

# Author Signs Books



JOE 'JO JO' BARNES, 59, of Ripley, died Saturday in Livermore, Ky., from injuries he received when his boat overturned while drag racing on the Green River in Kentucky. A veteran racer, he died instantly, according to McLean County Coroner Lee Muster. In a Chevrolet Cheyenne, Barnes was half-way through the race when a gust of wind caught the nose of the boat and flipped it over.

Services were at 3 p.m. Wednesday in Halls First Baptist Church, with burial in South Fork Cemetery, near Halls, Halls Funeral Home had charge.

He was a retired elevator mechanic and a member of Maury City Baptist Church.

# 2 Held After Chase, Crash In Haywood

Lisa Stewart, 27, of Old Brownsville Rd., Ripley, and Ricky Davis, Jr., 29, of Crockett County, were arrested last week after pursuit ended in a collision between their vehicle and a patrol car just inside Haywood County.

During a recent possible drowning, we broke an axle on one of our boat trailers, destroying our trailer and tearing several holes in our boat, causing it to be unrepairable. Our insurance covered some of the cost of a

Our large search and rescue boat needed two new motors to make it safe on the

. After talking with Rural Development, a division of the USDA, we were able to acquire a loan of \$18,500 and they gave us a grant of \$3,000, totaling \$21,500, the cost of two new engines.

This leaves us with an \$18,500 loan we have to pay


