Yesteryear

Immigration and naturalization records are important to the family historian, but are often hard to find. Naturalization could be granted by any court of record, so we feel fortunate to have discovered six such records in our Courthouse in the long-stored loose papers.

On October 21, 1844, Ebenezer Renfrew declared that he arrived in the United States in 1836, and that he wanted to become a citizen. He renounced forever "all allegiance and fidelity to any foreign prince, potentate, state or sovereign whatever and particularly to the King or Queen of England, to the state or sovereignty of England & Scotland whereof I have heretofore been a citizen & subject."

1850. 

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Elon Baptist Church now sits in "downtown" Double Bridges a bit north of the intersection of Highway 88 and Double Bridges-Unionville Road. It was moved there in the early 1940's from a site a quarter mile north on Double Bridges-Unionville Road where Elon Cemetery is.

Yesteryear

In Biographical Sketches of Tennessee Baptist Ministers, Rev. Joseph H. Borum quotes from a December 11, 1875 article from Neal's State Gazette of Dyersburg that identifies Rev. Borum, himself, as the founder of Elon. In the same book he states that Elim was the only Baptist Church in Lauderdale County in 1848, so if he is accurate, Elon's founding could have taken place no earlier than that.

While Elon Baptist Church may well have been founded by Rev. Borum in 1848 or later, there is evidence that an Elon (or Ellen) Church existed in the neighborhood even before Rev. Borum became a minister in 1845.

From a case found in the loose papers at the Courthouse, we can assume that Elon/Ellen Church had been at an even earlier location than that on the site of the cemetery. In 1879 the nine children of John H. Eison, deceased, sued for division of their father's 250 acres in the Double Bridges community and a one-and- a- half-acre "school house lot" which, too small to be partitioned between so many, would need to be sold and the proceeds distributed (Susan R. McGuire et al vs Brooks Eison et al). The "school house lot" was described as:

Lying in the 8th civil district of Lauderdale County, Tennessee, it being the tract of land near the Double Bridges and bounded as follows: on the east and south by the lands of Rhett Eison, on the west by the Dyersburg & Ripley road [now Double Bridges-Unionville Road] and on the north by the lot on which Ellen Church now stands

[emphasis added] containing about one & a half acres and known as the School house lot.

The description conforms to the pre-1940's location of Elon Baptist Church, so an earlier location of Elon/Ellen Church had to be somewhere else. Also, in an account of the death of Evander Meeks around 1918, the Double Bridges correspondent to the Lauderdale County Enterprise reported that he was buried in old Elon Cemetery [emphasis added]. Again, there is the inference that another Elon Cemetery existed somewhere.

So where was the earlier location? P. T. Glass, the only man from this county to serve in the U.S. Congress, came to Lauderdale County in 1849. Some time in or before 1900, he read a paper before the Tennessee Historical Society about Henry Rutherford which he ended with these words "...he died May 20, 1847, at the age of eighty-five and was buried at Elon Church Cemetery."

Today we know Henry Rutherford's gravesite "Rutherford Cemetery," but there's ample evidence to indicate that Elon/Ellen Church once sat there.



Yesteryear

Hugh Dunlap, born in Londonderry, Ireland in 1769 married Virginia-born Susannah H. Gilliam in Knoxville on June 12, 1794. They had 15 children—all their names are inscribed on a grave stone in Old City Cemetery in Paris, Tennessee. The Dunlap children were quite accomplished; at least two of them were attorneys and served in the Tennessee legislature; one of them served in the U.S. Congress. One went to the Republic of Texas and served in the cabinet of President Mirabeau Lamar, and later became Texas' ambassador to the United States, and one of the Dunlap's granddaughters was the wife of James D. Porter, elected Tennessee governor in 1874.

The child that became most important to Lauderdale County history, however, was their eldest, Edith Ellis Dunlap, who is said to be the first school teacher in the county. She was the wife of Joseph Kenneley/Kenley.

Most Dunlap historians mark the movement of the Dunlap family from Knox County to Roane County to Henry County, omitting the sojourn of a few years of part of the family here in the Key Corner area which, before Lauderdale County was formed, was a part of Dyer County. Hugh Dunlap had bought an undivided part of the Martin Armstrong, Jr. Grant #27, and when the grant was partitioned, he got the 200 acres which lay just northeast of the Key Corner. It may not have been the best choice, however, for their life here was such a struggle that, according to Clark Doane, a descendant who lives in Germantown, one of the sons who lived in Henry County came for them and took them there. Dunlap gave his 200 acres at the Key Corner to his son-in-law, Joseph Kenneley, who, with his family, remained.

Part of the struggle may have been sickness, perhaps malaria. The grave stone in Paris which lists all the children of Hugh and Susannah Dunlap shows that two of them died in 1823. That would have been while the Dunlaps lived here. One of the deaths was that of 16-year-old Ellen who, the grave stone shows, died in the summer of 1823. Dr. J.G.M Ramsey, an intimate of the Dunlap family and a prominent Tennessee historian, says that Ellen was buried near the steps of the building that housed the neighborhood's school and church, and that afterward the church was known as "Ellen's Church."

This school/church sounds very much like that described by P. T. Glass in his address to the Tennessee Historical Society, "... The church is called Elon, and was at first used by all the orthodox denominations, and as a schoolhouse" and which he said was the gravesite of Henry Rutherford. That's the spot we call today "Rutherford Cemetery."
