charge for taking the test, but the Office of Admissions and Records needs your Application for Admission prior to testing. For testing dates and times and to sign-up to test, call one of the following:

If you are required to take the COMPASS test or any portion of it and are placed in Developmental Studies courses, you must enroll in and complete the designated courses in sequence.

Confidentiality of Student Records

DSCC regards a student's academic record as confidential. The release of information contained in the record is governed by Federal Law, known as the *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)*. Directory information such as the student's name, address, telephone listing, e-mail address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student will be released unless the student has asked DSCC to withhold such information. If you do not wish directory information released, please provide written notification to the Office of Admissions & Records. The law does provide for the release of information to authorized college personnel, other institutions engaged in research (provided information is not revealed to any other parties), and certain federal and state government officials. If you have questions concerning the provisions of this act, contact the Director of Admissions & Records.

Cost of Attendance at DSCC

During the 2004-2005 academic year all students, whether residents or non-residents of Tennessee, will pay a maintenance fee of \$83 per semester hour not to exceed \$976 per semester. There is also a \$10 Facilities Assessment Fee for all students and a \$3 student activity fee for students enrolling in seven or more hours. A Technology Access Fee is assessed based on the number of credit hours in which the student enrolls. The fee varies from \$72 for three credit hours to \$90 for four credit hours to \$112.50 for five or more credit hours. For DSCC online courses, there is an additional fee of \$20.75 per credit hour; for RODP courses, there is an additional fee of \$34 per credit hour. For students who register after the first day of class, there is a \$10 Late Fee. Tuition is charged to students who are not residents of Tennessee except for residents of Pemiscot and Dunklin Counties in Missouri and Mississippi County in Arkansas. In addition to the maintenance fees listed previously, students who are classified as out-of-state for fee-paying purposes must pay \$253 per semester hour, not to exceed \$2923 per semester. As with other fees, the amount of tuition is subject to change.

NEW DEFERRED PAYMENT PLAN

Students enrolled for at least 6 credit hours may request deferment of up to 50% of their fee balance (after any financial aid or fee waivers are deducted). The minimum down payment of 50% of the fee balance is due by August 20, 2004. The amount deferred will be payable in two monthly installments due September 30 and October 29, 2004. There is a \$10 service fee also due on August 20. An additional late payment charge of \$25 will be assessed for each installment not paid on or before the due date.

Students who register after August 20, 2004 and wish to use the new deferred

payment plan must pay the \$10 service fee and 50% of the fees at the time of their registration.

Dropping Courses

If you need to drop a class, doing so will be possible provided it is within the class-drop period. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for deadlines to drop. Dropping DSCC Fall classes and RODP fall classes is available on the Web through September 12. After this date, you must complete a Change of Registration form and follow the procedures listed on the form. Forms may be obtained in the Office of Admissions & Records or from your academic advisor or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. A student is not officially dropped from a course until this form is processed in the Office of Admissions & Records. Failure to comply will result in a grade of "F". If assistance is needed in dropping, check with the Office of Admissions & Records or with the Gibson County Center or the Tipton County Center for more information.

After the first day of classes, Developmental Studies courses cannot be dropped on the Web. Under extenuating circumstances, however, a course may be dropped with the approval of the advisor and the Director of Developmental Studies.

Courses may be dropped without a grade through approximately the first two weeks (14 calendar days beginning with the first day of class). After this time, a grade of "W" is given if the course is officially dropped.

Dropping Courses Vs. Complete Withdrawal from the College

If you are enrolled in only one course and do not want to remain in that course or if you wish to withdraw from all courses, you can withdraw on the Web through September 12. After that date, a Permission to Withdraw form must be obtained and appropriate signatures obtained. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records and the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. Failure to withdraw officially from school will result in a grade of "F" in all courses. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for the deadline to drop.

