Candy Teresa Harrison, of 145 Tucker, Ripley, is free from the Dyer County jail on \$2,500 bail after her arrest Friday for alleged vote tampering.

Donna Turner, Tennessee Bureau of Investigation agent, charges, in the arrest warrants:

• Cinda Tillman, "Deputy of the Lauderdale County Election Commission," says Candy urged William and Millie Dickerson, of 271K Gay, Ripley, to vote absentee, rather than early, so she could assist their voting.

They voted by mail, with their proper certifications.

The charge: "Voting absentee-application-ballot."

• On another complaint from the Election Commission, it was alleged that Mrs. Harrison had transported Carolyn Wray, of 303A Eastland, Ripley, and Dennis Hendrix, of 123C Northcrest, Ripley, to and from their homes to early voting, and en route had "used intimidation" to influence voting.

What "intimidation" and why persons subjected to it (after casting votes to their liking) accepted return rides, arrest warrants didn't say.

First Annual Tax Holiday Reminder

The first annual sales tax holiday will begin one minute after midnight Friday, August 4th, and will end one minute before midnight Sunday, August 6th, in Tennessee. The sales tax holiday is designed to provide relief to taxpayers by instituting a temporary sales tax exemption on certain items for a specific period of time.

All clothing and school supplies, \$100 or less per item, are tax exempt.

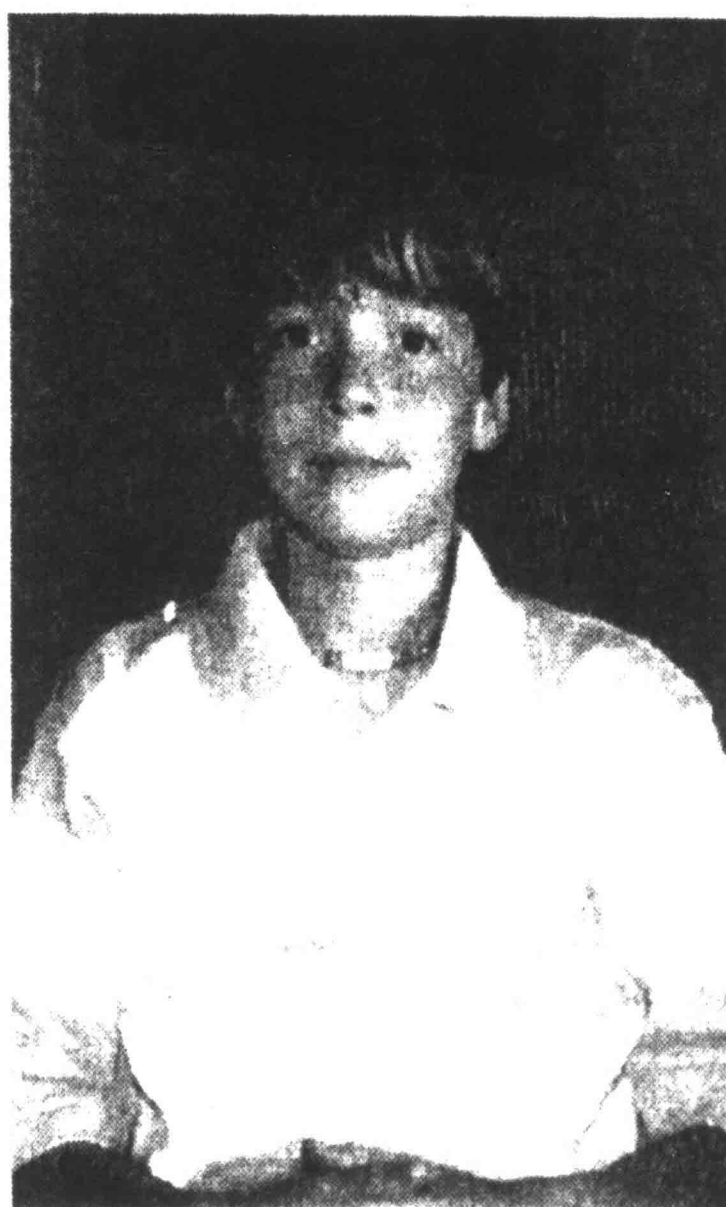
Computers, costing under \$1,500, and software purchased at the same time are tax exempt. However, computer software purchased separately is not tax exempt.

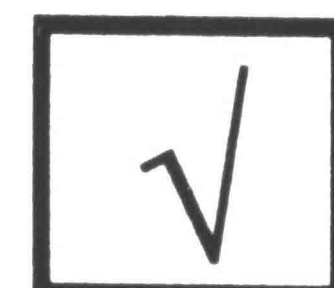

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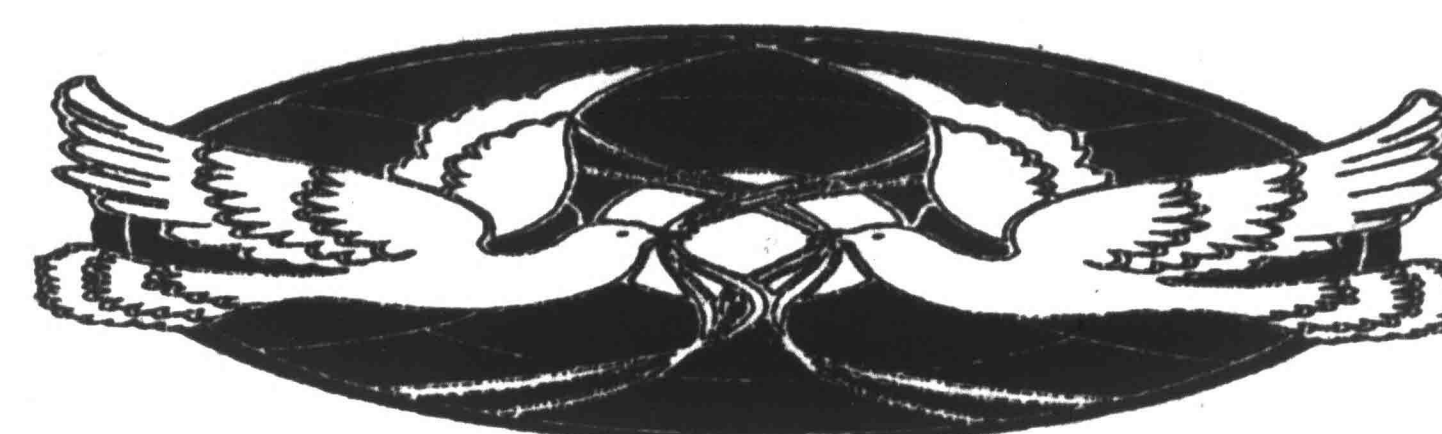

