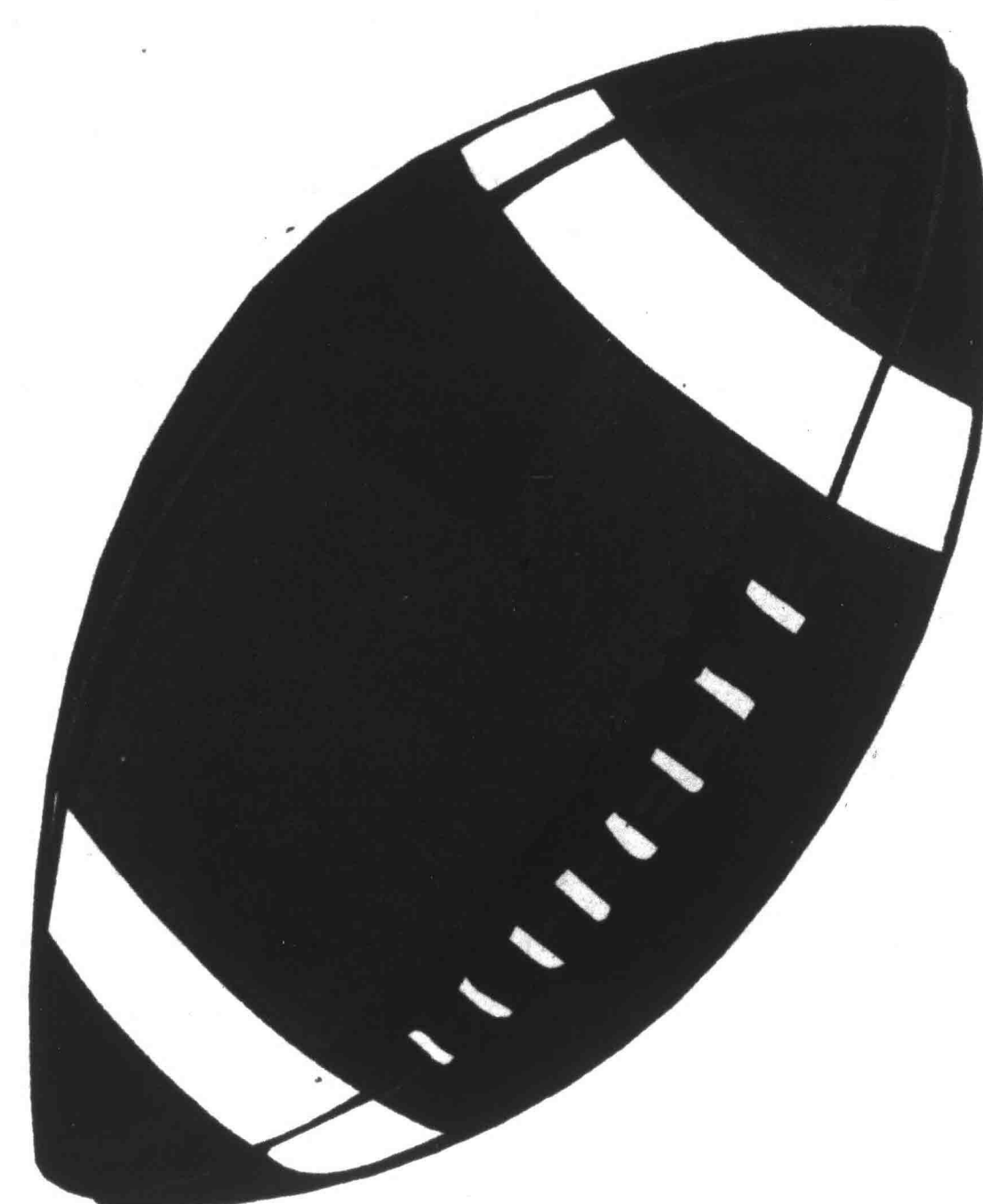

ket their diversified farm products. Applications are then reviewed for eligibility, ranked and approved on a competitive basis, based on project plans and the potential to increase farm income.

The agricultural development program was proposed last year by Governor Phil Bredesen and approved and funded by the Tennessee General Assembly through an appropriation for the Tennessee Agricultural Enhancement Program (TAEP), a comprehensive plan that includes improving cattle production and profits in Tennessee and expanding animal health services to farmers statewide.

According to Jan Keyser, program coordinator, more and more farmers are taking advantage of the program as they see what it can do for them.

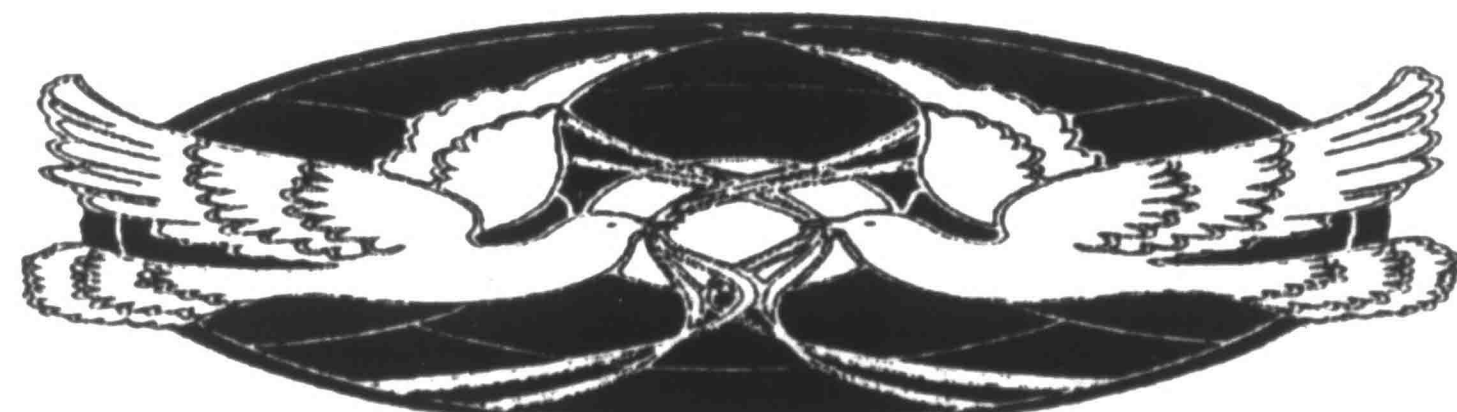

Liquor Sales In County Approved By 118 Votes

By 118 votes (2,328 to 2,210), Lauderdale County voters Tuesday approved package sales of alcohol in retail stores.

Ripley voters approved even more narrowly, by 67 votes (1,046 to 979).

Alcohol by the drink carried Ripley by 65 votes (1,097 to 1,032) but failed in the county by 112 votes (2,296 to 2,408).

Tennessee Governor Phil Bredesen defeated Jim Bryson, 5,146 to 1,567 in Lauderdale County. At press time, Bredesen was declared the winner with over 68% of the votes.

The Constitutional Amendment, declaring marriage between one man and one woman, passed 5,818 to 865 and was passing statewide with over 81% votes.

The Constitutional Amendment, freezing taxes for senior citizens, passed 5,097 to 1,297. At press-time, approximately 700,000 votes separated the two.

In the United States Senate race, Harold Ford, Jr., 3,954, defeated Bob Corker, 2,953, in the county, but at press-time the polls were too close to declare a definite winner, although Corker was ahead with 51% of the votes.

John Tanner won re-election to the U. S. Representative Dist. 8, defeating John Farmer, 4,878 to 1,307.

Craig Fitzhugh, running un-opposed, win 5,216, for State Rep. Dist. 82.

Jeff Crowder won Constable Dist. 4, with 570 votes.

As of Monday, 3,594 early ballots were cast. Voter turn-out Tuesday, despite a cool dreary day, was only 45.93% with 7,138 total votes counted.

