

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

The University of Memphis will conduct its annual Basic and Advanced Aerospace Workshops, covering aviation and space technology, June 4th through 24th.

The workshops are open West Tennessee K-12 teachers and administrators in public and private schools, who are currently teaching, and will be working next

Teachers enrolled in the workshops receive full instate tuition, plus a stipend, and also earn three hours of undergraduate or graduate credit and two hours of flight instruction at a local airport.

Participants pay the University's activity fee, and instate tuition is covered by grants from the Aeronautics Div. of the Tennessee Dept. of Transportation, which underwrites the program.

The workshops include taking field trips to aviation sites and facilities, as well as attending daily classes at the University.

How can you keep your brain sharp for tomorrow's big test? Make sure you eat nutritious foods! Did you know your brain functions like a car engine? A car's motor needs things like gasoline, oil and brake fluid to operate. Your brain also needs specific materials to run properly, such as glucose, vitamins and minerals.

Where does the brain get these minerals? FOOD. Whether you're feeling happy or sad, food affects your mood. It has to do with amino acids and neurotransmitters in your brain. Amino acids are the building blocks of protein. They are in animal products like meat, poultry and dairy. Plant foods, where amino acids are found, include legumes, dried beans, peas, grains, nuts and seeds. Serotonin is a chemical that relaxes the body. Studies show that when the brain is using serotonin, the mind can focus better. Eat lots of foods that contain carbohydrates to get this nutrient. Eat turkey to get Tryptophan, an amino acid, that boosts your

Other chemicals that the brain needs are dopamine and nor-epinephrine and tyrosine. They can also be found in animal products.

Eating fish is good for your heart. There's now evidence that fish can help your brain too! Your brain is made up mostly of fat and water. A word of caution about the anti-fat message, prompted as part of a heart-healthy diet that makes it easy to think that all fats are bad. Some types of fat, however, are essential to human life. The saturated fat from meats (red) and full-fat dairy products can be bad for your heart and is not what your body needs. Our body needs polyunsaturated fats, which are found in fish, walnuts, flaxseed, canola oil and some green vegetables.

New surveys suggest that population groups with high fish consumption have the lowest rate of depression and some other health problems.

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
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