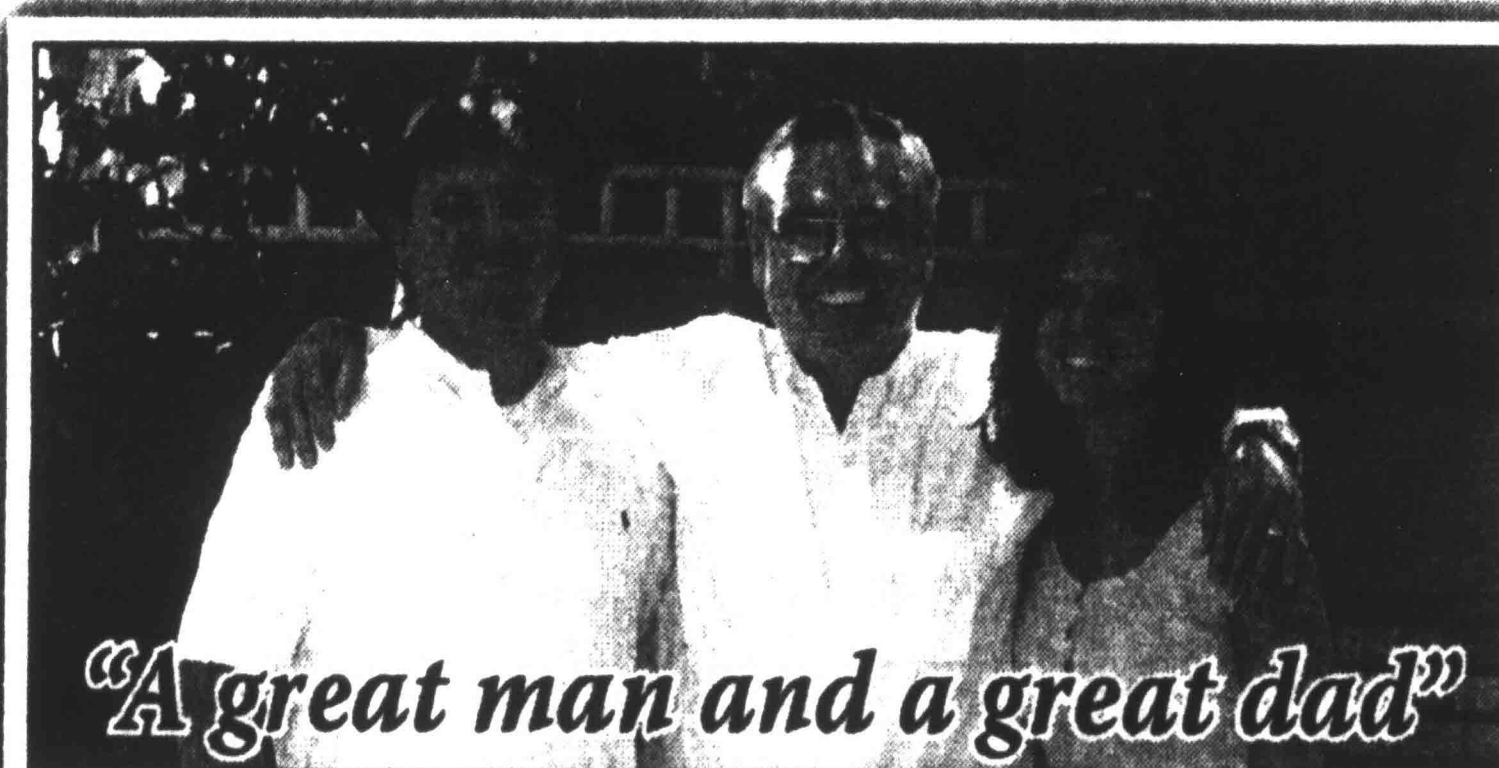

How to become a degree-seeking student at DSCC - Applying for admission

All new students are encouraged to apply for admission now. If you need an Application for Admission, contact the Office of Admissions & Records at (731) 286-3330 or the Gibson County Center at (731) 855-1419 or the DSCC Jimmy Naifeh Center at Tipton County at (901) 475-3100 or the DSCC Obion County Training & Education Center at (731) 884-0171.

If you have not completed all steps listed below, you should do so before attempting to register for classes!

- Complete a DSCC Application for Admission and return it to the Office of Admissions & Records, DSCC, 1510 Lake Road, Dyersburg, TN 38024.
- With your Application for Admission, send a \$10.00 check or money order for payment of a non-refundable application fee.
- Have an official copy of your high school transcript or official copy of your GED scores or official copy of an American Council on Education (ACE) External Diploma mailed to the Office of Admissions & Records.
- If you have had college courses, have an official copy of all college transcripts and an official copy of your high school transcript or official copy of your GED scores mailed to the Office of Admissions & Records.

If you are under 21, have your ACT scores sent to the Office of Admissions & Records or contact the Testing Office at (731) 286-3355 to set up a time to take a residual ACT. For information about testing dates, see "ACT" in the General Information section.

Unless exempted under Tennessee Code Annotated, proof of immunization with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. Students who are required to provide proof of immunization will be contacted by the Office of Admissions & Records.

The General Assembly of the State of Tennessee mandates that each public or private postsecondary institution in the state provide information concerning Hepatitis B infection to all students matriculating for the first time. Tennessee law requires that such students complete and sign a waiver form provided by the institution that includes detailed information about the disease. The required information includes the risk factors and dangers of the disease as well as information on the availability and effectiveness of the vaccine for persons who are at-risk for the disease. Before you can register, you will be directed as to how you can comply with this law.

If you are interested in taking an English or a mathematics course, please bring a copy of your transcript or grade report to indicate that you have successfully completed college-level English or mathematics if your transcript has not been received in the Office of Admissions and Records.

Tennessee state employees wishing to use the Public Higher Education Fee Waiver for employees of the State of Tennessee and TBR/UT employees wishing to use the PC191 can register no earlier than four weeks prior to the first day of classes.

GENERAL INFORMATION for all Students

ACT

The ACT is required if you are a first-time college student under 21 years of age and plan to work toward a degree. There is no minimum score for the ACT; however, official scores must be submitted to the Office of Admissions & Records if you are under 21. ACT scores will be used to determine if you will be required to complete developmental studies classes prior to taking college-level classes.

Any student scoring below 19 on the English subtest will be required to register for Basic or Developmental Writing, depending on the exact score. Students scoring below 19 on the Mathematics subtest will register for Pre-Algebra, Basic Algebra, or Intermediate Algebra according to the score received. Students scoring below 19 on the Reading subtest will register for either Basic or Developmental Reading. Students who are required to register for any two disciplines (English, Mathematics, or Reading) will also be required to complete a Learning Strategies course.

If you are under 21 and degree-seeking but have not taken the ACT, you can take a Residual ACT.

Residual ACT Testing

- Application for Admission must be on file prior to testing.
- Cost is \$27.00.
- Appointments necessary.
- Residual ACT scores cannot be transferred to other institutions.
- Residual ACT scores cannot be used for consideration of eligibility for any Tennessee Educational Lottery Scholarships.

Refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for the deadline to add. Adding DSCC Fall classes online is available through September 2; adding RODP Fall classes is available through August 25. After this date, you must complete a Change of Registration form and follow the procedures listed on the form. Forms may be obtained in the Office of Admissions & Records or from your academic advisor or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. You are not officially added to a course until this form is processed in the Office of Admissions & Records. If assistance is needed in adding, check with the Office of Admissions & Records or with the Gibson County Center or the Tipton County Center for more information.

Advanced Studies Program

High school students who qualify for Dyersburg State's Advanced Studies Program should apply for admission, and, with their guidance counselor's assistance, complete all admissions requirements prior to registering. Students who are eligible for this program may be admitted for either joint or dual enrollment. Dual enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in one or more specified college courses for which the student will be awarded both high school and college credit; joint enrollment is for college credit only. If your high school lists your DSCC course on its transcript and count the course toward high school graduation requirements, you may be eligible for up to \$300 to pay for your DSCC course. For more information, contact the Office of Admissions & Records at (731) 286-3330 or your guidance counselor.

Advising Center

If you have applied for admission for 2006 Fall or if you were enrolled at DSCC in 2006 Spring or 2006 Summer, you can register for classes at the Advising Center, which is located in Room 108 of the Student Center. The Center is open from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. on Tuesday, Wednesday, and Thursday. You do not need an appointment to meet with an advisor. Please arrive at the Advising Center not later than 12:15 p.m. to be advised.

Auditing a Class

If you wish to audit a class, you may not register for the class until after the official registration day at the campus on which the desired course is being offered. Individuals under the age of 17 may not audit any class without the written permission of the instructor and the Division Dean. Developmental Studies courses cannot be audited. Only those 60 years of age or older may audit Physical Education activity courses.

Class Attendance & Outside Study

Successful completion of college-level courses requires a specified amount of study outside the classroom as well as within the classroom. Successful completion of a degree program is dependent upon your commitment to study beyond the classroom.

Notice: When you register for a class and do not attend, you will receive a grade of "F" unless you properly drop. Refer to the DSCC Catalog or contact the Office of Admissions & Records for more information.

Class Cancellations and Changes

Dyersburg State Community College reserves the right to cancel classes that do not have sufficient enrollment. Divisions offering more than one section of the same course may close sections as necessary to promote the most effective instruction. Instructor assignments are also subject to change.

COL 101 – The College Experience: Teamwork

COL 101 is required for all degree-seeking freshmen who begin their college experience at Dyersburg State Community College and all degree-seeking transfer students who have not earned any college-level hours. This course promotes and develops success in college and the workplace through an orientation to the educational process and teamwork and leadership practices. Readings and class assignments are designed to maximize benefits gained from the college experience and demonstrate the connection between success in college and the workplace.

Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) Test

The Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) test measures competency in English, reading, and mathematics. Degree-seeking students who are 21 or over may be required to take the COMPASS test. There is no charge for taking the test, but the Office of Admissions and Records needs your Application for Admission prior to testing. If you are required to take the COMPASS test or any portion of it and are placed in Developmental Studies courses, you must enroll in and complete the designated courses in sequence.

COMPASS Testing

- There is no fee.
- An appointment is necessary.

Confidentiality of Student Records

DSCC regards a student's academic record as confidential. The release of information contained in the record is governed by Federal Law, known as the *Family Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA)*. Directory information including the student's name, address, telephone listing, e-mail address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student will be released unless the student has asked DSCC to withhold such information. If you do not wish directory information released, please provide written notification to the Office of Admissions & Records.

The law does provide for the release of information to authorized college personnel, other institutions engaged in research (provided information is not revealed to any other parties), and certain federal and state government officials. If you have questions concerning the provisions of this act, contact the Office of Admissions and Records.

Cost of Attendance at DSCC

During the 2006-2007 academic year all students, whether residents or non-residents of Tennessee, will pay a maintenance fee of \$95 per semester hour not to exceed \$1115 per semester. There is also a \$10 Facilities Assessment Fee for all students and a \$3 student activity fee for students enrolling in seven or more hours. A Technology Access Fee is assessed based on the number of credit hours in which the student enrolls. The fee varies from \$72 for three credit hours to \$90 for four credit hours to \$112.50 for five or more credit hours. For DSCC online courses, there is an additional fee of \$23.75 per credit hour; for RODP courses, there is an additional fee of \$39 per credit hour. For students who register after the first day of class, there is a \$10 Late Fee.

Tuition is charged to students who are not residents of Tennessee except for residents of

Pemiscot and Dunklin Counties in Missouri and Mississippi County in Arkansas. In addition to the maintenance fees listed previously, students who are classified as out-of-state for fee-paying purposes must pay \$384 per semester hour, not to exceed \$3338 per semester. As with other fees, the amount of tuition is subject to change.