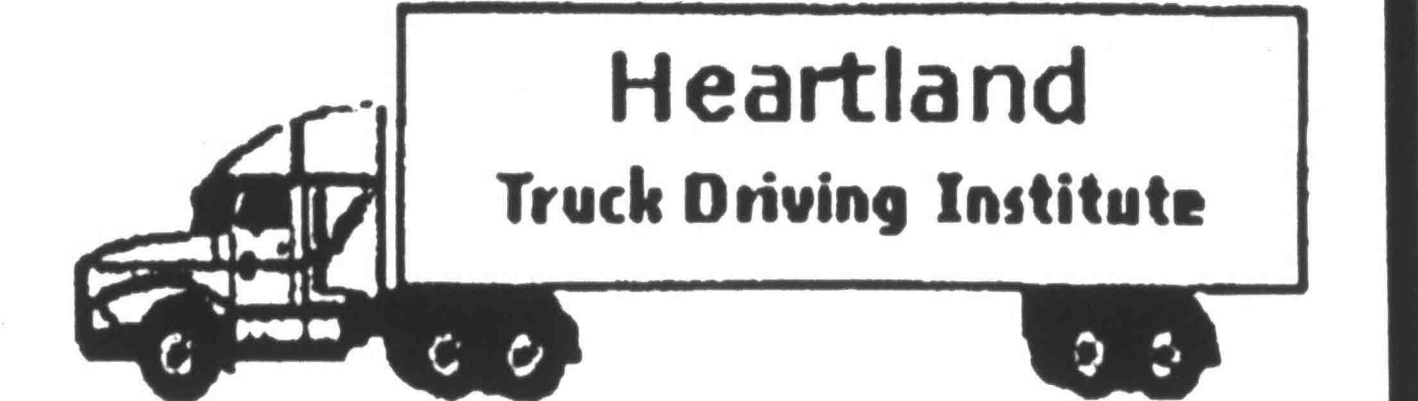

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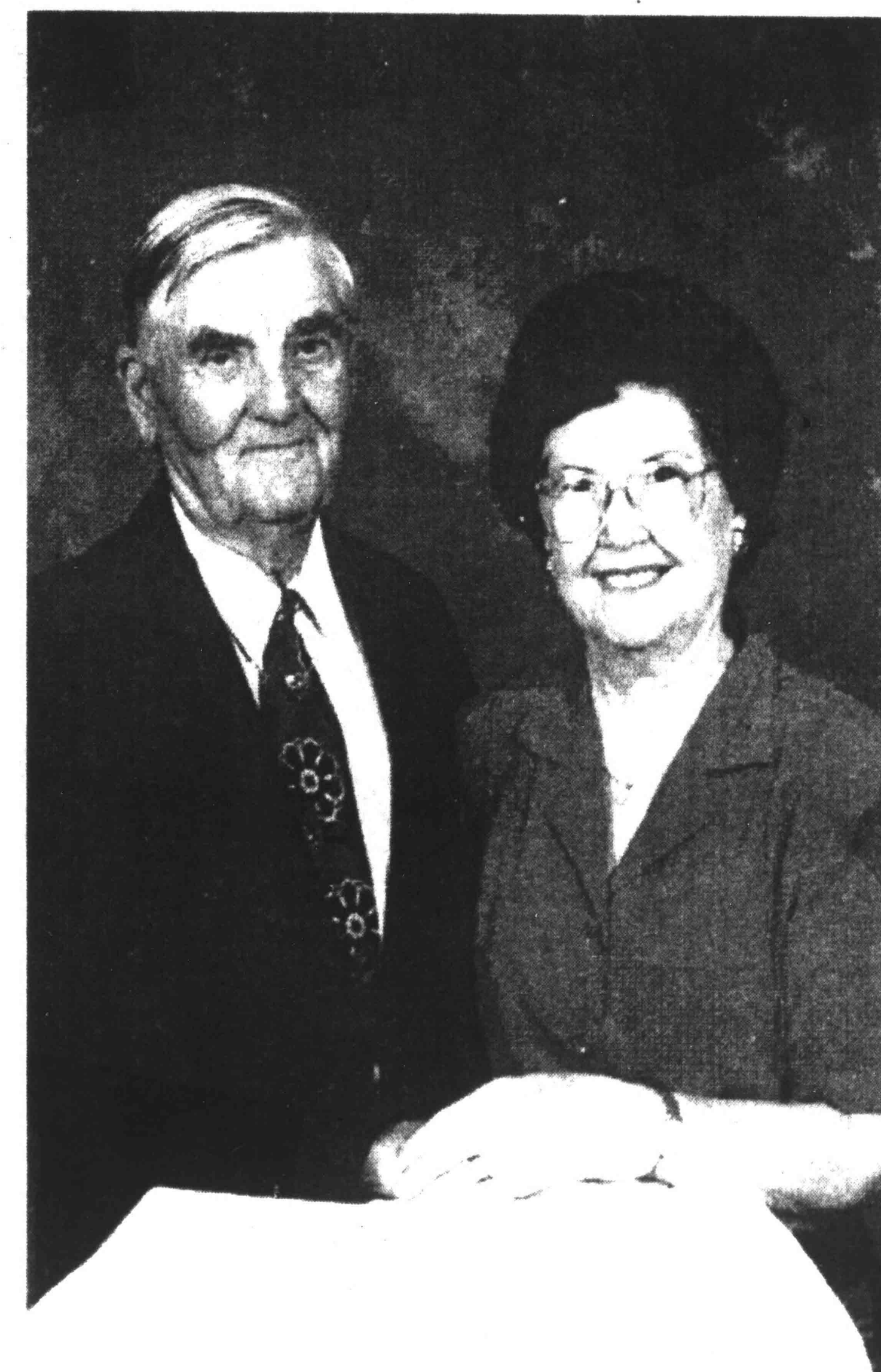

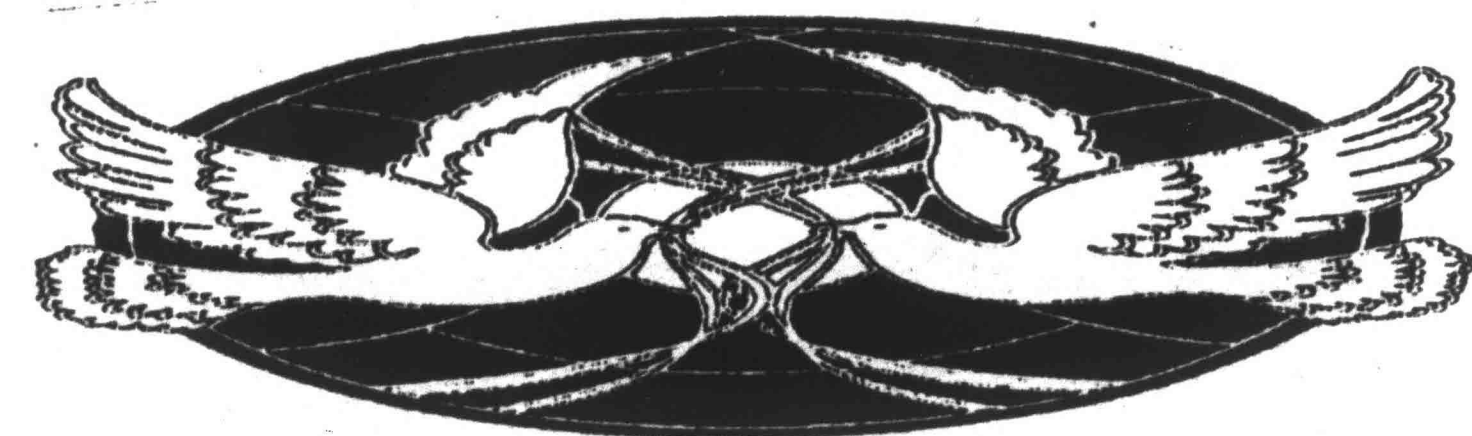

SALES TAX HOLIDAY

Governor Phil Bredesen reports that Tennessee's first annual sales tax holiday was a resounding success for Tennessee families and will help local governments as well. Held August 4th - 6th, the holiday provided valuable financial savings on clothing, school supplies and computers during the back-to-school shopping season. During the sales tax holiday, no state or local sales taxes were charged on most school supplies and clothing priced \$100 or less per item and on computers priced \$1,500 or less. The holiday also included purchases of qualified items bought by mail, telephone, or Internet.

The state's first sales tax holiday saved families an estimated \$14.8 million, as of the latest reporting period. Shoppers did their homework for this back-to-school event, becoming familiar with tax-exempt items, planning ahead, and taking full advantage of this much-deserved tax break. Next year, Tennessee families will have two sales tax holidays: a one-time holiday April 27th - 29th and the second annual holiday August 3rd -

ALTERNATIVE FUELS

Governor Phil Bredesen has announced specifics of Tennessee's alternative fuels initiative to increase production and use of cleaner renewable energy resources. Bredesen has accepted a series of recommendations made by the Alternative Fuels Working Group, which he created by executive order in February 2006, to develop a comprehensive alternative fuels strategy for Tennessee. The working group includes representatives from six state agencies, including the Departments of Agriculture, Economic and Community Development, Environment and Conservation, General Services, Health and Transportation.

The State of Tennessee is also working with Oak Ridge National Laboratory (ORNL) and the University of Tennessee to support their efforts to create a more cost-

effective biofuels production process. ORNL and UT are currently in the process of pursuing biofuels research and development funding from the U.S. Department of Energy and other sources. The steps Bredesen outlined to increase biofuel production and use in Tennessee include: investing in agricultural feedstock processing, creating a retail refueling infrastructure, providing fuel quality assurance, emphasizing education and outreach, and encouraging local government fleets.