Email Address for Student Mail, WebCT, and Pcounter

As a DSCC student, you will have an email address which will enable you to receive email about activities at DSCC. This address is printed on the receipt that you will get from the Business Office when you pay your fees. To login to your DSCC email account, look for your email address on your receipt and go to www.DSCC.edu. Then click Student Email. You will be prompted for your User ID and Password. Your User ID is what's printed to the left of the @ sign, and your Password is the same as what you use to access Web for Students (usually your date of birth). If you need to access your course in WebCT, your User ID and Password will be the same as your email login information. Also, you will need this login information for printing in any DSCC computer lab.

If necessary, call 911 or the Dyersburg Regional Ambulance Service at (731)285-2222 in Dyersburg, Baptist Memorial Hospital - Tipton Ambulance Service at (901)476-9377 in Covington, or the Gibson County Ambulance Authority at (731)692-3714 in Trenton. (It should be understood that the cost for transporting a student by ambulance to the hospital will be incurred by the injured or ill student).

2. Tornado and Fire Alert

A. Tornado Alert
 Dyersburg Campus - In case of tornado alert, the alarm system will give a series of 10 short rings. Students should calmly file to interior hallways, away from windows and doors. One long ring sounds the all clear.

Gibson County and Tipton County Centers - When the National Weather Service issues a Tornado Warning, an air horn will be sounded in a series of short blasts. Ten short blasts require everyone to take immediate action and proceed to the identified areas in the building. Two long blasts will indicate the Tornado Warning has expired.

B. Fire Alert

In case of fire at the Dyersburg campus and at the centers in Gibson County and Tipton County, there will be a continuous horn sound. In the Gibson County and Tipton County Centers, warning lights located in the halls will also

flash. Students should use stairways to evacuate the building. Do not use the elevators.

C. For other emergencies, consult the Dyersburg State Community College Safety and Security Procedures; a copy is posted in each classroom and office.

Eligibility for Deferment of Payment of Tuition and Fees by Certain Eligible Students Receiving US Department of Veterans Affairs or Other Governmentally Funded Educational Assistance Benefits

Service members, veterans, and dependents of veterans who are eligible beneficiaries of US Department of Veterans Affairs education benefits or other governmentally funded educational assistance, subject to the conditions and guidelines set forth in Tennessee Code Annotated 49-7-104 as amended, may elect, upon formal application, to defer payment of required tuition and fees until the final day of the term for which the deferment has been requested. Application for the deferment must be made no later than 14 days after the beginning of the term, and the amount of the deferment shall not exceed the total monetary benefits to be received for the term. Students who have been granted deferments are expected to make timely payments on their outstanding tuition and fees balance once education benefits are being delivered, and eligibility for such deferment shall terminate if the student fails to abide by any applicable rule or regulation, or to act in good faith in making timely payments. This notice is published pursuant to Public Chapter 279, Acts of 2003, effective July 1, 2003.

General Education Core Curriculum

Effective Fall 2004, each institution in the State University and Community College System of Tennessee (The Tennessee Board of Regents) will share a common lower-division general education core curriculum of forty-one semester hours for baccalaureate degrees and the Associate of Arts and the Associate of Science degrees. These institutions will also share a common lower-division general education core curriculum of 15-17 semester hours for the Associate of Applied Science degree. Consult the 2004-2005 DSCC Bulletin for more information.

Grades at Term's End

Your grades will not be mailed at the end of the term but are accessible on the Web. To access your grades, you will need your Social Security Number and your Personal Identification Number (PIN). If you need to provide a copy of your grades to your employer, request an official copy of your transcript to be mailed directly to the employer. This written request can be made at any time during the term.

To protect the confidential nature of the student's records, no grades will be released by phone. Grades will not be available until all debts or obligations owed to the College have been satisfied.

Graduation Candidates

If you are expecting to complete course requirements at the end of 2004 Fall, 2005 Spring, or 2005 Summer, you should submit an Intent to Graduate form to the Office of Admissions & Records by October 29. Cap and gown information also should be submitted to the DSCC Bookstore on the Dyersburg Campus by this date. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers.