DEFERRED PAYMENT PLAN

Students enrolled for at least 6 credit hours may request deferment of up to 50% of their fee balance (after any financial aid or fee waivers are deducted). The minimum down payment of 50% of the fee balance is due by August 23, 2006. The amount deferred will be payable in two monthly installments due September 28 and October 27, 2006. There is a \$10 service fee also due on August 20. An additional late payment charge of \$25 will be assessed for each installment not paid on or before the due date up to \$100 per term.

Students who register after August 23 and wish to use the new deferred payment plan must pay the \$10 service fee and 50% of the fees at the time of their registration.

Dropping Courses

If you need to drop a class, doing so will be possible provided it is within the class-drop period. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for deadlines to drop.

Dropping DSCC Fall classes and RODP fall classes is available online. Failure to drop a course which you stop attending will result in a grade of "F". If assistance is needed in dropping, check with the Office of Admissions & Records or with the Gibson County Center or the DSCC Jimmy Naifeh Center at Tipton County or the DSCC Obion County Training & Education Center for more information.

After the first day of classes, Developmental Studies courses cannot be dropped online. Under extenuating circumstances, however, a course may be dropped with the approval of the advisor and the Director of Developmental Studies.

Courses may be dropped without a grade through approximately the first two weeks (14 calendar days beginning with the first day of class). After this time, a grade of "W" is given if the course is officially dropped.

Dropping Courses Vs. Complete Withdrawal from the College

If you are enrolled in only one course and do not want to remain in that course or if you wish to withdraw from all courses, you can withdraw on the Web through September 11. After that date, a Permission to Withdraw form must be obtained and appropriate signatures obtained. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records and the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. Failure to withdraw officially from school will result in a grade of "F" in all courses. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for the deadline to drop.

Email Address for Student Mail, WebCT, and Pcounter

As a DSCC student, you will have an email address which will enable you to receive email about activities at DSCC. This address is printed on the receipt that you will get from the Business Office when you pay your fees. To login to your DSCC email account, look for your email address on your receipt and go to www.DSCC.edu. Then click Student Email. You will be prompted for your User ID and Password. Your User ID is what's printed to the left of the @ sign, and your Password is the same as what you use to access Student Self-Serve (usually your date of birth). If you need to access your course in WebCT, your User ID and Password will be the same as your email login information. Also, you will need this login information for printing in any DSCC computer lab.

Dyersburg State Community College Policies and Procedures for TN Educational Lottery Scholarship (TELS) Awards

The following Policies and Procedures have been developed to comply with Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 49, Chapter 4, amended, and the current financial aid practices of Dyersburg State Community College. The effective date was Fall semester, 2004.

Awarding and Disbursing TELS Funds

1. TELS awards will not be included in a student's award package until the student's name appears on the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation (TSAC) official TELS Roster for Dyersburg State Community College and/or is certified as eligible.
2. TELS awards will be disbursed (credited to the student's account) when the funds are received by Dyersburg State Community College.
3. Credit balances resulting from a TELS award will not be refunded to the student until after TELS funds have been received from TSAC.
4. TELS awards will be prorated for enrolling at less than full-time enrollment status.

Continued eligibility

1. It is the student's responsibility to know the state requirements to continue to receive a TELS award. Some, but not all, requirements are:
 - The student must file the FAFSA each year prior to May 1.
 - The student must achieve a Cumulative GPA of 2.75 in the semester in which he/she has attempted a total of 24 credit hours.
 - The student must achieve a Cumulative GPA of 3.00 in the semesters in which he/she has attempted a total of 48, 72, 96, and 120 hours.
2. Cumulative GPA and attempted hours for TELS eligibility differ from Cumulative GPA and attempted hours for academic purposes. The following chart shows how credit hours attempted affect TELS attempted hours and the calculation of TELS GPA.

** For TELS purposes, the census date for a semester or term shall be the 14th day of class.*

(It should be understood that the cost for transporting a student by ambulance to the hospital will be incurred by the injured or ill student).

2. **Tornado and Fire Alert**
 - A. Tornado Alert

Dyersburg Campus - In case of tornado alert, the alarm system will give a series of 10 short rings. Students should calmly file to interior hallways, away from windows and doors. One long ring sounds the all clear.

Gibson County and Tipton County Centers - When the National Weather Service issues a Tornado Warning, an air horn will be sounded in a series of short blasts. Ten short blasts require everyone to take immediate action and proceed to the identified areas in the building. Two long blasts will indicate the Tornado Warning has expired.

- B. Fire Alert

In case of fire at the Dyersburg campus and at the centers in Gibson County and Tipton County, there will be a continuous horn sound. In the Gibson County and Tipton County Centers, warning lights located in the halls will also flash. Students should use stairways to evacuate the building. Do not use the elevators.

C. For other emergencies, consult the Dyersburg State Community College Safety and Security Procedures; a copy is posted in each classroom and office.

Loss of eligibility

1. It is the student's responsibility to know the factors which may cause him or her to lose a TELS award. Some, but not all, factors are:

- The student fails to achieve the required cumulative GPA for a benchmark semester.

Note: *If for some reason a student who loses TELS due to GPA subsequently has a grade changed that results in a higher cumulative GPA, he/she may request reinstatement by submitting the TELS Reinstatement Request - Grade Change to the Financial Aid Office within 30 days of the grade change. On the other hand, if a student who at first qualifies for TELS for a semester, then a grade change results in a GPA lower than the required GPA, that student loses the TELS for that semester and all subsequent semesters. There is no appeal for this circumstance.*

- The student does not maintain continuous enrollment, defined as enrollment in both fall and spring semesters of an academic year. Exceptions may be made if the student is granted a Leave of Absence for certain documented medical or personal reasons. A student must submit the TELS Leave of Absence Request to the Financial Aid Office to obtain approval.

- The student drops from full-time to part-time within a semester without prior approval. A student should submit a TELS Request for Change of Enrollment Status to the Financial Aid Office for review by the Institutional Review Panel for approval before dropping to part-time. If a student fails to obtain prior approval, or if request for prior approval is denied and the student drops to part-time anyway, the TELS award for that semester will be prorated and the student will not be eligible for TELS in any subsequent semester.

- The student has attempted a total of 120 credit hours, earned his/her baccalaureate degree, or five calendar years have passed from the student's initial start in the TELS program.

2. A student who has been denied TELS because of loss of eligibility may appeal to DSCC's TELS Institutional Review Panel (IRP) if he/she has certain documented medical or personal reasons. The IRP will either approve the appeal, or request a hearing. If the appeal is ultimately denied by DSCC's IRP, the student may further appeal the case to the IRP of TSAC. Appeal for reinstatement of eligibility is made by submitting the TELS Appeal Form to the Financial Aid Office.

3. A student who is unable to timely enroll in an eligible postsecondary institution due to medical or personal reasons may appeal to the Institutional Review Panel for an exception. Approval can only be granted when there are documented medical or personal grounds. Appeal for an exemption of timely enrollment may be requested by submitting the TELS Request for Exemption of Timely Enrollment to the Financial Aid Office.

4. Once a student has lost a TELS Award for academic reasons, he/she may reestablish eligibility at the next subsequent credit hour checkpoint following the original loss of the award. Students may regain their award one time only. GAMS scholars who regain return at the HOPE level only. In order to regain eligibility, a student must maintain continuous enrollment.

5. Dyersburg State will in no case replace TELS funds for which the student has failed to meet continued eligibility requirements with institutionally controlled funds.

Transient Students (Concurrent Enrollment)

A DSCC student enrolled in another eligible institution at the same time he is enrolled at DSCC will be eligible to receive one award for the total number of enrolled hours.

The four-year institution would be considered the home institution. A student wishing to receive TELS funding for concurrent enrollment must contact the home institution for approval and follow their policies and procedures for receiving funds for concurrent enrollment.

Eligibility for Deferment of Payment of Tuition and Fees by Certain Eligible Students Receiving US Department of Veterans Affairs or Other Governmentally Funded Educational Assistance Benefits

Service members, veterans, and dependents of veterans who are eligible beneficiaries of US Department of Veterans Affairs education benefits or other governmentally funded educational assistance, subject to the conditions and guidelines set forth in Tennessee Code Annotated 49-7-104 as amended, may elect, upon formal application, to defer payment of required tuition and fees until the final day of the term for which the deferment has been requested. Application for the deferment must be made no later than 14 days after the beginning of the term, and the amount of the deferment shall not exceed the total monetary benefits to be received for the term. Students who have been granted deferments are expected to make timely payments on their outstanding tuition and fees balance once education benefits are being delivered, and eligibility for such deferment shall terminate if the student fails to abide by any applicable rule or regulation, or to act in good faith in making timely payments. This notice is published pursuant to Public Chapter 279, Acts of 2003, effective July 1, 2003.

General Education Core Curriculum

Each institution in the State University and Community College System of Tennessee (The Tennessee Board of Regents) shares a common lower-division general education core curriculum of forty-one semester hours for baccalaureate degrees and the Associate of Arts and the Associate of Science degrees. These institutions will also share a common lower-division general education core curriculum of 15-17 semester hours for the Associate of Applied Science degree. Consult the 2004-2005 or later DSCC Catalog for more information.

