





Willard Norvell Dies, 88; Sheriff, Warden, Judge

Willard Norvell, 88, of 314 Kirkpatrick Drive, Ripley, Lauderdale County's longest-serving sheriff (1948-1954, 1956-1962), warden of Fort Pillow State Prison (1966-1974), and Lauderdale County General Sessions Judge (1974-1990), died Thursday of last week in Baptist Hospital Lauderdale.

Rites were Sunday in Ripley's First Baptist Church, where he was a member and had won attendance contests for his Men's Bible Class by enlisting prisoners in his jail to join him in attendance.

Burial was in Maplewood Cemetery in Ripley, Garner Funeral Home in charge.

James Willard Norvell was born in Crockett County, April 10, 1915. His family resided in Brownsville before moving to Ripley in 1937.

He owned and operated the Red Star Service Station and Taxi Service, opposite from the former jail, and later at the site of the Community Service Station (formerly Ray's) on South Washington, a block west of the southwest corner of the Ripley Square.

He served in the Air Force, as a bomber navigator, from 1940 to December, 1944, returning to Ripley to resume his former business.

COTTON REFERENDUM

missioner Ken Givens announced that a referendum of set for two of the last three West growers has been set for 10 value of farm receipts from working days, beginning Mar. 8th, to decide the continuation and refinancing of the boll weevil eradication program.

"The referendum will give cotton growers a chance to have their voice heard in the future of the program and to reduce their assessment," said Givens.

Under the proposed reauthorization and refinancing plan, growers would pay a single assessment rate of \$12.25 per acre for all of West Tennessee, based on a ten-year payback..

Farmers are currently assessed \$20 to \$32.25 per acre of cotton growing, depending on the program area. If the referendum fails, the current rates would remain in effect.

The boll weevil eradication program was implemented in Southwest Tennessee, beginning in 1998 and later in other portions of West Tennessee, to help increase cotton yields and reduce farmer reliance on cotton insecticides.

Average cotton yields have increased 154 lbs. per acre since the program began in 2000, and insecticide use for boll weevil control has been drastically reduced.

All eligible cotton growers will be mailed an official ballot Mar. 1st. Ballots can be mailed or returned in person to the local USDA Farm Service Agency, beginning Mar. 8th through Mar. 19th, during normal business hours.

The referendum requires a two-thirds majority of growers voting in order to pass. Results will be announced Mar. 25th.

There are approximately 4,000 cotton growers in Tennessee, and according to statistics, the state's cotton yield

averaged 792 lbs. of lint per acre in 2003, up 51 lbs. from State Agriculture Com- 2002, and a new state record.