Honors Program

The Honors Program provides exceptional educational opportunities for highly motivated and well-prepared students. The program works individually with students in planning their educational experiences at Dyersburg State Community College. Students may earn Honors distinction by meeting these requirements: completion of a minimum of 12 hours of Honors course work; participation in the Honors Seminar; and participation in at least 2-3 special college educational/cultural events a year. To become a member of the Honors program, an incoming

freshman must have a minimum ACT composite of 26 and a 3.5 high school grade point average (GPA). An existing student must have a minimum GPA of 3.5. To remain in the program, a student must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.5. An appropriate Honors distinction is indicated on the student's transcript and the Honors student is recognized at graduation. For more information about the Honors Program, contact Mr. Bob Lhota at (731) 286-3226.

Possession of Weapons

T.C.A. 39-17-1309 prohibits the possession of weapons, including firearms, on any property owned, used or operated by Dyersburg State Community College. Furthermore, State Law prescribes a maximum penalty of six (6) years imprisonment and a fine not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3000) for carrying weapons on school property.

Proof of Immunization

Unless exempted under Tennessee Code Annotated, proof of immunization with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. If you are required to provide proof of immunization, you will be contacted by the Office of Admissions & Records.

The General Assembly of the State of Tennessee mandates that each public or private postsecondary institution in the state provide information concerning Hepatitis B infection to all students matriculating for the first time. Tennessee law requires that such students complete and sign a waiver form provided by the institution that includes detailed information about the disease. The required information includes the risk factors and dangers of the disease as well as information on the availability and effectiveness of the vaccine for persons who are at-risk for the disease. Before you can register, you will be directed as to how you can comply with this law.

Refund Policy

Refund procedures for maintenance fees and out-of-state tuition fees are outlined below. (All other fees are non-refundable).

Change of student's status which requires refund:

- A.. Change in a full-time student's schedule which results in reclassification to part-time student status,
- B. Change in a part-time student's schedule which results in a class load of fewer hours during a refund period.

Other situations which require a refund:

- A.. Withdrawing from the institution within the refund period,
- B. Cancellation of a class by the institution,
- C. Death of the student.

Refund Procedures

Refunds will be calculated for up to 60% of the term for first-time students at DSCC who withdraw from school and are receiving Title IV aid. Refunds for all other students will be calculated as follows:

- A. Refunds are allowed for the first 25% of the term. Beginning with the first official day of classes and extending through the first 14 calendar days of classes, there is a 75% refund. For the remaining days of this refund period, there is a 25% refund. No refunds will be made beyond the 25% period.
- B. 100% of the fees will be refunded for classes canceled by the institution.
- C. 100% of the fees will be refunded for "drops" or "withdrawals" prior to the beginning of the first official day of classes. No refund will be processed during the official registration period.
- D. 100% refund in case of student's death.

Refund policy for students receiving Title IV aid is subject to change by the Federal Government.

Registering after the First Official Day of Classes

If you register for a class after the first official day of classes, be aware that enrollment in classes is not guaranteed but may depend on the number of classes

missed and the instructor's assessment of your chances for success in the course. If you register late, you will need to meet with the instructor to discuss any work that has been missed and to complete and sign the form for *Late Class Entry: Student & Teacher Agreement to Make Up Missed Work*.

Student Load

You will be considered full-time if you enroll in 12 or more credit hours; the maximum number of hours for which you may enroll is 19. You may request to enroll in more than 19 hours. Request for Overload forms are available from academic advisors or from the Office of Admissions & Records. You must obtain your advisor's signature on the form and meet specific requirements as outlined in the DSCC catalog before an overload can be processed.

SUMMARY OF PROGRAMS AVAILABLE AT DYERSBURG STATE

Dyersburg State has three major instructional divisions: Arts and Sciences, Nursing and Allied Health, and Business and Technology. A variety of majors with interesting concentrations is offered for your selection. If you plan to transfer to a four-year college or university and pursue a baccalaureate degree, there is the University Parallel major. There are a number of con-

centrations which lead to an Associate of Arts or Associate of Science degree.