Grades at Term's End

Your grades will not be mailed at the end of the term but are accessible online. To access your grades, you will need your Social Security Number and your Personal Identification Number (PIN). If you need to provide a copy of your grades to your employer, request an official copy of your transcript to be mailed directly to the employer. This written request can be made at any time during the term.

To protect the confidential nature of the student's records, no grades will be released by phone. Grades will not be available until all debts or obligations owed to the College have been satisfied.

Graduation Candidates

If you are expecting to complete course requirements at the end of 2006 Fall, 2006/7 Spring, or 2007 Summer, you should submit an Intent to Graduate form to the Office of Admissions & Records by October 27. Cap and gown information also should be submitted to the DSCC Bookstore on the Dyersburg Campus by this date. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records or at the Gibson and Tipton County Centers.

Honors Program

The Honors Program provides exceptional educational opportunities for highly motivated and well-prepared students. The program works individually with students in planning their educational experiences at Dyersburg State Community College. Students may earn Honors distinction by meeting these requirements: completion of a minimum of 12 hours of Honors course work; participation in the Honors Seminar; and participation in at least 2-3 special college educational/cultural events a year. To become a member of the Honors program, an incoming freshman must have a minimum ACT composite of 26 and a 3.5 high school grade point average (GPA). An existing student must have a minimum GPA of 3.5. To remain in the program, a student must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.5. An appropriate Honors distinction is indicated on the student's transcript and the Honors student is recognized at graduation. Possession of Weapons

T.C.A. 39-17-1309 prohibits the possession of weapons, including firearms, on any property owned, used or operated by Dyersburg State Community College. Furthermore, State Law prescribes a maximum penalty of six (6) years imprisonment and a fine not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3000) for carrying weapons on school property.

Proof of Immunization

Unless exempted under Tennessee Code Annotated, proof of immunization with two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. If you are required to provide proof of immunization, you will be contacted by the Office of Admissions & Records.

The General Assembly of the State of Tennessee mandates that each public or private postsecondary institution in the state provide information concerning Hepatitis B infection to all students matriculating for the first time. Tennessee law requires that such students complete and sign a waiver form provided by the institution that includes detailed information about the disease. The required information includes the risk factors and dangers of the disease as well as information on the availability and effectiveness of the vaccine for persons who are at risk for the disease. Before you can register, you will be directed as to how you can comply with this law.

Refund Policy

Refund procedures for maintenance fees and out-of-state tuition fees are outlined below. (All other fees are non-refundable).

Change of student's status which requires refund:

- Change in a full-time student's schedule which results in reclassification to part-time student status during a refund period.
- Change in a part-time student's schedule which results in a class load of fewer hours during a refund period.

Other situations which require a refund:

- Withdrawing from the institution within the refund period,
- Cancellation of a class by the institution,
- Death of the student.

Refund Procedures

Refunds will be calculated for up to 60% of the term for first-time students at DSCC who withdraw from school and are receiving Title IV aid. These refunds will be returned to the appropriate federal programs according to regulations. Refunds for all other students will be calculated as follows:

- Refunds are allowed for the first 25% of the term. Beginning with the first official day of classes and extending through the first 14 calendar days of classes, there is a 75% refund. For the remaining days of this refund period, there is a 25% refund. *No refunds will be made beyond the 25% period.*
- 100% of the fees will be refunded for classes canceled by the institution.
- 100% of the fees will be refunded for "drops" or "withdrawals" prior to the beginning of the first official day of classes for the regular academic term and prior to the beginning of the first official day of classes of the respective summer term. No refund will be made during the official registration period.
- 100% refund in case of student's death.

Refund policy for students receiving Title IV aid is subject to change by the Federal Government.

Registering after the First Official Day of Classes

If you register for a class after the first official day of classes, be aware that enrollment in classes is not guaranteed but may depend on the number of classes missed and the instructor's assessment of your chances for success in the course. If you register late, you will need

to meet with the instructor to discuss any work that has been missed and to complete and sign the form for *Late Class Entry: Student & Teacher Agreement to Make Up Missed Work*.

Student Load

You will be considered full-time if you enroll in 12 or more credit hours; the maximum number of hours for which you may enroll is 19. You may request to enroll in more than 19 hours. *Request for Overload* forms are available from academic advisors or from the Office of Admissions & Records. You must obtain your advisor's signature on the form and meet specific requirements as outlined in the DSCC catalog before an overload can be processed.

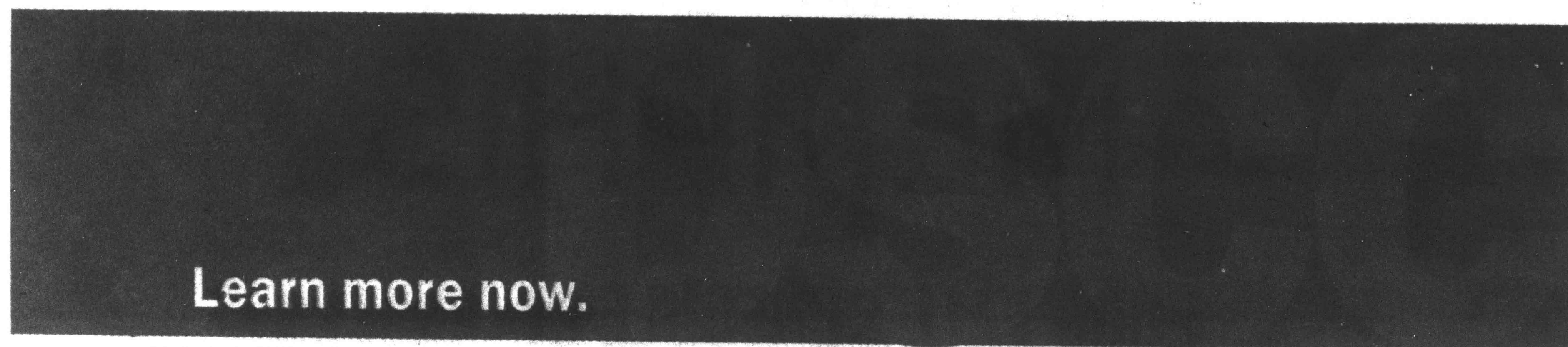

Announcements of final totals were delayed due to the new machines, longer ballot, and over 350 absentee ballots that had to be counted by hand, as in many of the counties in Tennessee. Long lines at 7 p.m., when the polls officially closed, did not help matters either, as some locations were not able to close until after 9 p.m.

Steve Sanders won the position of Lauderdale County Sheriff with 33.99% of the votes, defeating Incumbent Louis Craig, 2,350 to 2,134 and others.

Annie Laura Jennings held her position as Register of Deeds by an overwhelming total of 4,021 over Mike White, with 1,172, and others.

Linda F. Summar won the position of County Clerk, replacing Carolyn McBroom, who is retiring, by a vote of 3,618 over Randy White, with 1,113, and others.

County Commissioners elected include District 1, Gene Edwards, 385, Billy Poe Brandon, 373, and John L. Bates, 368; District 2, Ronnie Elder, 478, Coy Summar, 349, and Lynnwood Shoemake, 348; District 3, Carol L. Walker, 606, Tommy Dunavant, 542, and Dennis King, 502; District 4, John Gaines, 330, L. C. Hayslett, 299, and Angie Phillips, 207; District 5, Danny Hartsfield, 150, Judy Conrad, 146, and Louis C. Ruff, 113; District 6, Jesse Edwards, 481, Rob Reviere, 443, and Dwight Shoemake, Sr., 417; District 7, Talmage L. Crichfield, 469, Kathy Alston, 411, and David Caldwell, 310; and District 8, Monty C. McWilliams, 548, Eugene Pugh, 418, and Don Fisher, 355.

USDA Plans Rabies Fight

The United States Department of Agriculture's Animal and Plant Health and Plant Health Inspection Service (APHIS) will conduct a rabies campaign in portions of Tennessee, along with other nearby states in August. Baits, made of fishmeal polymer and containing oral rabies vaccine, will be distributed over rural areas, in the vicinity of water-fronts, using low-flying twin-engine aircraft and hand baiting will occur in populated regions using ground-based vehicles.

The projected two-week program will target raccoons, along with other wildlife, and will cover approximately 20,535 total square miles across five states with approximately 4.3 million baits distributed.

