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

Medical Clinic

The Lauderdale County Commission on Aging has organized a free medical clinic to be held from 6:30 a.m. - 6 p.m., Saturday and Sunday, May 19th and 20th at Halls Junior High. This is the only scheduled visit to West Tennessee. The services will include dental (extractions, cleaning, and fillings), vision (including dispensary of glasses made on site), and mammographies. There are no charges (no insurance, no Medicaid) for any of these services. All services are free for all ages and no financial eligibility requirements. First come, first serve.

They plan for 25 dentists, five optometrists, 15 glasses makers, 10 registered nurses with volunteer student nurses from area nursing schools, and over 100 local volunteers.

Wendi Henry, Senior Center director, made application three years ago with Remote Area Medical (RAM). Henry's application was approved. As of March 9th, 2005, RAM has encountered 248,672 patients, given 54,350 glasses, extracted 73,406 teeth, and gave veterinary care to 59,851 ani-





Proclamation Signed



GOVERNOR PHIL BREDESEN, seated, signed a proclamation Monday declaring April 29th through May 5th as '811 Call Before You Dig' week across Tennessee to publicize the phone number people should call to help them avoid digging into buried utility lines. The federally mandated national "Call Before You Dig" phone number, 811, was created to help protect people from unintentionally hitting underground lines while working on digging projects. By calling 811 three days before digging, people can have the location of underground utility lines marked without charge and help prevent the undesired consequences of personal injury and property damage. 

The litter hotline is a statewide toll-free number citizens can call to report when they witness littering from vehicles.

Why do we have a litter hotline?

The hotline provides the opportunity for social responsibility and involvement by providing citizens with the ability to trigger action to improve the quality of the environment and the cleanliness of our roadways.

Do I need to give my name?

No. We do not ask for names or phone numbers of callers. All calls remain anonymous.

What information do I need to provide?

- License plate number of the vehicle
- Description of vehicle such as color, make, and model
- traveling, and nearest cross street, exit or mile marker
- Location or area of the vehicle from which the litter was released

What happens after I make a report to the litter hotline? TDOT will obtain the name and address of the registered owner of the vehicle. A friendly reminder letter along with educational information and a car litter bag or pocket ash tray will be mailed to them. Only Tennessee license tag numbers are obtained.

Will the litterer by sent a ticket based on a litter hotline report? No. Litterers who are reported through the litter hotline are not issued citations and the report does not go on their driving records.



Ordinance No. 07-05 - Town of Halls, Tennessee. An ordinance to establish an ethics standards for the Town of Halls, Tennessee, as required by public acts of Tennessee of 2006, 1st Extraordinary Session, Chapter 1, Section 49 (Tennessee Code Annotated Sections 8-17-101 to 8-17-106).

Ordinance No. 07-04 - Town of Halls, Tennessee An ordinance to establish hours for the sale of beer in the Town of Halls, Tennessee. Be it ordained by the Board of the Town of Halls, Tennessee.

Section 8-213 of the Code of the Town of Halls, Tennessee is hereby repealed effective upon the effective date of this ordinance, and is replaced with the following section:

8-213. Hours and days of sale regulated. It shall be unlawful and it is hereby declared to be a misdemeanor for any person, persons, firm, corporation, or association to sell or distribute any of beverages regulated under this Chapter within the corporate limits between the following hours:

- 1. Monday, Tuesday, Wednesday, Thursday Friday, and Saturday, each day from 3 a.m. -8 a.m.
- 2. Sunday at 3 a.m. 10 a.m. This ordinance shall become effective ten (10) days after final passage, the public welfare requiring it. 



Crude Celebrities

We've recently been treated to a spate of notables revealing their inner child by making unguarded comments. Don Imus managed to offend women, minorities, and moralists at the same time with his comments about the Rutgers University women's basketball team. Some people have said we should give Imus a break. But he's a pro, was speaking on his own talk radio and television program, and was merely illustrating a career-long pattern of low-life comments. So, when he lost his job I didn't feel too badly for him. Alec Baldwin is in another category - Dad goes ballistic with degrading comments aimed at his 11-year-old daughter. He's followed his angry tirade with mea culpas on Barbara Walters's program, The View, but who really believes the one time he was caught on tape is the one time he acted like a dead-beat Dad?

Comedian Michael Richards, famous for his portrayal of Kramer on the television hit, Seinfeld, apparently has an anger management problem, amply demonstrated in a comedy club gig when he shouted down hecklers, complete with racial slurs. Richards botched his "I'm sorry" attempt on Late Night with David Letterman. If he's not a racist, as he claimed, where did his incensed use of racist language originate? Richards tried to pass it off as an "Oops," but who believes him?

Mel Gibson got in the act with his drunken defamation of Jewish people. His public mea culpa was creative, in essence. saying "I'm not an anti-Semitic, just an alcoholic." So he hopes we'll overlook his behavior because he substituted an "acceptable sin" for an unacceptable one.

We're going to see and hear more celebrity crudity, and for that matter, "Joe Average" and "Jane Doe's" meltdowns, lack of manners, sexual peccadilloes, too. Because there's nowhere you can go anymore that's out of the reach of video and/or audio technology. Video recorders are posted in businesses and everywhere they go people carry cell phones with multi-faceted recording capacities. Add YouTube and MySpace to this and you can see how rapidly a few moments of crude words or actions can make you a star in a universe where you don't want to be. And worse, once your indiscretions hit cyberspace, they live forever.

The lesson here is not to avoid technology like a Luddite. The lesson is that one's character is on display every day in every way. Of course, Christians have always known this, for the Lord looks upon the heart. And if maybe Mom doesn't know everything after all, God does.

Deer And Farmers Have Coming To Understanding Meeting In **Henry County**

A very common sight these days along Tennessee s rural roadways is the sudden image of flickering bright white tails of deer as they spring across farm fences and the almost chorus line formation of large numbers of wild turkeys stopping traffic to cross roads as if they were in a parade. These sights are something that wildlife enthusiasts view as beauty and Tennessee s - farmers and property owners see as problems.

For several years now damage to field crops, home gardens, landscap ing, and farm livestock has continued to increase. The reported amounts of damage have varied across the board depending on who or what agency was doing the reporting.

A report compiled by the National Agricultural Statistics Service issued a few years ago, reported that crop and livestock losses from wildlife in the United States totaled over \$900 million. Much of that loss occurred in the area of field crops with deer being the number one violator.

The economics of predation management in agriculture and wildlife has been around a long time. 


Halls JH Learns Valuable Lessons

What is the litter hotline? The litter hotline is a statewide toll-free number citizens can call to report when they witness littering from vehicles.

What is the litter hotline number? 1-877-8LITTER

Why do we have a litter hotline? The hotline provides the opportunity for social responsibility and involvement by providing citizens with the ability to trigger action to improve the quality of the environment and the cleanliness of our roadways.

What information do I need to provide?

What happens after I make a report to the litter hotline? TDOT will obtain the name and address of the registered owner of the vehicle. A friendly reminder letter along with educational information and a car litter bag or pocket ash tray will be mailed to them. Only Tennessee license tag numbers are obtained.

Will the litterer by sent a ticket based on a litter hotline report? No. Litterers who are reported through the litter hotline are not issued citations and the report does not go on their driving records.

Confidentiality