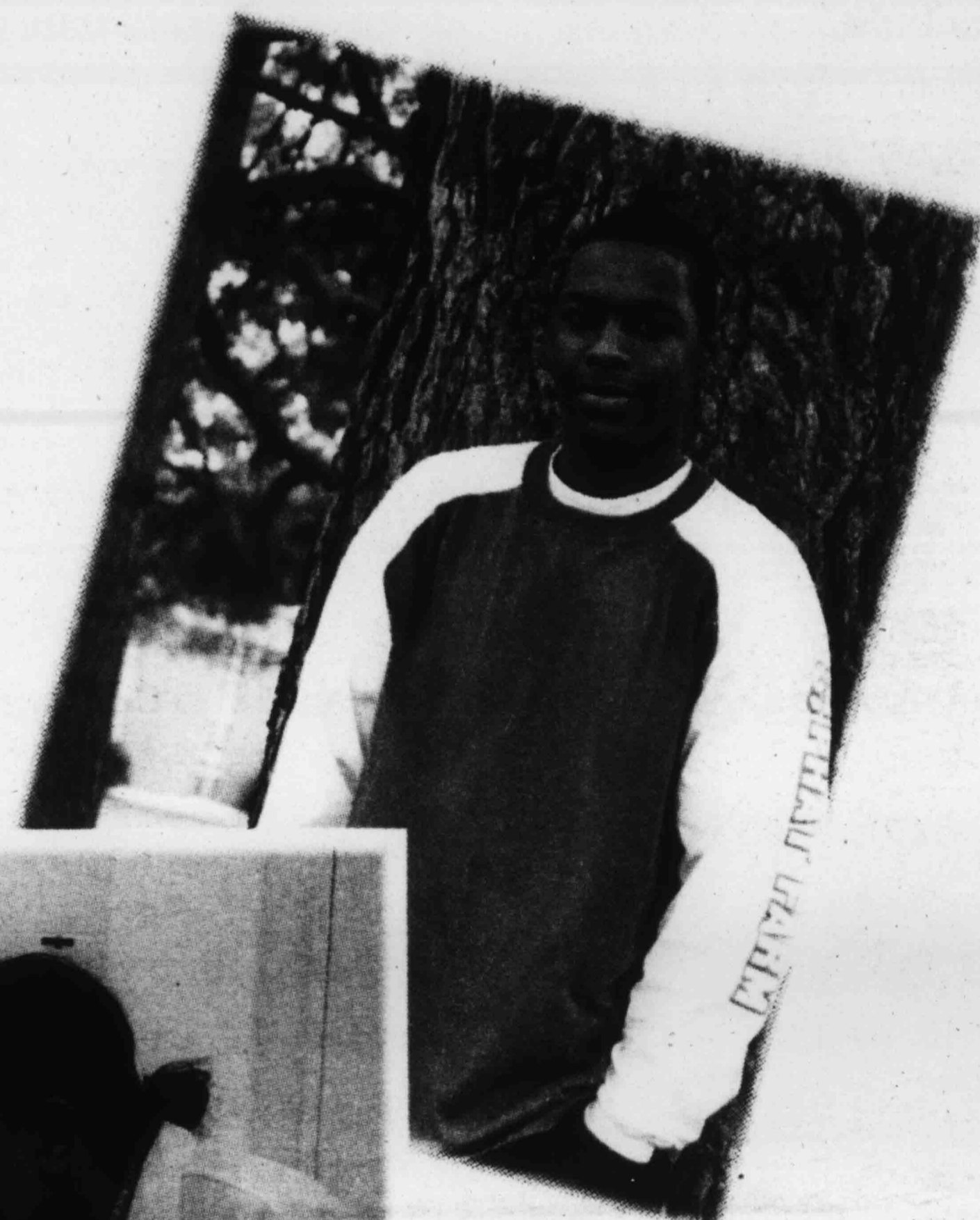

Four Schools Remain On No Child Left Behind List

Four Lauderdale County Schools, Ripley and Halls High Schools, Ripley Primary School, and Ripley Elementary School, remain on the No Child Left Behind Targeted List after the State of Tennessee released its testing results Thursday of last week. The county's high schools have shown progress in the measured areas, only failing due to graduation requirements. This year, the state's standards were to have 90% of all students, registered in the 9th grade, to finish with a diploma, the GED and Special Education diplomas do not count. Last year's standard was only 60% of students. Lauderdale County School Superintendent Phillip Jackson stated that all the larger high schools had trouble with the high standard and were placed on the list. By the year 2014, the state expects 100% of all students to finish with a diploma.