The bait is packaged in one-inch square cubes surrounding a sachet containing the vaccine or two-inch plastic sachets coated with fish-

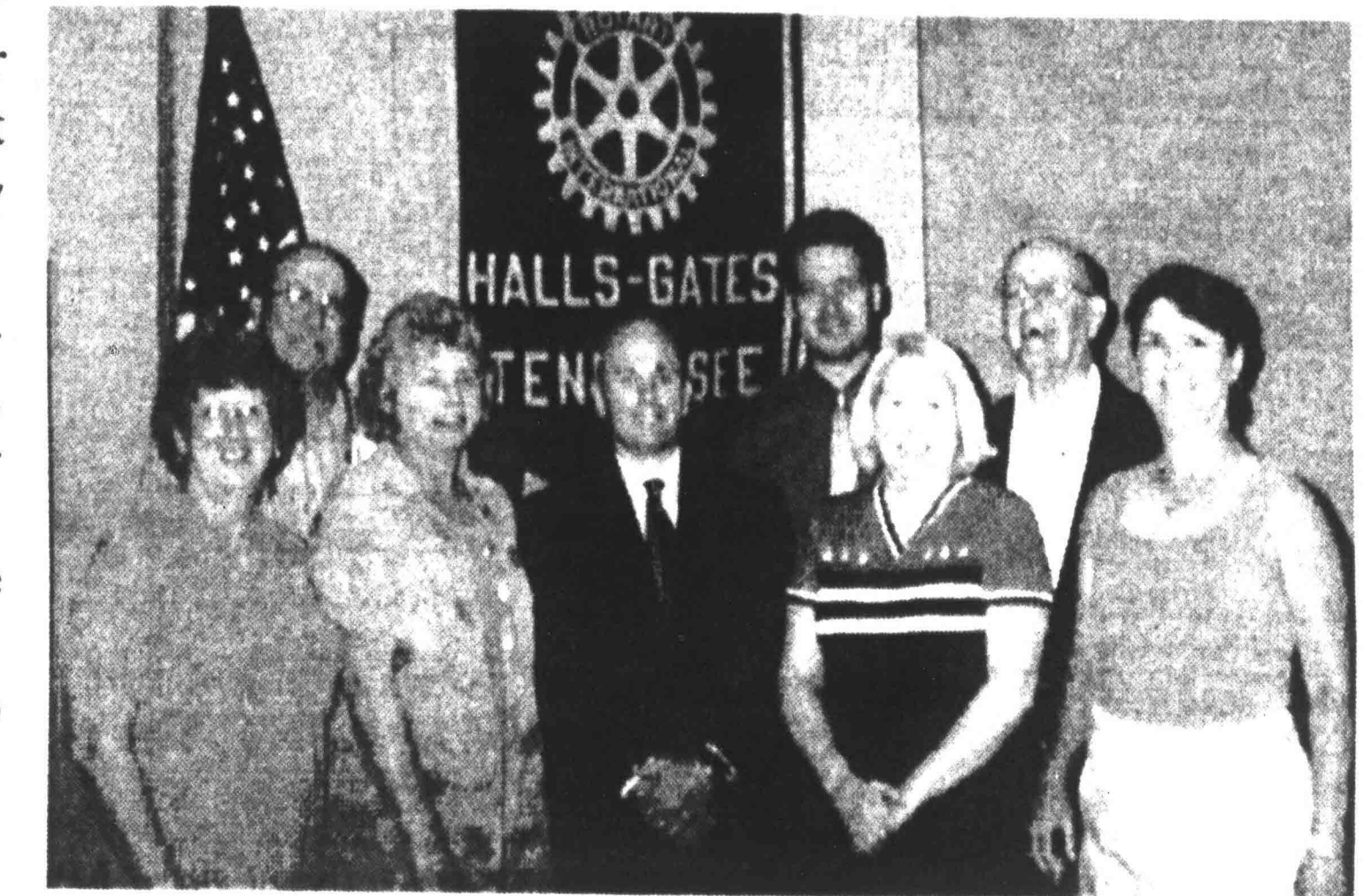

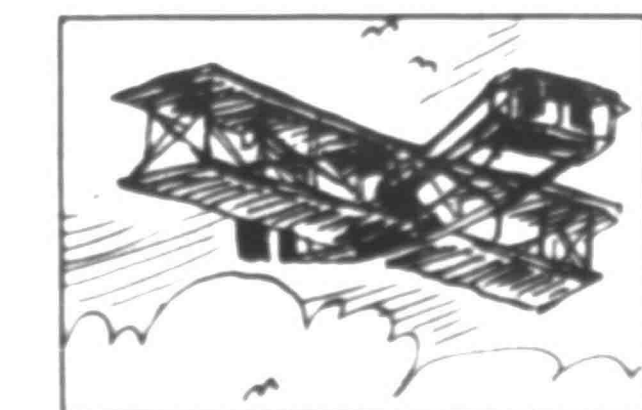

What We Can Learn From Mel Gibson's Meltdown

Mel Gibson's recent trials - DUI, resisting arrest, and a belligerent drunken anti-Semitic tirade - is a sad reminder for the Christian community.

I don't know the condition of Mr. Gibson's heart. Is he a believer in Christ? Does he really harbor hateful anti-Semitic views? Is he an actor in real life, i.e. a hypocrite, as well as in film? I don't know. But I do know this: the Christian community should learn to walk carefully around "celebrity Christians."

When Mel Gibson produced The Passion of the Christ he became something of a new-found celebrity darling of many in the Christian community. Church groups, schools, and other Christian leaders vied for Gibson's time and attention or for the ultimate - a photo op. For Gibson and his film company this was a boon to marketing. These new relationships, vigorous press attention, and a reasonably good quality film helped make The Passion of the Christ a blockbuster, despite official Hollywood's distance and even disdain.

But Mel Gibson, as we have painfully witnessed, is just a man. He will make mistakes. He is capable of taking the wrong path. People holding him too closely as their latest celebrity Christian hero can get burned.

The Christian community did this a few years ago with Jane Fonda. She declared her faith in Christ and Christian groups stumbled over each other in an effort to trot her out as the latest trophy validation of - just maybe - Christianity was true after all. Cal Thomas warned us back then. He said the woman is a new believer and to let her alone. Give her time to grow. Unfortunately she has now renounced her Christian faith and is experimenting with other spiritualist interests. The point is, when are we going to learn?

Satan is also at work. Had Mr. Gibson run off with a woman not his wife, Hollywood and the rest of American culture barely have blinked. We would have pointed out the inconsistency of this action with his recent religious film-making, but then we would have moved on. Immorality is an everyday occurrence in Hollywood and for that matter everywhere else too. But Mr. Gibson stepped over a currently sensitive line. In other words, anti-Semitic remarks are a far greater Hollywood sin than immorality. I'm not saying anti-Semitic comments shouldn't be condemned. I'm just saying that the ripple effect of this kind of behavior back to a film like The Passion of the Christ is greater than immorality might have been.

I am sorry for Mr. Gibson. I like him and much of his work. I hope he gets help for his alcoholism, and I hope he is able to rebuild his reputation. More importantly, I hope he has or comes to real faith in Jesus Christ along with a biblically Christian, loving view of Jewish people. I also hope the Christian community learns a powerful lesson about not jumping on too quickly to the latest celebrity Christian's bandwagon.

Cole led in Tipton, 6,830 to 2,523, and in Lauderdale, 2,286 to 1,805.

Butler led in Fayette, 3,304 to 2,615; in McNairy, 2,184 to 1,618; and in Harde- man, 1,446 to 1,418.

\$480,000 in Land and Water Conservation Fund (LWCF). The Town of Halls was selected for the LPRF grant of \$186,000 to renovate Kevan Ward Park and Crichfield Park.

The Local Parks and Recreation Fund Grant Program was established in 1991 to provide local governments with funds to purchase land for parks, natural areas, greenways and recreational facilities. The funds may also be used for development of trails and projects in parks, natural areas and greenways. All LPRF grants require a 50 percent match by the recipient.

The Recreation Trails Program is a federally funded program established to distribute funds for motorized, non-motorized and diverse recreation trail projects. The funds are available to state, federal, and local government agencies as well as private organizations that partner with government agencies. RTP funds may be used for maintenance, construction, acquisition, development and rehabilitation of trails. The maximum federal share for each project is 80 percent, so all RTP grant recipients must provide a 20 percent match.

The LWCF Grant Program was enacted by the Land and Water Conservation Fund Act of 1965 and provides matching grants through the state to local governments and state agencies that provide recreation and parks for the acquisition

and development of public outdoor recreation areas and facilities. LWCF grants require a 50 percent match by the recipient.

Grant recipients were selected through a scoring process with careful consideration given to the projects that met the selection criteria and expressed the greatest local recreation need.