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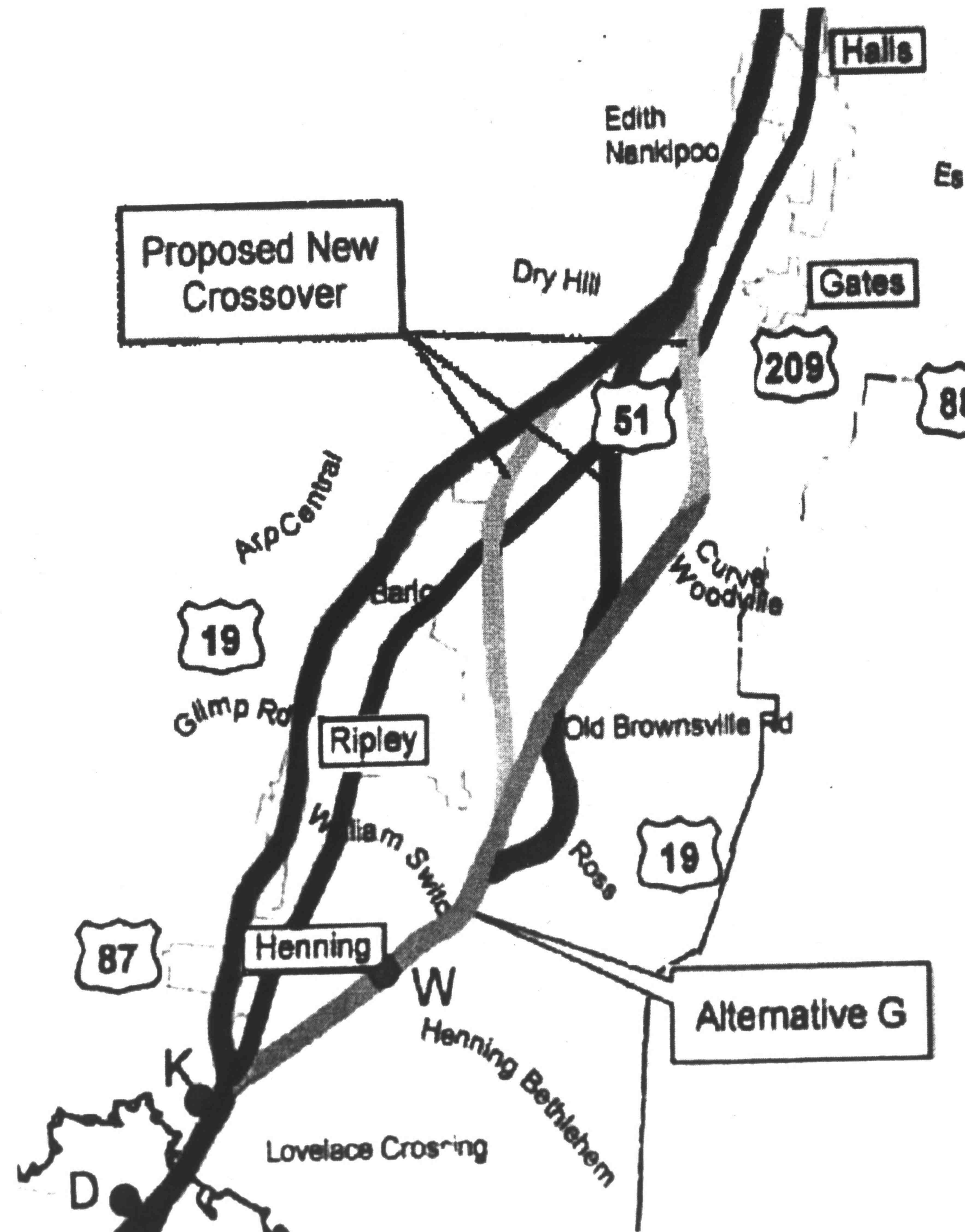

Naked Teens, Parents Missing In Action?

Word comes from Vermont of teen-age nakedness in downtown parking lots, parks, and shops. Apparently teens are taking advantage of the summer sun and Vermont's lax public nudity laws to display their assets. Not everyone is pleased. Some adults have complained vociferously. But according to town leaders, as long as the kids are not breaking any laws, municipal authorities are evidently powerless.

Youthful nudity is nothing new. Remember streaking? Who could forget that craze? Youthful nudity is also a perennial favorite on university campuses nationwide, generally late at night and encouraged by too much to drink. It happens. I'm not dismissing it or endorsing it, just saying it's nothing new.

The thing that seems to be different about the Vermont phenomenon is that these teenagers are in their hometown. Perhaps it's one thing to race naked across the campus commons at midnight when one's lifelong neighbors can't see you, but this action is in broad daylight not far from where these kids live.

My question is where are their parents? Have we progressed so far as a culture that parents are no longer aware, no longer care, or no longer wield any influence? Or worse, are parents supportive of their children's foray into public nudity? It's difficult to say, but it's interesting to note that none of the national news coverage this episode attracted has quoted a single parent.

But before the rest of us become too self-righteous perhaps we should acknowledge that American culture has long since become "modesty-challenged." I've not seen anything on a college campus that I haven't already seen in church. Forty-something mothers are wearing clothing as revealing as anything their daughters are wearing.

Teenage nudity may be episodic, but cultural modesty is an ongoing problem. Where are the parents? Where are our values?

Newman Appointed To Assist Dr. Hunt

In the first evening session, members of the Lauderdale County Commission appointed Carl Eric Newman, director of the Lauderdale County Ambulance Authority, to assist Dr. Joe Hunt, as medical examiner.

In other business, J. Thomas Caldwell, county attorney, discussed the request to resolve the lawsuit between Allied Properties and the county, concerning the tracts of land on which the former Master Casual Wear building was located. The commissioners agreed to transfer the property to the Industrial Development Board and to file a Quit Claim Deed on the property. Allied Properties agreed to pay all back taxes on the property.

A resolution to amend the text of the Lauderdale County Zoning plan to repeal the existing provisions that govern flood hazard areas and replace it with a revised version, as recommend by Federal Emergency Management Agency (FEMA) was approved. "The changes are mostly in the legal wording terms in the flood plan insurance plan for the National Flood Insurance Program, and a savings of the insurance cost from a one-foot to a three-foot requirement for new buildings," said County Mayor Rod Schuh. The county currently has 30% of property in the determined flood plan, according to FEMA.

Jim Jarrett, Homeland Security Director, spoke to the commissioners about the effort in fighting the fire at the former Tupperware plant in Halls. Despite the time and manpower spent at the site, not one person was injured, not even a bandage was dis-

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MAKING A DIFFERENCE COLUMN

To the question, "Why has support for President George W. Bush's performance been declining in the polls?" one might reasonably be expected to respond: "Because people disagree with his policies." And, of course, this answer would be correct.

But like the infomercials say, "But wait! There's more." President Bush is struggling to maintain the focus and support of the American people in part because of the limited range of his communications skills.

Unlike Ronald Reagan who could make people cry or wave the flag simply by reading the phone book, and unlike Bill Clinton who possesses not only exceptional speaking skills but also the gift of empathy - "I feel your pain" - President Bush just can't find the right tone, the right cadence, or the right sound-bite. At least in the public forum and in front of crowds and cameras, a turn-of-phrase just does not come easily to him. Add to this his Texas posture and movement that seem to suggest a cocky swagger (In a light moment of self-deprecating defense Bush said, "In Texas we call it walking").

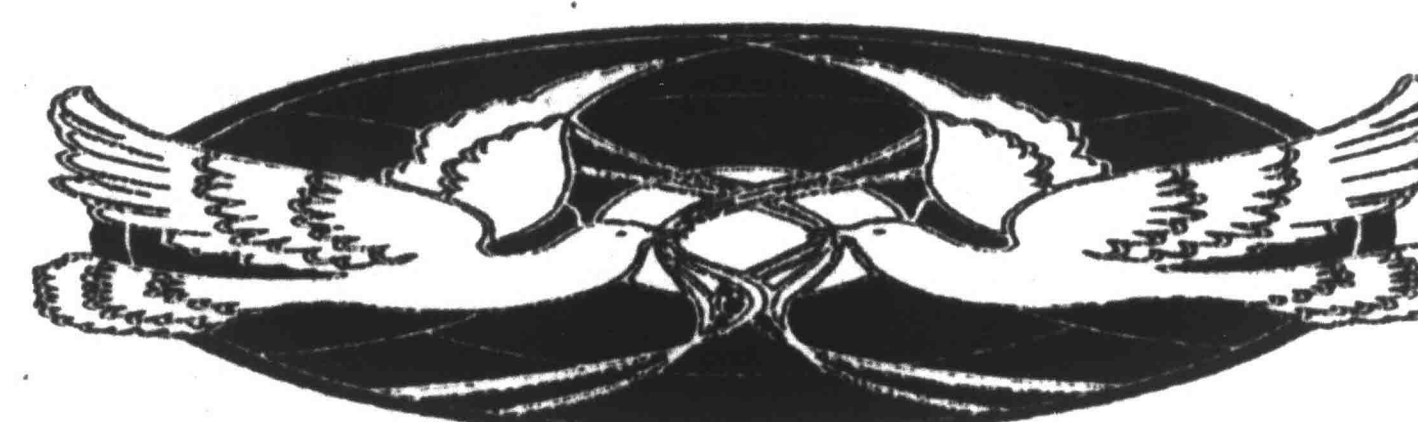
In some sense the man can't help it, and I feel his pain. So what that his walk seems like a strut and his words seemed clipped and strained? Why does it matter that his grin/laugh reminds us of the young fraternity party boy at Yale? Because this is the media age. Because the presidency, the "bully pulpit," demands gravitas. A pulpit needs a preacher, one who shares the good word par excellence. The leader of the free world must be able to speak the King's English, an American version to be sure, but nevertheless be able to articulate ideas and decisions and the rationale for both.

At this point in his life, Bush cannot change his grin/laugh, and is highly unlikely to change his stance and manner of walking, but he might be able to do a better job of communicating. It's not like he's never risen to the occasion. Remember his speech to both Houses of Congress right after 9-11? Masterful.

How does he improve his communication and, thus, his leadership? One, return to the themes closest to his heart, the ideals that took him to the Oval Office, values he has pondered and shared throughout most of his adult life. Two, change his venues. Stop speaking almost exclusively on military bases with soldiers as a backdrop. He should take his ideas to the American people by connecting with everyday Americans, not just those who are duty bound to say, "Yes sir." Three, own his mistakes. Somehow, someday, about something, actually assume responsibility and say, "I'm sorry." The American people are amazingly. Four, be himself, be human, not just the invincible Commander-in-Chief. Be someone to whom the American people can relate.

President Bush yet has time to re-energize his leadership before he and the First Lady take that last flight around the capital on Marine One before heading home to Crawford as "just a citizen." His effectiveness as a leader, and his legacy, are directly tied to whether he can learn to communicate better with those he wants to follow.