Halls Elementary School met average yearly progress again for the second year. Lauderdale Middle School and Halls Junior High School were removed from the targeted list this year because of improvements in each of the measured areas. Ripley Elementary has been placed on the high priority list, which is being appealed. Ripley Primary School is considered along with RES due to the grades tested. Students in 3rd through 12th grades are tested with the results divided in several categories, including five race and ethnic groups, economic, limited English, students with disabilities, and the school as a whole.

The goal of No Child Left Behind is to ensure that all students in all schools are academically proficient in math, reading, and language arts by 2014. Schools and the districts are measured on their ability to move toward the goal. If the school measured a 10% or more increase, but still did not meet the AYP benchmark, they were given a safe harbor provision. The county received such a provision as a whole for the special education benchmark. Ripley Elementary received the provision for math and the school as a whole. They were only placed on the high priority list due to special education math scores. The county appealed the scores for RES.

Jackson stated the laptop computers, expected for students, should encourage parents to take a more active part in education and to make learning more interesting for the students. If a student needs help, at home, the computer will benefit those that need it the most.

The county will access the programs that produced results and fine-tune those that did not. Consultants

DEFOLIATORS

There are three types of webbing or tent building caterpillars which are often confused. These include the eastern tent caterpillar, the forest tent caterpillar and the fall webworm.

The eastern tent caterpillar is primarily a pest of black cherry, apple, and crabapple, but will occasionally feed on other deciduous trees, including ash, birch, blackgum maple, oak, poplar, cherry, peach, plum and pear. These caterpillars are black, somewhat hairy, have a white strip down their back and have some white and blue markings on their sides. At maturity, the larvae migrate down the tree trunks and form cocoons on the bark of trees, in grass and under nearly any object they can reach. Non-chemical control of this pest, when trees are small include: had destruction of webs and larvae, pruning out webs and destroying them, destroying egg masses before spring and removing wild cherry trees. Chemical control includes; sevin, orthene, malathion, tempo, etc.

The eastern and forest ten caterpillars are only active in the spring. The forest tent caterpillar is a major defoliator of tupelo, sweetgum, oak, ash, birch, basswood, elm and maple. These pests do not make a nest like the eastern tent caterpillar but rather make a silken mat on the tree trunk or branch. These caterpillars have lots of blue coloration including a bluish head and broad blue lateral bands bordered by thin, broken orange and brown lines. A series of prominent white, key-hole shaped markings run down the back, which is in contrast to the solid white line of the eastern tent caterpillar. Chemical control of these pests include; tempo, sevin, malathion, etc.

Count Down To Statewide Walk Senator Norris For Expansion

Tennessee First Lady Andrea Conte announces the official one-month count-down to the kick-off of "Andrea Walks for Tennessee Children," her statewide initiative to raise awareness and funding for the state's 25 child advocacy centers.

The first lady will begin walking in Memphis on Sept. 8, and will cover more than 600 miles across the state before ending the event in Blountville next spring.

The walk in West Tennessee will be Sept. 8-10 from Memphis to Covington.

Money raised from "Andrea Walks" will be used to fund public programs, to purchase needed educational materials, to provide counseling for children who have been victimized and for other costs related to providing services to child abuse victims.

During a press conference in April, Conte explained she wanted to find a way to promote the work the state's child advocacy centers are doing to help child victims of sexual or severe physical abuse and established "Andrea Walks for Tennessee's Children." Conte and registered participants will walk an average of 10 to 15 miles per day and will continue until mid-November. The walk will resume mid-February 2005 and continue across the state for a tentative completion date of May 1.