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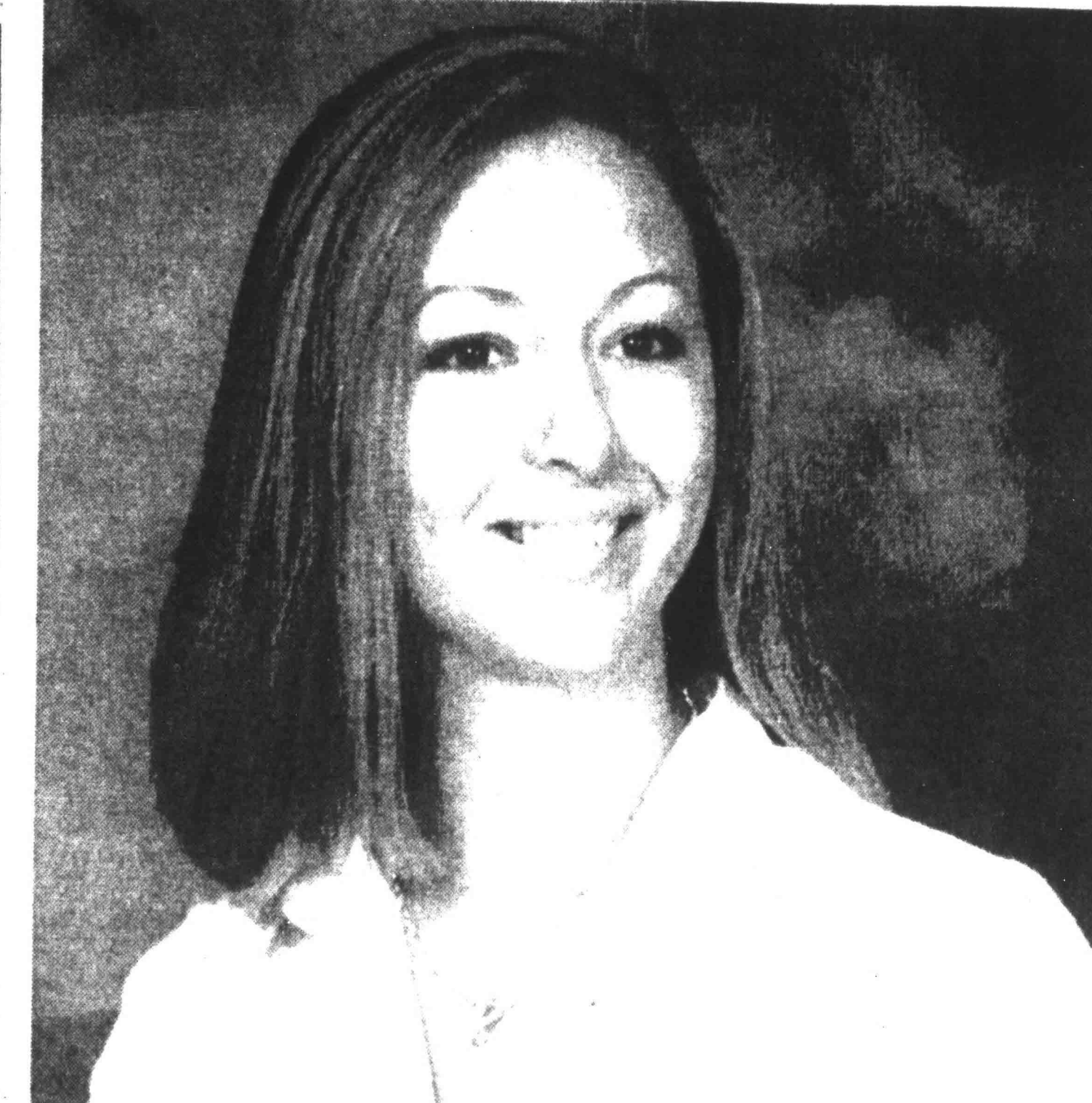

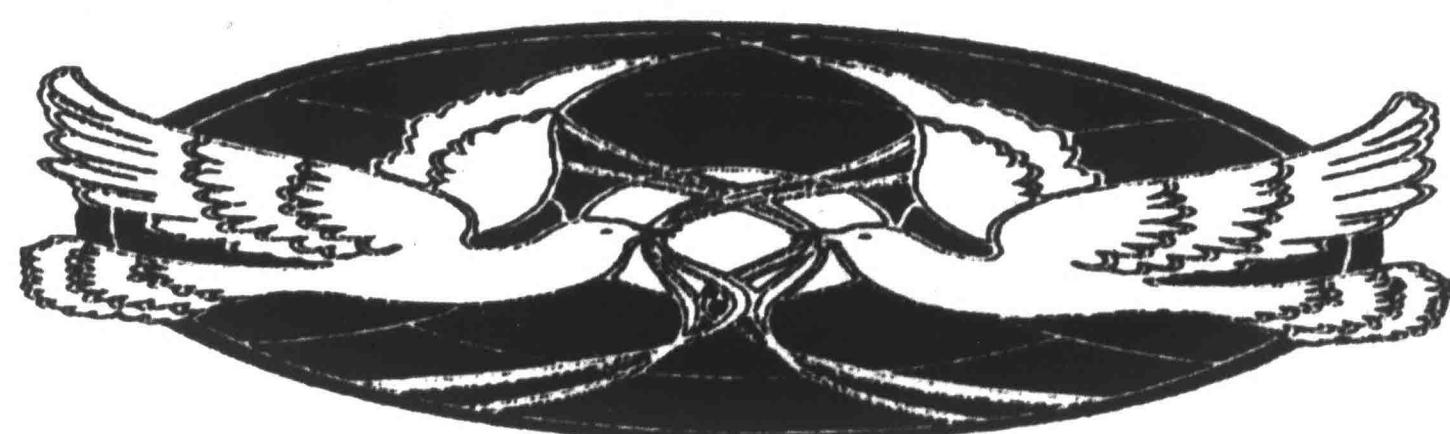

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MAKING A DIFFERENCE COLUMN

Credit Card Companies Target College Students

In the late '80s when I was an academic dean at The King's College in New York, my office regularly received stacks of postcards from credit card companies requesting that I place these postcards in each student's mailbox. Instead of student mailboxes I placed these credit card invitations in the wastebasket.

It was also in the late '80s that credit card companies began targeting college students as a new, growing, and potentially profitable market demographic. Credit card companies offered credit with spending "limits" like \$8,000 or even higher, zero or reduced interest for the first year, and acceptability at all kinds of businesses. Of course these companies make money when people carry debt incurred on their cards, a fact that makes college students and easy credit an appealing mix.

Unlike some financial advice gurus, I'm not against credit cards. My wife and I have a few of our own. But if older adults are sometimes tempted to spend-via-credit beyond their means, how much more so younger adults whose financial skills and experience are at best limited?

I know a couple, for example, who spent the first five years of their marriage paying off fairly substantial credit card debt that one of them had incurred during college. They sought help through Christian oriented financial advisers like Dave Ramsey, identified their goals, worked hard and acted with self-sacrifice and discipline, paid off their debt, and celebrated with their friends when they emerged free from the wrong kind of debt. Now they are purchasing their first home. That's a financially stressful story turned success story. I salute them. Unfortunately, many young adults do not possess the self-discipline to do the same.

Most college students, even if they are working, are not earning sufficient funds to make them attractive consumers. But they still possess two important characteristics that credit card companies require: an economically bright future, and parents who pay off their debts.

While I do not necessarily like the idea that credit card issuers target college students, I cannot condemn them for working legally within a free economy, allowing adults - even if young - to make their own decisions. Responsibility for personal financial well-being rests with the person in this case not the corporation or the public.

The moral of this story is, like so often in a capitalistic system, caveat emptor ... let the buyer beware. If a college student is going to buy on credit, he or she needs to understand the extent of the financial risk involved, needs to demonstrate the maturity to handle credit, needs to be responsible for paying for his or her own debt, and should as a matter of practice avoid using credit cards.

LUNCH PROGRAMS

Tennessee is working to inform students and families about the availability of nutritional school meals at a free or reduced-price rate for students who are at-risk economically. Nationwide, fewer students register for the United States Department of Agriculture (USDA) School Meals Program than qualify for services. The Tennessee Department of Education would like more eligible students to participate to ensure these students have the benefit of a balanced diet which is vital to a healthy lifestyle and academic success.

The USDA's school meals program provides essential nourishment to children who may not otherwise consume the nutrients necessary for their health and success in school. Roughly 660,000 Tennessee students participated in the school lunch

program last year and 232,000 participated in the school breakfast program, with nearly 147 million total meals served.

Eligibility for free and reduced-price meals is based on family income and set each year by the federal government. Students may receive free meals if their families receive food stamps or Families First benefits; the household income is at or below 130 percent of the federal poverty level; or they are in foster care. Students may receive reduced-price meals if their household income is at or below 185 percent of the federal poverty level.

I ask the administration to consider what is more likely to cause injury, the dress code or the back load? I ask the teachers to not be afraid of what will happen if they challenge the administration when our kids well being is at stake.

I applaud the teaching staff at Halls Junior High for

doing their job, in an unbelievable setting. I applaud the students for working hard to achieve the highest TCAP scores in the region, with the help of these teachers. I applaud the entire school for surviving water leaks in the classrooms when it rains; gas leaks in the boiler room and carrying their heavy load. God bless them all.

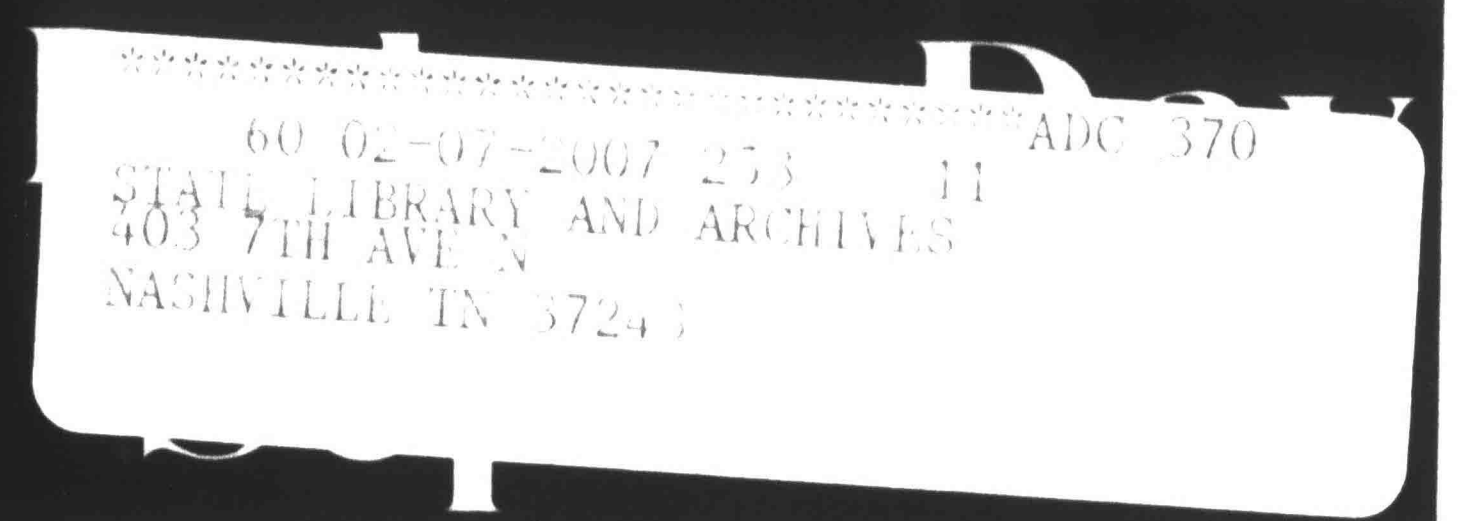

Taking Another Look At The Abortion Issue

Abortion is not a pleasant subject. But it remains a reality in American culture and, for that matter, cultures around the world. Since Roe v. Wade legalized abortion in America beginning in 1973, we've lost an entire generation of our posterity to this egregious practice.