Prep Time: 30 minutes

Chill Time: 2 hours
Bake Time: 11 minutes
Yield: 3 dozen cookies

- 3 cups flour
- 1 cup light brown sugar
- ¼ cup Argo Corn Starch or Kingford's Corn Starch
- 1½ Tbsp dried orange peel
- 1 Tbsp ground ginger
- 1 Tbsp pumpkin pie spice
- 1 tsp. baking soda
- ¼ tsp. salt
- 2 Tbsp. molasses
- 1 Tbsp. water
- 1 egg
- 1 cup cold butter, cut into 1-inch pieces
- Icing, sugars and sprinkles

MIX flour, sugar, cornstarch, orange peel, ginger, pumpkin pie spice, baking soda and salt in a large mixing bowl. Whisk molasses, water and egg in small bowl; set aside.

POUR molasses mixture over flour; beat with mixer until dough forms a ball. Knead for 2 to 3 minutes until smooth. Divide in half, wrap in plastic wrap. Chill a minimum of 2 hours.

CUT butter into flour mixture using a pastry blender or 2 knives until the mixture resembles coarse meal.

ROLL dough on lightly floured surface to ¼ inch thickness. Cut with cookie cutters. Place on baking sheets.

BAKE for 11 to 13 minutes in a preheated 350° F oven. Cool on wire racks. **DECORATE** as desired with icings, sugars and sprinkles.

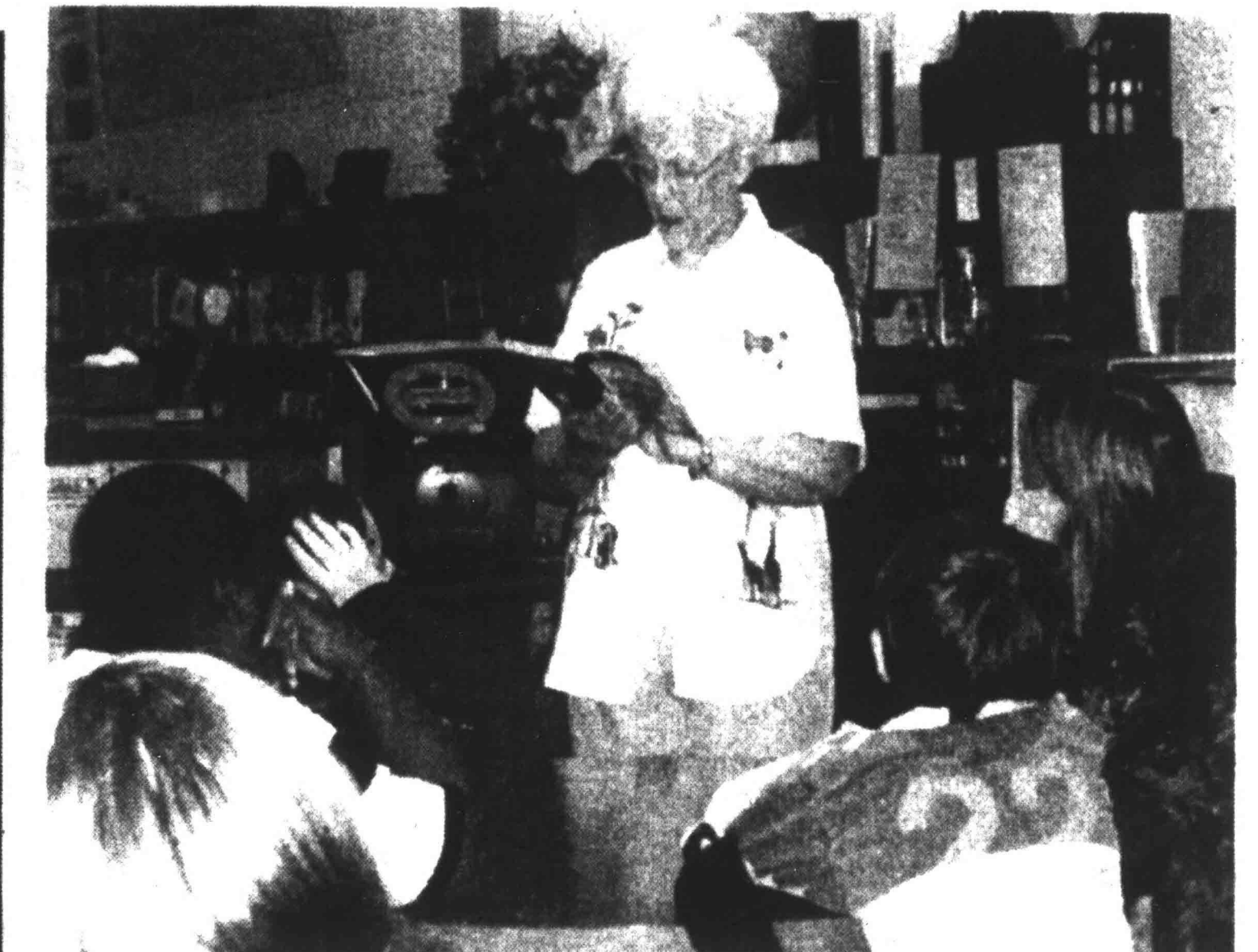

Cows Got A Bum Steer And Humans Should Know Better

Whenever something goes wrong with mankind, one of the first places scientists seem to look is in the barn lot. If a sickness is reported we blame it on the meat we ate last night or from the water that just happened to come from the stream that passes by farmer Brown's place.

We give farm animal names to our illnesses such as swine flu, chicken pox, and mad-cow disease. When Chicago burned they blamed it on poor old Miss O Leary's cow, who has been proven not guilty in recent years. However, you still hear bad reports from the media on that mistaken identity crime report which has caused that innocent bovine to suffer much mental anguish. It is time we give our farm animals a break.

In a news report a few years back from out of the mid-west, cattle were blamed for something they had nothing to do with on purpose. It seems a group of people had a dinner-on-the-grounds meeting in a cow pasture and a lot of the attendees came down sick from e-coli. The cattle had been removed from the field several days earlier and their carefully deposited "remains" had been cleared from the field. At least that is what the event attendees assumed and most of us

know that total removal would have been impossible.

People attending the summer get-together used the field for a picnic along with a concert. Many of them had to go to the hospital due to severe stomach distress. No one took the blame for poorly cooked food, mis-handled utensils, failure to wash their hands properly, or just the fact that someone decided to eat lunch in the same pasture that the previous cows, who abode there for several months, went to potty in. Instead, they blamed the cows for messing up the ground as cows will do.

In my opinion, the cows were given a bum steer in that news story. The cows did what they do naturally. They eat green grass and give white milk, (which I consider a miracle anyway), and leave behind the unused portion. They have done this since the creation of time and why should they change now.

My question with that story has always been why spread your meal in the middle of possible e-coli infestation to begin with? I have camped in cow pastures, played sports in cow pastures, walked bare footed in cow pastures, and having been practically reared in a cow pasture, I guess I have been inoculated for many illnesses modern day generations have been spared from.

I always wondered after reading the story if the attendees of that event placed their food on the ground, which would have been pretty dumb, or did they have a cow chip throwing contest before lunch?

For some reason no one ever questioned the people who got sick. Instead, they blamed the cows who only did what they do because they do. Know what I mean?

I guess we have become so removed from the farm that we no longer know that if you play with the pigs, or cows in this case, you are going to get dirty. Today's society does not have the same immune system we had forty years ago and at times the least little thing can make us sick. We just have to be more careful these days.

E-coli is dangerous and is not something to take a chance on. The recent outbreak in spinach is a good example that care has to be taken to prevent e-coli. But let's not forget that humans seem to spread it by carelessness much more than our farm animals. I have never seen a cow in a kitchen with unwashed hoofs or being cited by the health department for not using a hair net.

The problem in many cases is not the cows or the farm, but bad choices made by ourselves. E-coli shows up very often in our well water

sources and usually comes from our own septic systems or other systems located in the area. Human error is the problem here and not the cow's fault.

We are now discovering that wildlife waste is also becoming a major water polluter around the country. With increased, unnaturally high populations of deer, turkeys and geese living close to suburbs and being fed, as well as protected, many streams and water sources are becoming polluted. And, it is very unpopular in many areas to reduce those wildlife populations. But, they are a source of e-coli contamination and now, maybe more a threat than livestock numbers. Livestock numbers can be monitored, controlled, and fenced away from foods that could receive contamination.

That story from the dinner-on-the-grounds was one that should not have happened and was "udderly" ridiculous. We all need to practice safe food handling and avoid situations that could make us sick. It is time to let the cows have their pasture back, or at least, let them party until the humans come home.

Amendment 2 In 8-A Race: JCS Becomes Law At Lake County

Amendment 2, the ballot issue enabling property tax relief for senior citizens, also known as the 'Senior Citizen Homestead Exemption', has passed by the required margin to amend Tennessee's constitution and become law. It will enable homeowners aged 65 or older to qualify for a freeze on their property taxes. Qualifying homeowners continue to pay their current level of property tax, but are exempted from future increases.

"I am filing a bill which sets up the necessary structure," Senator Mark Norris (R-Collierville) said. "After amending the constitution, we must now work out the details to provide counties and municipalities the option of participating."

Senator Norris, who sponsored and passed the legislation through two consecutive legislative sessions, expressed gratitude to the voters and members of the General Assembly who supported the referendum. Norris represents Dyer, Lauderdale, Shelby and Tipton counties in the Tennessee Senate.