During a meeting of the Corrections Oversight Committee in Nashville August 10th, State Senator Mark Norris discovered plans to scuttle the \$3.3 million expansion of the West Tennessee State Penitentiary. Norris serves on the Select Oversight Committee on Corrections and represents Lauderdale County.

"I oppose any plan to scuttle this import project. We need the additional 150-bed annex. The State needs it for minimum security inmates. It has been funded and needs to proceed," said Norris.

The recommendation to cancel the expansion was withdrawn at the committee hearing after it was revealed planned construction of a new prison in Morgan County came in \$31 million over estimates. Officials had recommended that funds for the Lauderdale County project be transferred to make up the shortfall in Morgan County.

Quenton White, Commissioner of the Department of Correction, stated Governor Phil Bredesen wanted an opportunity to review the recommendation. White assured Norris he would have new recommendations within a month.

The Department of Health has announced the first two confirmed cases of West Nile virus in Tennessee this year.

An adult female from Greene County and an adult male from Shelby County have tested positive. Both patients were hospitalized with symptoms of encephalitis, but have been discharged and are recovering.

West Nile is transmitted through the bite of a mosquito. It cannot be spread by contact with an infected person. While usually not serious in humans, it can sometimes lead to encephalitis, which is an inflammation of the brain. The risk of severe illness and death is highest for people over 50 years old, although people of all ages can become ill.

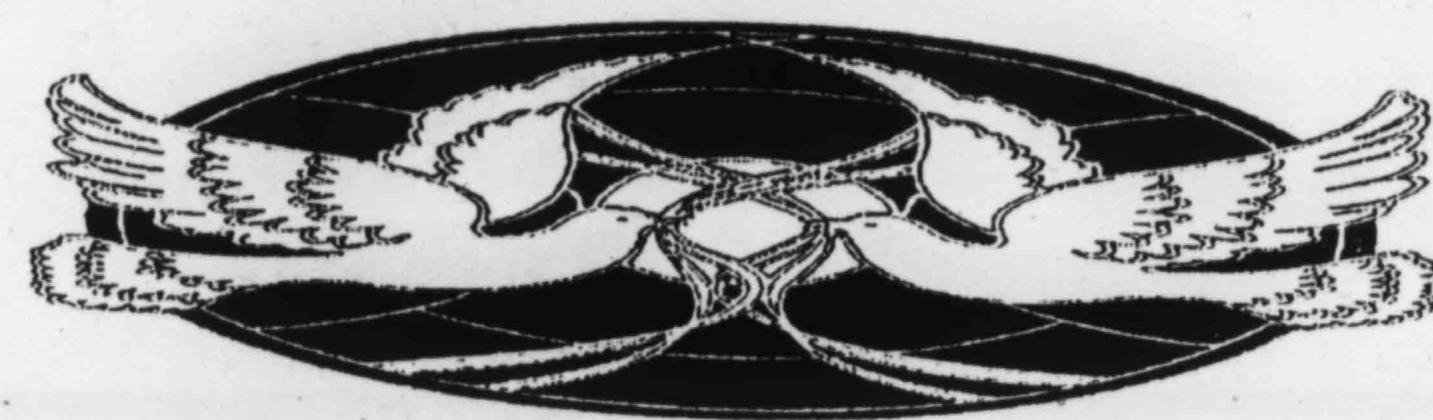
METH TASK FORCE

Governor Phil Bredesen's Task Force on Methamphetamine Abuse met in Nashville on Friday, Aug. 20th, to conclude its discussion of potential strategies for addressing the meth epidemic in Tennessee.

In all, the Task Force delivered roughly three dozen detailed recommendations as part of a preliminary plan that contains seven fundamental "cornerstones" for an effective strategy to attach methamphetamine abuse.

Methamphetamine, a powerful addictive stimulant that affects the central nervous system, is produced in clandestine laboratories across Tennessee with relatively inexpensive over-the-counter ingredients. The drug has been on the rise in recent years. The U. S. Drug Enforcement Administration estimates that Tennessee now accounts for 75% of meth lab seizures in the Southeast.