While specifically Christian perspectives on abortion have been repeatedly and oft-times vociferously articulated, "the Christian view" of abortion is difficult to ascertain, primarily because people - including Christians - disagree on how to interpret the Bible. One can find pro-life Christians, pro-choice Christians, and a most interesting creature, a pro-life Christian who gets or supports someone getting an abortion "because the circumstances warrant it."

I will never forget my wife's comments years ago when we were expecting our first of eventually four children in our family. I had said to her that if a doctor told me her life was at risk and the only way to save her was to take the child, then I'd tell the doctor to take the child. My wife absolutely and categorically disagreed and made me promise that if we ever faced such a difficult decision we'd not harm the child and thus depend upon the Lord's providence for the final results for her life and the child's. I was admitting that I held to a belief, but my love for her might cause me to violate that belief. She said our belief and our trust in God mattered more than our love. Amazing woman. She was right.

I believe abortion is morally wrong and spiritually and emotionally damaging to the mother. Abortion is a medical procedure that jettisons an unborn human being from its place in the womb, ending the unborn's possibility of survival. In other words, abortion takes life.

It is always fascinating to me to hear pregnant actresses interviewed on television talk shows, talking excitedly about "my baby." Even the hosts use this term. The unborn is a baby. It's human life. It's alive. Because the actress and her husband or partner want a child, she is carrying a baby to full term. If they did not want a child, the baby somehow mysteriously becomes "a fetus," something abstract and therefore abject. So goes the word-games we play in order to give wiggle room to do what we want to do when we want to do it.

Thankfully, the rate of abortion is not as high as it once was. But abortion is still commonly practiced among all ethnic and racial groups in America. It is, as it always has been, a form of cultural suicide.

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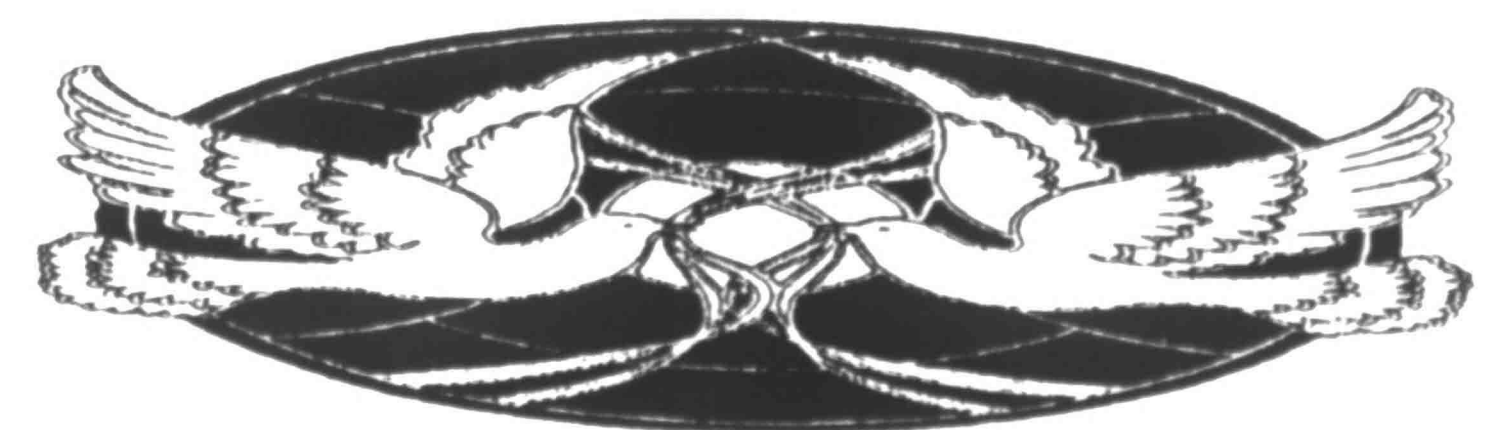

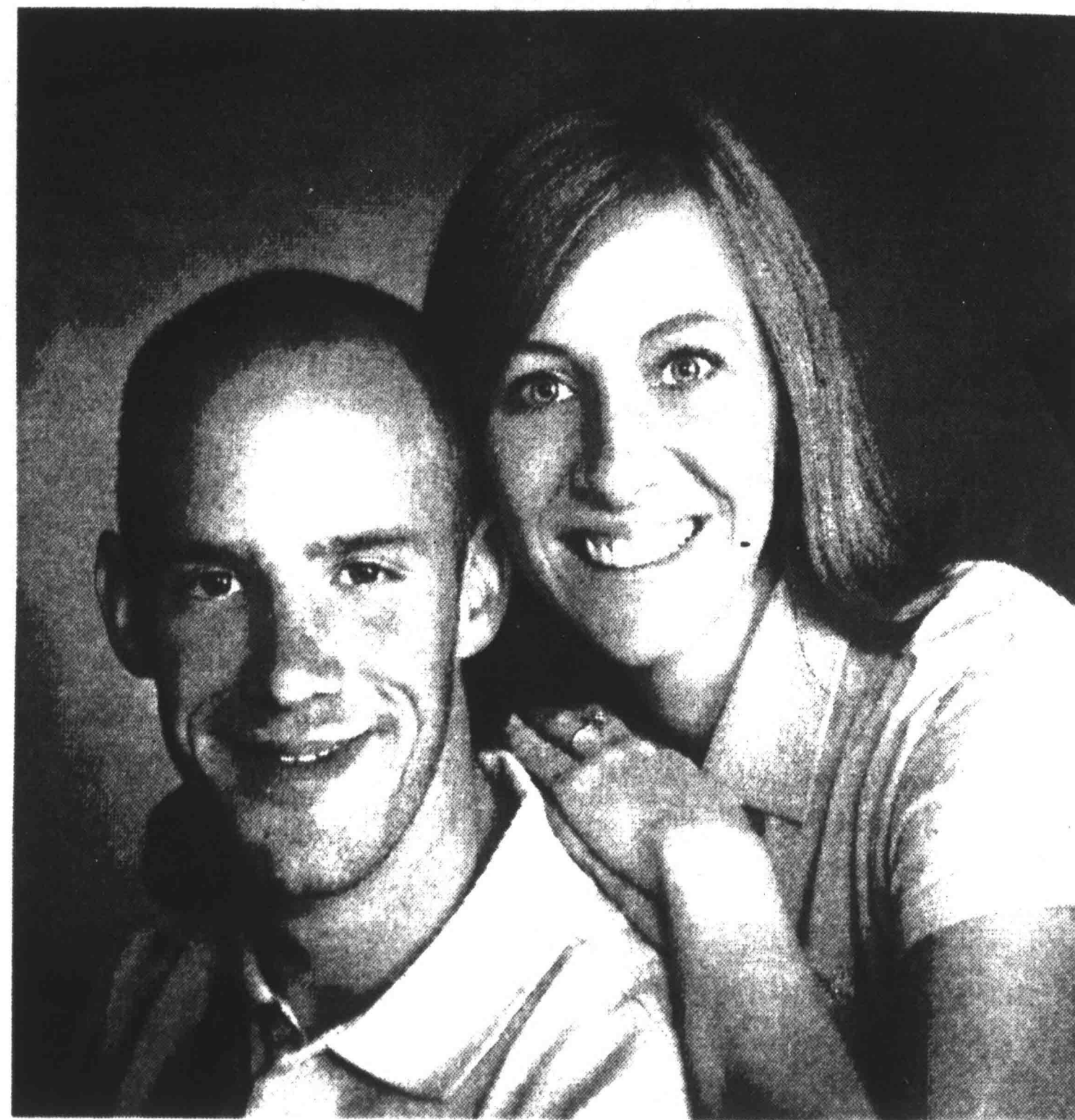

August It's Back To School!!

PAPER or PLASTIC??

What does your child carry to school? Instead of sending your child to school with lunch in a paper or plastic bag, invest in an insulated or plastic lunch box and freeze a frozen gel pack to keep things cold.