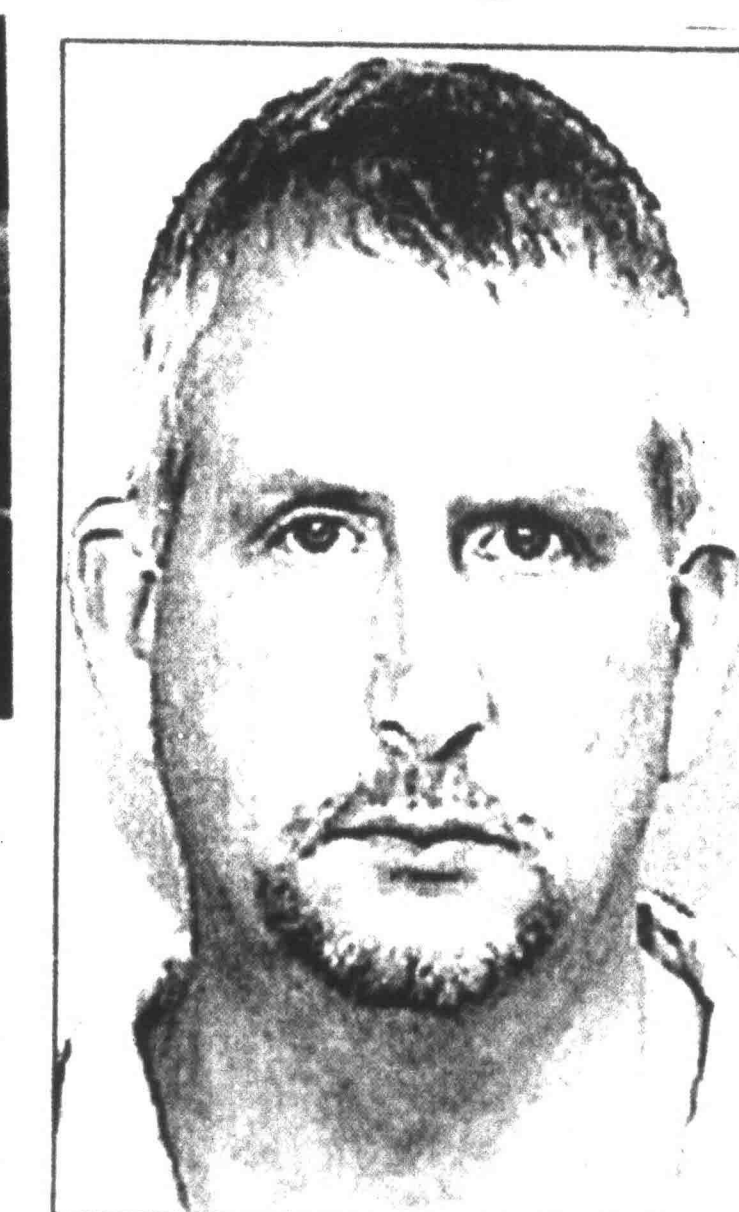

Skinny Turkeys Leave Some School Programs Without Thanksgiving's Main Course

A long, hot summer has left this time of the year's favorite bird somewhat on the skinny side. Due to summer's stress on the nation's turkey population, the birds have come up somewhat smaller and in a lesser availability for the government funded reduced price lunch program nationwide.

In a recent story from Libby Quaid at Associated Press, she reports that there is not a shortage of turkey for the average consumer, but due to availability, USDA will not be supplying turkey as it has in the past for the Agriculture Department's school lunch program. The program provides free and reduced-price meals for millions of children nationwide and is based on family incomes.

Having had a mother who was a school cafeteria manager for over 35 years, I do understand how many schools depend on the program for supplying much needed commodities. USDA provides surplus food to government funded school hot-meal programs whenever there is over abundance of production on our nation's farms. Commercial suppliers usually get first

choice on commodities on the open market and this year turkeys became the commodity of choice. However, many school systems prepared for the lack of turkey this time of the year, which administrators say happens quite often, and have purchased their own turkeys to avoid the "year without a turkey" disaster.

Being like those schools who went out and bought their own turkeys so that Thanksgiving will go on, I also once again ventured into a grocery store to participate in the 21st Annual American Farm Bureau Federation Thanksgiving Dinner Survey. Just as our forefathers did at the first Thanksgiving, I also braved hostiles to get the information needed to prepare the survey that determines the average cost of this year's feast.

However, the hostiles I encountered were homemakers trying to get home to prepare their family's evening meal. They had no interest in my scratch pad and my inability to locate the dairy case or how to find a 9" frozen pie shell.

But, even after being stiff-armed at the turkey display case and told what I could do with my survey, the results are now in. Tennessee was counted and I will soon recover from being run over by a grocery cart containing three weeks of a family of ten's grocery supplies.

According to the American Farm Bureau Federation's (AFBF) annual informal survey of the price of basic items needed to prepare a traditional Thanksgiving Day meal, the average cost of preparing this year's feast for 10 is \$38.10, a \$1.32 increase from last year's \$36.78 average. That's a 3.5 percent increase and is due to higher energy prices affecting processing, packaging and shipping costs for food.

The AFBF survey shopping list included turkey, stuffing, sweet potatoes, rolls with butter, peas, cranberries, a relish tray including carrots and celery, pumpkin pie with whipped cream and beverages of coffee or milk in quantities sufficient for a family of 10.

The cost of a 16-pound turkey, at \$15.70, or roughly 98 cents per pound, reflects an increase of 59 cents per turkey over the 2005 average. Next year we have got to get those turkeys off of their diet plan.

A majority of items on the survey increased in average price. Fresh cranberries, sweet potatoes, pie mix and pie shells, peas, stuffing and rolls all slightly increased in price this year. Once again, fuel costs were involved.

However, whole milk, whipping cream and a group of miscellaneous items used to make the meal dropped

slightly in price.

The AFBF Thanksgiving Meal Cost Survey is unscientific, but prices reflect actual trends across the nation. Bargain shoppers in all areas should be able to purchase individual menu items at comparable prices to the Farm Bureau survey averages. Survey results are based on the best in-store price, excluding special deals or promotional coupons. Farm Bureau's survey menu has remained constant since 1986 to allow for consistent price comparisons.

This year, it is reported that more people will be having their meal at home, which is the way it should be. As you gather around the table and offer your prayers of thanks, remember our country, those we have lost and our soldiers in foreign fields of war. And be sure to ask God to continue to bless America.

