Mike Allmand Sues City For \$6,000,000

Mike Allmand, head of Ripley Power & Light Co., has filed suit, in U.S. District Court in Memphis, against the City of Ripley, Mayor Jon Pavletic, and aldermen Billy Chipman, Billie Ann (Mrs. J. C.) Hendren, Jimmy Harrison, John Gaines, and Robert Terry Hightower, seeking \$3,000,000 in actual damages, plus \$3,000,000 in punitive damages, plus interest and litigation costs, for alleged violations of employment agreements with RPL (Dec. 11, 2003) and with Ripley Gas and Water (Oct. 31, 2003).

After Allmand merged RPL and Gas and Water, for major sayings to customers of both utilities, his combined salaries from both utilities drew such heat that the City board un-did the merger, and Allmand was asked to repay \$24,798 paid to him as salary from G&W,

Allmand's suit says the defendants acted "for political reasons and in retaliation for plaintiff's political activities."

He is represented by Tim Edwards, of Glassman, Edwards, Wade & Wyatt, of Memphis.

Ripley's city attorney is Steve Crain.





MOVE OVER LAW

The Tennessee Department of Safety and Tennessee Highway Patrol announced Wednesday, March 15th, that the Tennessee Trucking Association is joining the effort to educate motorists on Tennessee's Move Over Law. The law, which went into effect in July 2004, requires motorists to move over or slow down for stopped emergency vehicles.

Tennessee Trucking Association member Mid-South Logistics has placed decals advising motorists to move over for stopped emergency vehicles on the rear doors of 42 trailers. In addition, Wal-Mart has put posters with information on the Move Over Law in employee break rooms at all Wal-Mart and Sam's Club stores in Tennessee. Company officials estimate some 520,000 people have viewed them.

Motorists who are caught violating the law currently face a minimum \$50 fine, but lawmakers are pushing to increase the penalties to a minimum of \$100, with a maximum of \$500. "When the Move Over Law went into effect in 2004, we cleared a major hurdle," said Senator Doug Jackson, who sponsored the measure in the state Senate. "Now it's time to put more teeth in the law by increasing

Bredesen Makes School Lunches Changes In THP

Governor Phil Bredesen officially released a report he commissioned detailing recommended changes to the Department of Safety. The report is part of a sweeping review of policies and practices with a goal of ending decades of politics in the Tennessee Highway Patrol.

Bredesen commissioned the report by New Yorkbased Kroll Inc. last December following his acceptance of the resignations of the department's top three managers. The resignations came after background checks by the Tennessee Bureau of Investigation found more than three dozen troopers and support staff had criminal or driving violation histories.

"The changes we make today are another step toward eliminating the decades old influence of politics in the Highway Patrol and to ensure that the leadership and management of the Department of Safety reflects the dedication and professionalism of the men and women in uniform who keep our highways safe and secure," Bredesen said.

Bredesen announced his intent to implement three broad recommendations including, the creation of a fair and transparent hiring and promotion process, the institution of nationally-recognized professional standards and the improvement and ment's management.