Many children wait several hours until the lunch bell rings. However, the rule of safe food handling is to leave perishable foods out no more than two hours.

Since most students do not have access to a refrigerator at school, packing perishable foods properly is important. One way to keep cold foods cold is to use a frozen gel pack, but if you don't have one, freeze juice in a juice box or fill a plastic bottle with water and freeze the night before. By lunch, it can do double as an ice pack and a drink. Pack extra paper towels to absorb the water when drinks thaw.

When packing hot foods such as soups, chili, or stew you will first need to fill an insulated bottle with boiling water. Empty the bottle and then fill it with piping hot food. Keep the bottle closed until lunchtime.

DID YOU KNOW...

- 3 to 4 hours pass between the time lunches are packed and eaten?
- Half of all children surveyed say their lunch boxes are not cleaned each day?
- 8% say they are "hardly ever" cleaned.
- One in four children say they keep their lunch leftovers for afternoon snacks.

MAKING A DIFFERENCE COLUMN

What Do You Think About Student Dress Codes?

American public schools continue to struggle with student dress codes: to have them or not to have them? To enforce them? How to enforce them? What should be allowed and what should be disallowed?

The problem is not so much modesty, lack of some perceived decorum, or distraction from the academic purposes of the school experience—though these concerns are real—as it is safety. "Hoodies" and cargo pants are being outlawed because they provide layers or pockets in which students can hide weapons or other contraband.

In addition, schools are banning violent graphics and t-shirt messages, racist slogans, or other unnecessarily provocative material. Too tight, too loose, too many questionable insignias, too much skin, too much, too little, the beat goes on. But it's a long way from the sixties and seventies. Of course, some of these actions have prompted First Amendment challenges.

At Cornerstone University, we discarded a lengthy, list-based dress code years ago. But we still want to influence students to select dress that represents them well as Christian people.

I own a swimming suit that I believe is modest. I wear it on the beach, and I've worn it when I have been with student groups. I do not wear it to the local country club, fine restaurants, campus, or church on Sunday morning. The point is something can be modest but not appropriate. Both principles are important.

I'm not saying this university never experiences problems with student dress, nor am I saying that students never make poor choices or push the envelope. Sometimes we have problems because students make poor dress choices. But we're here to help them learn and grow. We interact with them and talk about our principles, and most of them respond in due course.

This principled approach to student, or personnel, dress has spared the university a world of headaches. It is not specific, so at times it must be interpreted. But it's rooted in our worldview, and it makes sense to students. It gives them guidance for a lifetime, not just rules for the moment. These principles weather and survive changes in fads and fashions. Modesty and appropriateness principles may not speak directly to weapons and contraband hidden in clothing, but the Christian faith speaks to such matters in other ways.

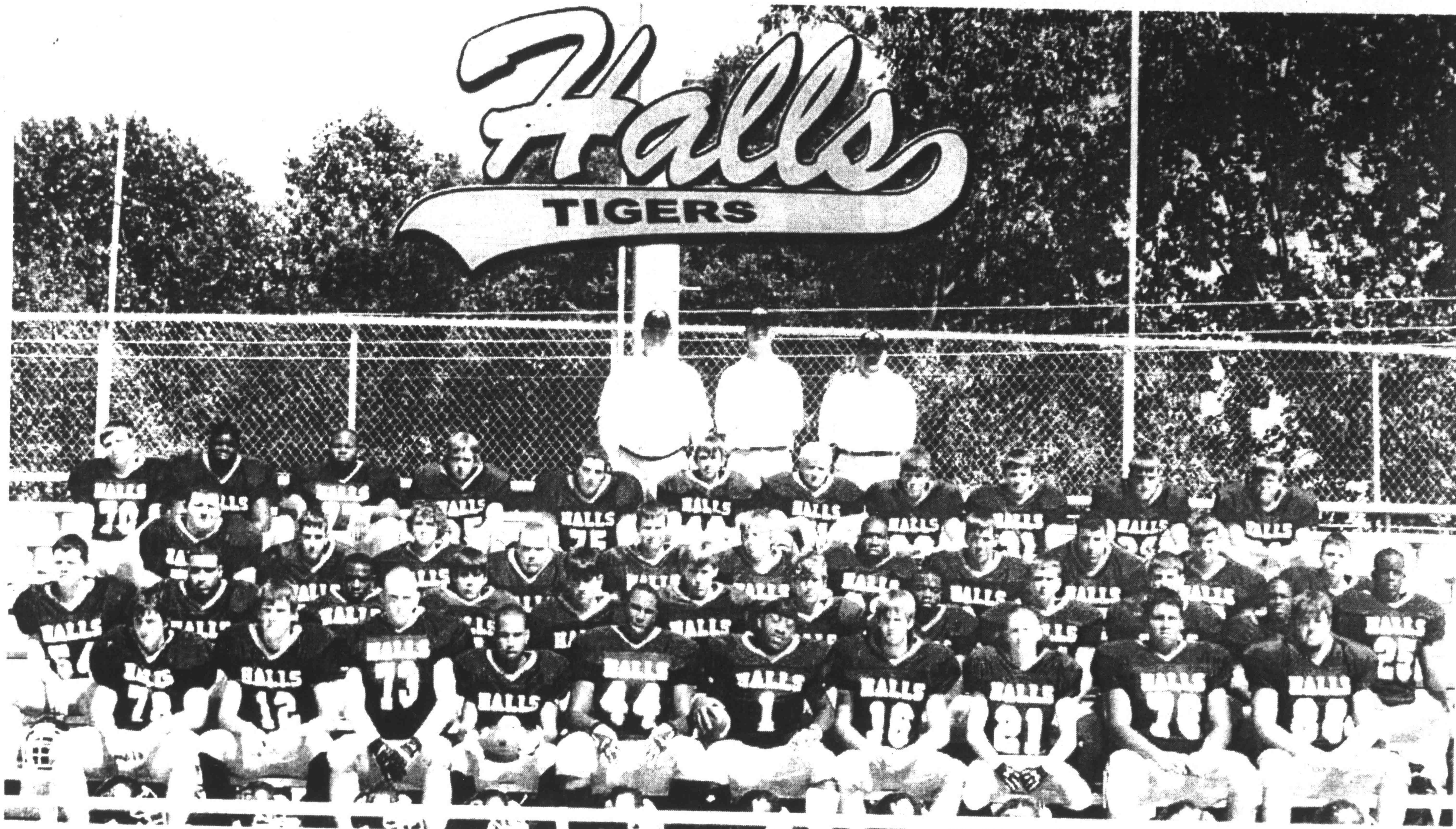
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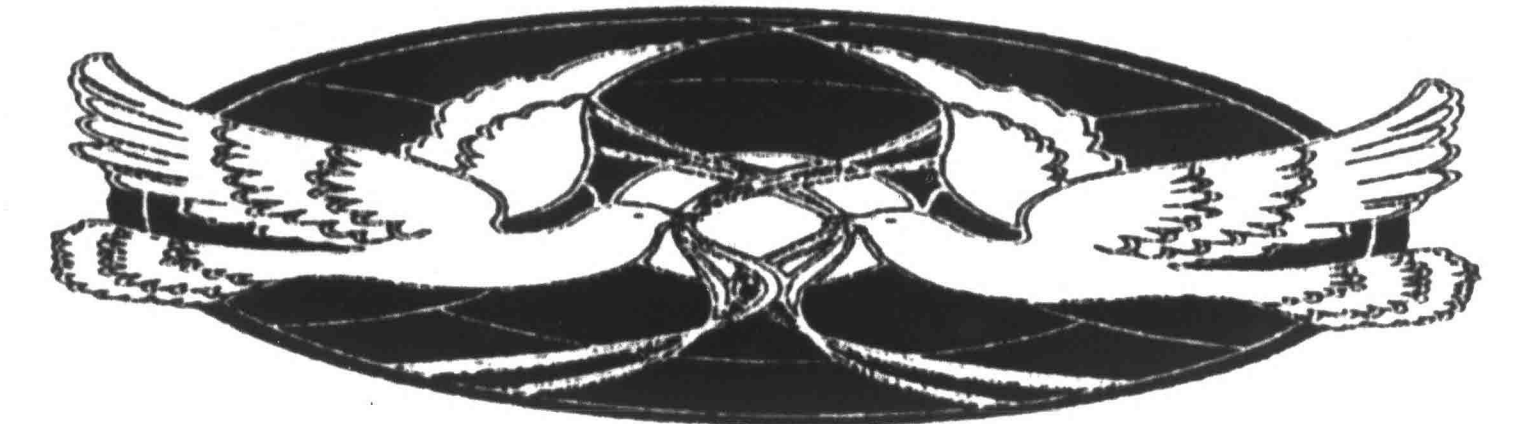

payments. Priority is given to individuals with disabilities, the elderly, and low-income families with children under six-years old.

The program can be used anytime during the year for assistance. In the past, the program was used mostly for emergencies and during the winter or summer peak periods. Assistance will be provided as long as the funds are available.

More than 60,000 Tennessee families are assisted through the LIHEAP program, which also consists of crisis assistance. Eligible citizens must be served within 48 hours of application or 18 hours if the household is in a life-threatening situation.

The assistance does not go directly to the individual, it is made in the form of a payment to the utility company or home energy provider. If eligible, the client could receive two payments a year.