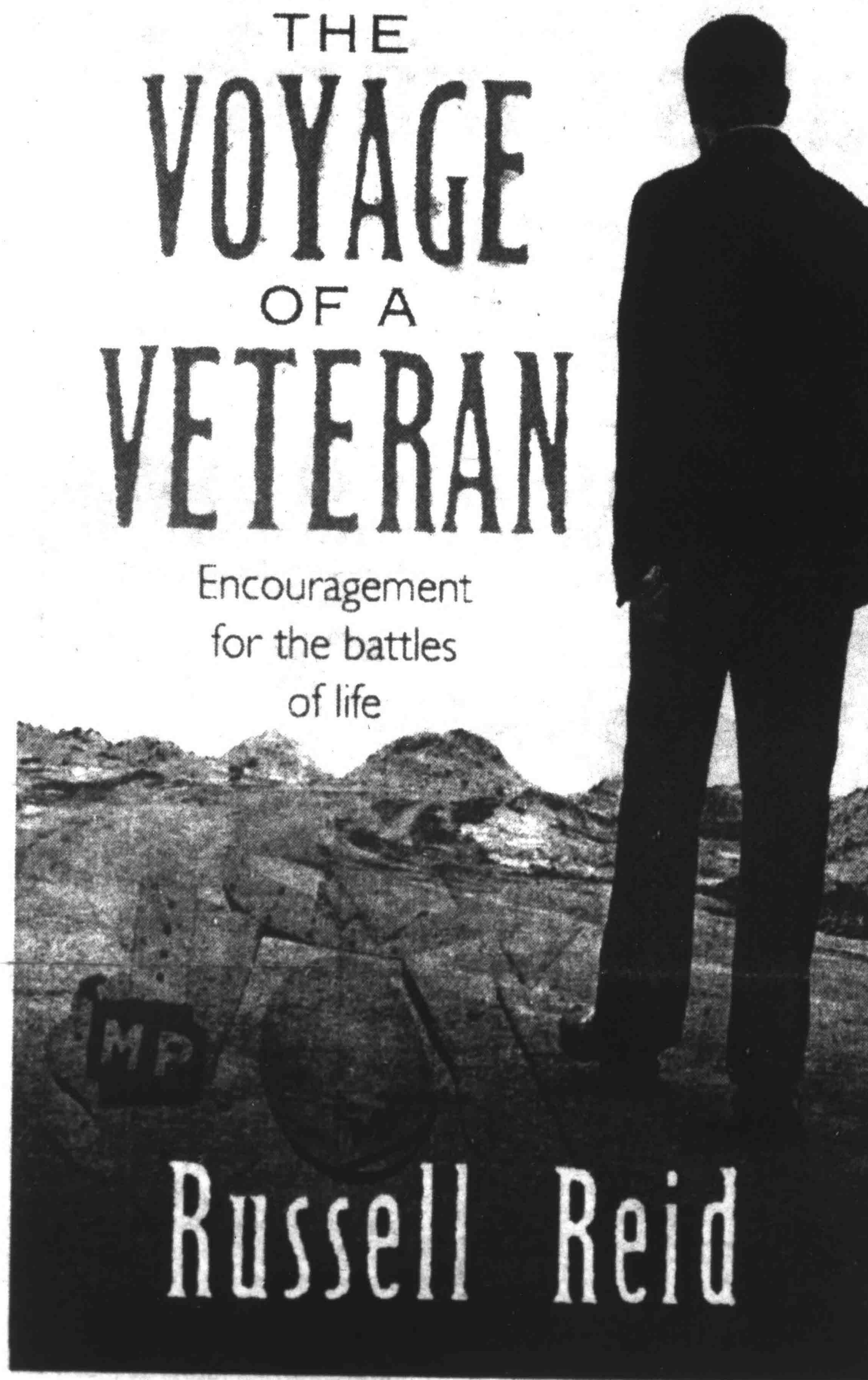

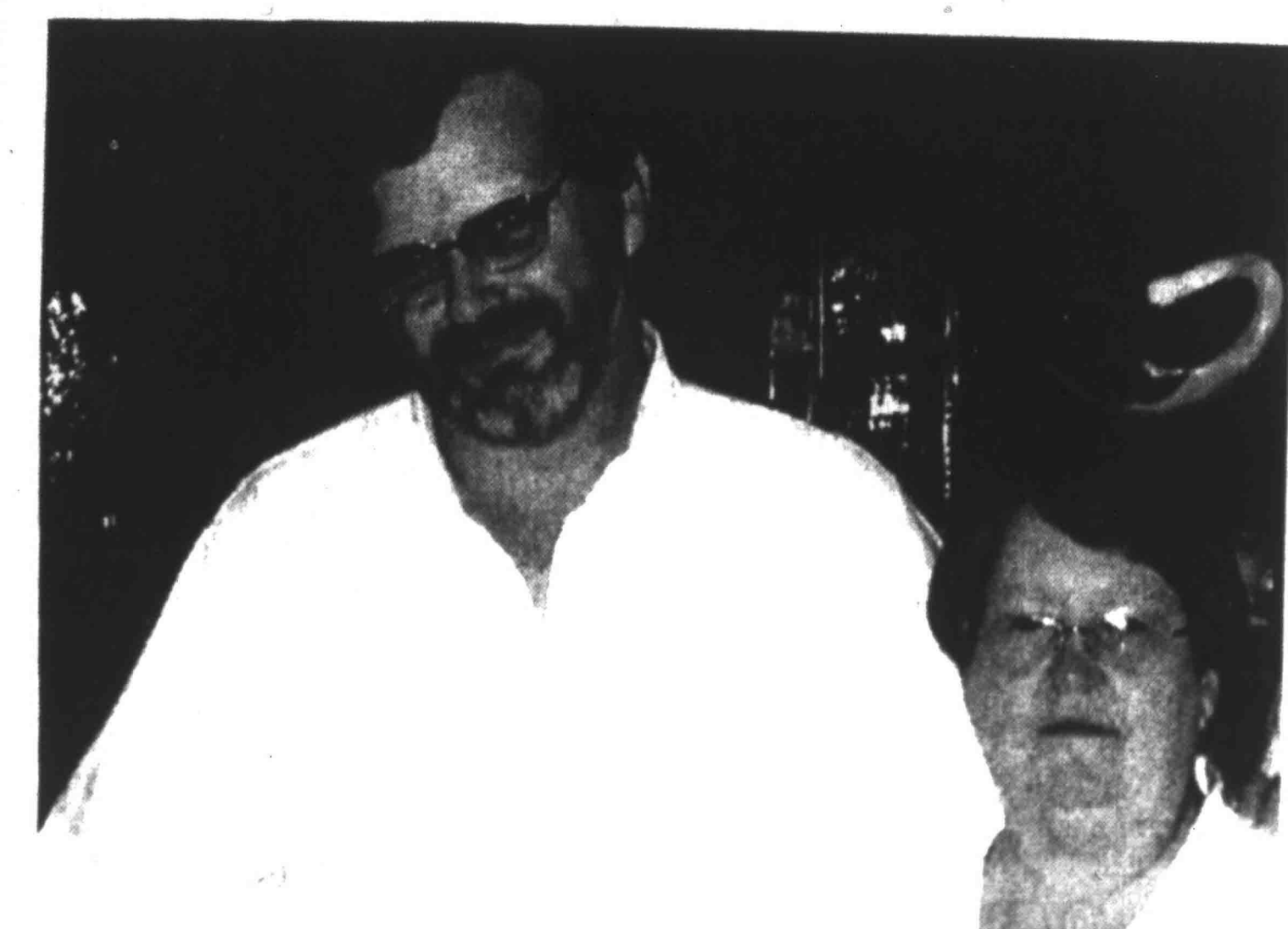

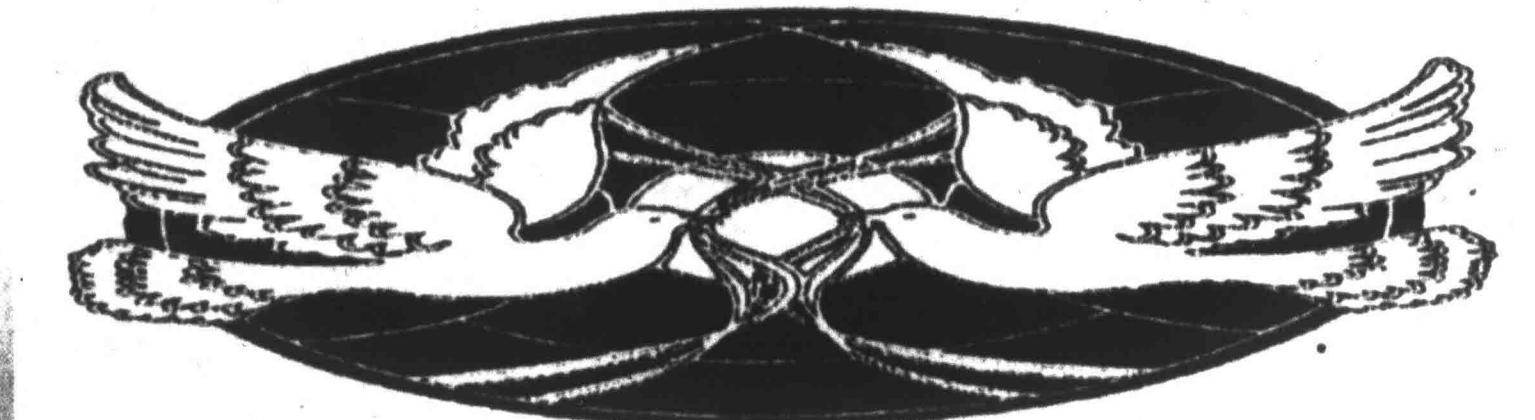

Utility Assistance For Winter Season

The Tennessee Department of Human Services is working with 19 community service agencies across the state to help those less fortunate get through the cold winter months. The Low Income Home Energy Assistance Program (LIHEAP) is a utility assistance program for eligible individuals and families, who must sign up with their local agency for assistance. Priority is given to individuals with disabilities, the elderly and low income families with children under 6-years old.

LIHEAP is 100% federally funded through a grant from the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services. Eligibility for LIHEAP benefits is based on established federal poverty guidelines, and documentation of household income is required. Tennesseans, whose household income does not exceed 125 percent of federal poverty guidelines (that's \$25,000/year for a family of four), are potentially eligible for the program. The assistance does not go directly to the client. Instead, it is made in the form of a payment to the utility company or home energy provider. If eligible, the client could receive up to two payments a year.

Dual enrollment is the enrollment of a high school student in one or more specified college courses for which the student will be awarded both high school and college credit; joint enrollment is for college credit only. For more information, contact the Office of Admissions & Records at (731) 286-3330 or your guidance counselor.

ADVISING CENTER

If you have applied for admission for 2007 Spring or if you were enrolled at DSCC in 2006 Fall, you can register for classes at the Advising Center, which is located in Room 108 of the Student Center. The Center will be open from 9:00 a.m. until 1:00 p.m. from December 18-20 and from January 2-4 and January 9-11. You do not need an appointment to meet with an advisor. Please arrive at the Advising Center no later than 12:15 p.m. to be advised.

AUDITING A CLASS

If you wish to audit a class, you may not register for the class until "Last Chance" Registration. Individuals under the age of 17 may not audit any class without the written permission of the instructor and the Division Dean. Developmental Studies courses cannot be taken for audit. Only those 60 years of age or older may audit Physical Education courses.

CLASS ATTENDANCE & OUTSIDE STUDY

Successful completion of college-level courses requires a specified amount of study outside the classroom as well as within the classroom. Successful completion of a degree program is dependent upon the student's commitment to study beyond the classroom.

When you register for a class and do not attend, you will receive a grade of "F" unless you officially drop. Refer to the DSCC Catalog or contact the Office of Admissions & Records for more information.

CLASS CANCELLATIONS AND CHANGES

Dyersburg State Community College reserves the right to cancel classes that do not have sufficient enrollment. Divisions offering more than one section of the same course may close sections as necessary to promote the most effective instruction. Instructor assignments are also subject to change.

While this schedule of classes has been prepared on the basis of the most current information at the time of printing, the schedule is subject to change without notice, obligation or liability.

two doses of Measles, Mumps, and Rubella vaccines, administered on or after the first birthday, is required for attendance to all universities and colleges with an enrollment of greater than two hundred students. Students who are required to provide proof of immunization will be contacted by the Office of Admissions & Records.

If you are interested in taking an English or a mathematics course, please bring a copy of your transcript or grade report to indicate that you have successfully completed college-level English or mathematics or a bring a copy of your ACT scores if they are not yet three years old.

Tennessee state employees wishing to use the Public Higher Education Fee Waiver for employees of the State of Tennessee and TBR/UT employees wishing to use the PC191 can register no earlier than four weeks prior to the first day of classes.

GENERAL INFORMATION FOR ALL STUDENTS

ACT

The ACT is required if you are a first-time college student under 21 years of age and plan to work toward a degree. There is no minimum score for the ACT; however, official scores must be submitted to the Office of Admissions & Records if you are under 21. ACT scores will be used to determine if you will be required to complete developmental studies classes prior to taking college-level classes.

Any student scoring below 19 on the English subtest will be required to register for Basic or Developmental Writing, depending on the exact score. Students scoring below 19 on the mathematics subtest will register for Pre-Algebra, Basic Algebra, or Intermediate Algebra according to the score received. Students scoring below 19 on the reading subtest will register for either Basic or Developmental Reading. Students required to register for any two disciplines (English, mathematics, or reading) will also be required to complete a Learning Strategies (Study Skills) course.

If you are under 21 and degree-seeking but have not taken the ACT, you can take a Residual ACT.

Residual ACT Testing

Cost is \$27.00.
Appointments necessary.
Residual ACT scores cannot be transferred to other institutions.
Residual ACT scores cannot be used for consideration of eligibility for any Tennessee Educational Lottery Scholarships.

COL 101 - THE COLLEGE EXPERIENCE: TEAMWORK

COL 101 is required for all degree-seeking freshmen who begin their college experience at Dyersburg State Community College and all degree-seeking transfer students who have not earned any college-level hours. This course promotes and develops success in college and the workplace through an orientation to the educational process and teamwork and leadership practices. Readings and class assignments are designed to maximize benefits gained from the college experience and demonstrate the connection between success in college and the workplace.

COMPUTERIZED PLACEMENT ASSESSMENT & SUPPORT SYSTEM (COMPASS) TEST

The Computerized Placement Assessment & Support System (COMPASS) test measures competency in English, reading, and mathematics. Degree-seeking students who are 21 or over may be required to take the COMPASS test. There is no charge for taking the test, but the Office of Admissions & Records needs your Application for Admission prior to testing. CONFIDENTIALITY OF STUDENT RECORDS

DSCC regards a student's academic record as confidential. The release of information contained in the record is governed by Federal Law, known as the Family

Educational Rights and Privacy Act (FERPA). Directory information such as the student's name, address, telephone listing, e-mail address, date and place of birth, major field of study, participation in officially recognized activities and sports, weight and height of members of athletic teams, dates of attendance, degrees and awards received, and the most recent previous educational agency or institution attended by the student will be released unless the student has asked DSCC to withhold such information. If you do not want directory information released, please provide written notification to the Office of Admissions & Records.

The law does provide for the release of information to authorized college personnel, other institutions engaged in research (provided information is not revealed to any other parties), and certain federal and state government officials. If you have questions concerning the provisions of this act, contact the Office of Admissions & Records.

COST OF ATTENDANCE AT DSCC

During the 2006-2007 academic year all students, whether residents or non-residents of Tennessee, will pay a maintenance fee of \$95 per semester hour not to exceed \$1115 per semester. There is also a \$10 Facilities Assessment Fee for all students and a \$3 student activity fee for students enrolling in seven or more hours. A Technology Access Fee is assessed based on the number of credit hours in which the student enrolls. The fee varies from \$72 for three credit hours to \$90 for four credit hours to \$112.50 for five or more credit hours. For DSCC online courses, there is an additional fee of \$22.75 per credit hour; for RODP courses, there is an additional fee of \$39 per credit hour. For students who register after the first day of class, there is a \$10 Late Fee.

Tuition is charged to students who are not residents of Tennessee except for residents of Pemiscot and Dunklin Counties in Missouri and Mississippi County in Arkansas. In addition to the maintenance fees listed previously, students who are classified as out-of-state for fee-paying purposes must pay \$289 per semester hour, not to exceed \$3338 per semester. As with other fees, the amount of tuition is subject to change.

DEFERRED PAYMENT PLAN

Students enrolled for at least 6 credit hours may request deferment of up to 50% of their fee balance (after any financial aid or fee waivers are deducted). The minimum down payment of 50% of the fee balance is due by January 5, 2007. The amount deferred will be payable in two monthly installments due February 28 and March 31, 2007. There is a \$10 service fee also due on January 10. An additional late payment charge of \$25 (up to a maximum of \$100) will be assessed for each installment not paid on or before the due date.

Students who register after January 10 and wish to use the new deferred payment plan must pay the \$10 service fee and 50% of the fees at the time of their registration.

DROPPING COURSES

If you need to drop a class, doing so will be possible provided it is within the class-drop period. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for deadlines to drop.

Dropping DSCC Spring classes and RODP Spring classes is available on the Web. Failure to drop a course which you stop attending will result in a grade of "F". If assistance is needed in dropping, check with the Office of Admissions & Records or with the Gibson County Center or the DSCC Jimmy Naifeh Center at Tipton County Center for more information.

After the first day of classes, Developmental Studies courses cannot be dropped on the Web. Under extenuating circumstances, however, a course may be dropped with the approval of the advisor and the Director of Developmental Studies.

Courses may be dropped without a grade through approximately the first two weeks (14 calendar days beginning with the first day of class). After this time, a grade of "W" is given if the course is officially dropped. If you are a Tennessee Education Lottery Scholarship (TELS) recipient, dropping a class after the fourteenth calendar day will count as Attempted Hours in your TELS Attempted Hours. Drops before the fourteenth day will not count as Attempted Hours.

DROPPING COURSES VS. COMPLETE WITHDRAWAL FROM THE COLLEGE

If you are enrolled in only one course and do not want to remain in that course or if you wish to withdraw from all courses, you can withdraw on the Web, unless you

Continued eligibility

The student must file the FAFSA each year prior to May 1.

The student must achieve a Cumulative GPA of 2.75 in the semester in which he/she has attempted a total of 24 credit hours.

The student must achieve a Cumulative GPA of 3.00 in the semesters in which he/she has attempted a total of 48, 72, 96, and 120 hours.

Cumulative GPA and attempted hours for TELS eligibility differ from Cumulative GPA and attempted hours for academic purposes. The following chart shows how credit hours attempted affect TELS attempted hours and the calculation of TELS GPA:

* For TELS purposes, the census date for a semester or term shall be the 14th day of class.

Loss of eligibility

It is the student's responsibility to know the factors which may cause him or her to lose a TELS award. Some, but not all, factors are:

The student fails to achieve the required cumulative GPA for a benchmark semester.

Note: If for some reason a student who loses TELS due to GPA subsequently has a grade changed that results in a higher cumulative GPA, he/she may request reinstatement by submitting the TELS Reinstatement Request – Grade Change to the Financial Aid Office within 30 days of the grade change. On the other hand, if a student who at first qualifies for TELS for a semester, then a grade change results in a GPA lower than the required GPA, that student loses the TELS for that semester and all subsequent semesters. There is no appeal for this circumstance.

The student does not maintain continuous enrollment, defined as enrollment in both fall and spring semesters of an academic year. Exceptions may be made if the student is granted a Leave of Absence for certain documented medical or personal reasons. A student must submit the TELS Leave of Absence Request to the Financial Aid Office to obtain approval.

The student drops from full-time to part-time within a semester without prior approval. A student should submit a TELS Request for Change of Enrollment Status to the Financial Aid Office for review by the Institutional Review Panel for approval before dropping to part-time. If a student fails to obtain prior approval, or if request for prior approval is denied and the student drops to part-time anyway, the TELS award for that semester will be prorated and the student will not be eligible for TELS in any subsequent semester.

The student has attempted a total of 120 credit hours, earned his/her baccalaureate degree, or five calendar years have passed from the student's initial start in the TELS program.

A student who has been denied TELS because of loss of eligibility may appeal to DSCC's TELS Institutional Review Panel (IRP) if he/she has certain documented medical or personal reasons. The IRP will either approve the appeal, or request a

are withdrawing from Developmental Studies courses. You must complete a Permission to Withdraw form and obtain the approval of the advisor and the Director of Developmental Studies to withdraw from developmental courses after the first day of classes. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records and the Gibson and Tipton County Centers. Failure to withdraw officially from school will result in an automatic grade of "F" in all courses. Please refer to the Academic Calendar in this schedule for the deadline to drop.

EMAIL ADDRESS FOR STUDENT MAIL, WEBCT AND P-COUNTER

As a DSCC student, you will have an email address which will enable you to receive email about activities at DSCC. This address is printed on the receipt that you will get from the Business Office when you pay your fees. To login to your DSCC email account, look for your email address on your receipt and go to www.DSCC.edu. Then click Student Email. You will be prompted for your User ID and Password. Your User ID is printed to the left of the @ sign, and your Password is the same as what you use to access Student Self Serve (usually your date of birth). If you need to access WebCT for a course, your User ID and Password will be the same as your email login information. Also, you will need this login information for printing in any DSCC computer lab.

FEE PAYMENT - SEE ALSO FINANCIAL AID

Spring fees may be paid at the time you register unless you are expecting to receive financial aid – including scholarships. For pre-registered students, the deadline to pay by cash, check or credit card is January 5, 2007. Students paying by financial aid – including scholarships – should consult the information under Financial Aid.

FINANCIAL AID

If you have not applied for financial aid and are interested in applying, information can be obtained from the Financial Aid Office, located in the Student Center. Their number is (731) 286-3263.

Eligible pre-registered students who make no adjustments to their schedule may pick up Financial Aid checks according to the following schedule:

All other students receiving financial aid may pick up checks at their respective campus **NO EARLIER** than ten days after classes begin. The Business Office must receive evidence of class attendance for students who received an award of Federal Financial Aid (including loans) to disburse a check. Your financial aid will be used first to pay your fees.

If you expect to receive financial aid, your instructors will verify your attendance – all you need to do is attend class. Instructors do not need to sign or initial your class schedule. Please understand that your instructor's teaching schedule will not allow him/her to verify your attendance immediately after your class ends. Many instructors teach back-to-back classes and will need time to verify attendance for ALL their students.

DYERSBURG STATE COMMUNITY COLLEGE POLICIES AND PROCEDURES FOR TN EDUCATIONAL LOTTERY SCHOLARSHIP (TELS) AWARDS

The following Policies and Procedures have been developed to comply with Tennessee Code Annotated, Title 49, Chapter 4, amended, and the current financial aid practices of Dyersburg State Community College. The effective date is fall semester, 2004.

Awarding and disbursing TELS funds

TELS awards will not be included in a student's award package until the student's name appears on the Tennessee Student Assistance Corporation (TSAC) official TELS Roster for Dyersburg State Community College and/or is certified as eligible.

TELS awards will be disbursed (credited to the student's account) when the funds are received by Dyersburg State Community College.

Credit balances resulting from a TELS award will not be refunded to the student until after TELS funds have been received from TSAC.

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hearing. If the appeal is ultimately denied by DSCC's IRP, the student may further appeal the case to the IRP of TSAC. Appeal for reinstatement of eligibility is made by submitting the TELS Appeal Form to the Financial Aid Office.

A student who is unable to timely enroll in an eligible postsecondary institution due to medical or personal reasons may appeal to the Institutional Review Panel for an exception. Approval can only be granted when there are documented medical or personal grounds. Appeal for an exemption of timely enrollment may be requested by submitting the TELS Request for Exemption of Timely Enrollment to the Financial Aid Office.

Once a student has lost a TELS Award for academic reasons, he/she may reestablish eligibility at the next subsequent credit hour checkpoint following the original loss of the award. Students may regain their award one time only. GAMS scholars who regain return at the HOPE level only. In order to regain eligibility, a student must maintain continuous enrollment.

Dyersburg State will in no case replace TELS funds for which the student has failed to meet continued eligibility requirements with institutionally controlled funds.

Transient students (Concurrent Enrollment)

A DSCC student enrolled in another eligible institution at the same time he is enrolled at DSCC will be eligible to receive one award for the total number of enrolled hours.

The four-year institution would be considered the home institution. A student wishing to receive TELS funding for concurrent enrollment must contact the home institution for approval and follow their policies and procedures for receiving funds for concurrent enrollment.

ELIGIBILITY FOR DEFERMENT OF PAYMENT OF TUITION AND FEES BY CERTAIN ELIGIBLE STUDENTS RECEIVING US DEPARTMENT OF VETERANS AFFAIRS OR OTHER GOVERNMENTALLY FUNDED EDUCATIONAL ASSISTANCE BENEFITS

Service members, veterans, and dependents of veterans who are eligible beneficiaries of US Department of Veterans Affairs education benefits or other governmentally funded educational assistance, subject to the conditions and guidelines set forth in Tennessee Code Annotated 49-7-104 as amended, may elect, upon formal application, to defer payment of required tuition and fees until the final day of the term for which the deferment has been requested. Application for the deferment must be made no later than 14 days after the beginning of the term, and the amount of the deferment shall not exceed the total monetary benefits to be received for the term. Students who have been granted deferments are expected to make timely payments on their outstanding tuition and fees balance once education benefits are being delivered, and eligibility for such deferment shall terminate if the student fails to abide by any applicable rule or regulation, or to act in good faith in making timely payments. This notice is published pursuant to Public Chapter 279, Acts of 2003, effective July 1, 2003.

GENERAL EDUCATION CORE CURRICULUM

Each institution in the State University and Community College System of Tennessee (The Tennessee Board of Regents) shares a common lower-division general education core curriculum of forty-one semester hours for baccalaureate degrees and the Associate of Arts and the Associate of Science degrees. These institutions also share a common lower-division general education core curriculum of 15-17 semester hours for the Associate of Applied Science degree. Consult the DSCC Catalog for more information.

GRADES AT TERM'S END

Your grades will not be mailed at the end of the term but are accessible online. To access your grades, you will need your Social Security Number and your Personal Identification Number (PIN). If you need to provide a copy of your grades to your employer, request an official copy of your transcript to be mailed directly to the employer. This written request can be made at any time during the term. To protect the confidential nature of the student's records, no grades will be released by phone. Grades will not be available until all debts or obligations owed to the College have been satisfied.

GRADUATION CANDIDATES

If you are expecting to complete course requirements at the end of 2006 Fall, 2007 Spring, or 2007 Summer, you should submit an Intent to Graduate form to the Office of Admissions & Records **immediately**. Cap and gown information also should be submitted to the DSCC Bookstore on the Dyersburg Campus as soon as possible but before March 1, 2007. Forms are available in the Office of Admissions & Records or at the Gibson County Center and the DSCC Jimmy Naifeh Center at Tipton County.

HONORS PROGRAM

The Honors Program provides exceptional educational opportunities for highly motivated and well-prepared students. The program works individually with students in planning their educational experiences at Dyersburg State Community College. Students may earn Honors distinction by meeting these requirements: completion of a minimum of 12 hours of Honors course work; participation in the Honors Seminar; and participation in at least 2-3 special college educational/cultural events a year. To become a member of the Honors program, an incoming freshman must have a minimum ACT composite of 26 and a 3.5 high school grade point average (GPA). An existing student must have a minimum GPA of 3.5. To remain in the program, a student must maintain a minimum GPA of 3.5. An appropriate Honors distinction is indicated on the student's transcript and is recognized at graduation. For more information about the Honors Program, contact Mr. Bob Lhota at (731) 286-3226.

POSSESSION OF WEAPONS

T.C.A. 39-17-1309 prohibits the possession of weapons, including firearms, on any property owned, used or operated by Dyersburg State Community College. Furthermore, State Law prescribes a maximum penalty of six (6) years imprisonment and a fine not to exceed three thousand dollars (\$3000) for carrying weapons on school property.

REFUND POLICY

Refund procedures for maintenance fees and out-of-state tuition fees are outlined below. (All other fees are non-refundable).

Change of student's status which requires refund:

- A. Change in a full-time student's schedule which results in reclassification to part-time student status.
- B. Change in a part-time student's schedule which results in a class load of fewer hours during a refund period.

Other situations which require a refund:

- A. Withdrawing from the institution within the refund period.
- B. Cancellation of a class by the institution.
- C. Death of the student.

REFUND PROCEDURES

Refunds will be calculated for up to 60% of the term for first-time students at DSCC who withdraw from school and are receiving Title IV aid. Refunds for all other students will be calculated as follows:

- A. Refunds are allowed for the first 25% of the term. Beginning with the first official day of classes and extending through the first 14 calendar days of classes, there is a 75% refund. For the remaining days of this refund period, there is a 25% refund. *No refunds will be made beyond the 25% period.*
- B. 100% of the fees will be refunded for classes canceled by the institution.
- C. 100% of the fees will be refunded for "drops" or "withdrawals" prior to the beginning of the first official day of classes. No refund will be processed during the official registration period.
- D. 100% refund in case of student's death.

Refund policy for students receiving Title IV aid is subject to change by the Federal Government.

REGISTERING AFTER THE FIRST OFFICIAL DAY OF CLASSES

Students who register for a class after the first official day of classes need to be aware that enrollment in classes is not guaranteed but may depend on the number of classes missed and the instructor's assessment of the student's chances for success in the course. If you register late, you will need to meet with the instructor to discuss any work that has been missed and to complete and sign the form for **Late Class Entry: Student & Teacher Agreement to Make Up Missed Work**.

STUDENT LOAD

You will be considered full-time if you enroll in 12 or more credit hours; the maximum number of hours for which you may enroll is 19. You may request to enroll in more than 19 hours. *Request for Overload* forms are available from academic advisors or from the Office of Admissions & Records. You must obtain your advisor's signature on the form and meet specific requirements as outlined in the DSCC Catalog before an overload can be processed.

(It should be understood that the cost for transporting a student by ambulance to the hospital will be incurred by the injured or ill student.)

2. Tornado and Fire Alert

- A. Tornado Alert
 - a. Dyersburg Campus-In case of tornado alert, the alarm system will give a series of 10 short rings. Students should calmly file to interior hallways, away from windows and doors. One long ring sounds the all clear.
 - b. Gibson County and Tipton County Centers-When the National Weather Service issues a Tornado Warning, an air horn will be sounded in a series of short blasts. Ten short blasts require everyone to take immediate action

and proceed to the identified areas in the building. Two long blasts will indicate the Tornado Warning has expired.

DSCC participated in the Community College Survey of Student Engagement (CCSSE). The CCSSE report ranked DSCC notably above the average of institutions in our comparison group in many areas. We found that:

- Our students reported talking about career plans with an instructor or advisor more frequently.
- Our administrative personnel and offices were more helpful, considerate and flexible in working with students.
- Our students reported using academic advising/planning more often.
- Full-time students reported using the services to students with disabilities more frequently.
- Our students reported that academic advising/planning was more important to them.
- Full-time students reported that DSCC helped them cope with non-academic responsibilities.
- Our students reported using peer or other tutoring more often.
- Our students reported being more satisfied with the peer or other tutoring services.
