Grant For Arnold Field Announced

A \$13,702 aeronautics grant has been approved for Arnold Field, located in Halls, according to Governor Phil Bredesen. "As communities continue to grow and thrive, it becomes increasingly important that our airports stay competitive and efficient at meeting the needs of travelers. Arnold Field is vital to this region's economy and travel system, and I'm please to support its continued growth," said Bredesen.

Funds from the grant will be used to make repairs to the west side of the runway. The grant is made available through the Tennessee Department of Transportation's Aeronautics Division.

Lauderdale County was fit to be tied when the residents of its northern 15 or 20 square miles set up their own election after the Lauderdale County sheriff had refused to do so as directed by the Legislature. Those who voted had unanimously approved breaking away from Lauderdale, and Dyer County named the area their 17th District with Double Bridges as the voting place.

Lauderdale County maintained the election was illegal and the voters guilty of mob rule. The Act, passed on March 20, 1877, they reminded, required that the county be surveyed to assure that it would not be reduced to less than 500 square miles, and they declared that no such survey had been done. So, they got an injunction against Dyer County and summoned Dyer's County Court, their justices, and John M. Nichols, the sheriff, to appear be-fore the Chancery Court at Ripley. (Lauderdale County et al vs Dyer County et al - 1878)

Dyer County maintained the Chancery Court of Lauderdale had no jurisdiction because the area was now a part of Dyer County. They said they believed the boundaries, both original and amended, were correct, and they denied that the only way to determine the area was by actual survey. They further declared that the sheriff's refusal to hold the election "when officially notified to do so was a thousand per centum more revolutionary than the voters' decision to call the election themselves."







Yesteryear

If Curve was atwitter in 1893 when the CO&SW Railroad moved the track around the town and the depot a half mile from its earliest location at the center of town, Halls had been in high dudgeon ten years earlier over the railroad's order that their trains no longer stop

On September 3, 1883, a number of Halls citizens filed suit in Chancery Court against CO&SW for their order; they were: H. R. Hall; S. J. Stephens; S. A. Jordon; W. C. English and his father, J. G. English; R. E. Stanfield; and T. E. Salisbury and his brother, Henry.

The men from Halls complained that when the railroad's agent went about trying to secure right-of-way, he had led the land owners to believe there would be a station established at Halls. Moreover, their published rate sheet listed Halls as a shipping point. On the strength of those implied promises Hall and several others had spent a good deal of money—Hall about \$2000, Stephens and Jordan several hundred dollars each—and still others had bought lots and built nineteen houses for stores and homes at considerable expense "with knowledge and encouragement of the railroad company."

H. R. Hall had laid out the town, and a railroad engineer had surveyed it with streets, avenues, and alleys, leaving a commons beside the railroad for its benefit and that of the public, and Hall had built several storehouses to rent out. W. D. English and his father, J. G., had built a steam saw mill about May 15, 1882, because of the promises of the general superintendent of construction, H. E. Huntington, to make a side track and switch. Dr. Hillhouse, chief engineer of the railroad, had even stepped off the distance and suggested the place to build the mill. So the railroad people were well aware of Halls' expectation for

Trains had begun running regularly about July 10, 1882, taking on and letting off passengers and freight at the new town, but about 3.0 acres. October 15, 1882, CO&SW ceased to permit its trains to stop at Halls for freight and passengers. This was soon after the railroad had made a contract with Dr. (D. M.) Henning and others that in exchange for Henning's building a depot "at a place called Gates about three miles from Halls" on the railroad line and "a competing point with Halls for the shipping and trade of the surrounding country," the railroad would abandon its plans for a station at Halls and no longer allow its trains to stop there. This action would greatly reduce any chance of Halls to

Drs. Henning and Jacob Wardlaw, who was Clerk & Master of the Chancery Court at the time of the suit, had bought the land Nancy Crockett of Williamson County, had inherited from her father, Joseph lot Crockett. The railroad—and Dr. Henning surely knew it—would go through this land on which Henning and Wardlaw would later establish Gates. Dr. Henning may have been a director of CO&SW, and, as such, would have had great influence with them, but leaving no stone unturned, he had named streets in Gates, and the town itself, for railroad people. Huntington and Hillhouse Streets in Gates bear names of the two CO&SW employees who advised the English father and son on the location of the mill in Halls.

H. R. Hall and his co-litigants were not neophytes at the political game, either, for they did not mention the name of Gates' co-owner, Jacob Wardlaw who, as Clerk & Master, would have had major influence with the Chancellor; they used and others instead.



Yesteryear

It is not the intention of Yesteryear to vilify the early railroad that came through Lauderdale County, but the tidbits of county history that appear in suits against them make the railroad a tempting target. A case in point is the case in Chancery Court in 1903 in which the trustees of Maplewood Cemetery sought an injunction against the Chicago, St. Louis and New Orleans Railway Company (CSL&NO) and the Illinois

Again, the case gives the history of the railroad. The bill of injunction says the railroad, which ran from Memphis to Louisville, Kentucky, was originally chartered as the Mississippi River Railroad Company by the Tennessee General Assembly in the session of 1857-8, and was completed in 1882 by the Chesapeake, Ohio and Southwestern Railroad Company which operated it until August or September of 1896. Then the CSL&NO bought it and leased it to the Illinois Central.

The case also gives some history of the cemeteries in Ripley. It says Rod Schuh. that shortly after Ripley was designated as the county seat and became

"a public grave yard was laid off on the Ripley-Fulton Road about four or five hundred yards from the Court House. It was used as a grave yard until about the year 1890 until it became so full of graves that there was no room to bury people therein and it became necessary for the citizens of Ripley and Lauderdale County to procure another grave yard."

On April 27, 1889, ten acres were bought about a mile south of the town and given the name of Maplewood Cemetery. It was fenced in, improvements were begun, and part of it was platted and laid off into Dist. 5, 1.5 acres. lots. Burials began there as early as 1890 and all concerned expected they would continue until the grave yard was filled.

Sometime in June of 1903, however, five of the trustees of Maple- Fisher, Dist. 2, lot. wood-A. H. Young, J. E. Palmer, J. Y. Barbee, A. J. Barbee, and W. G. Lynn-received notice that on June 20, 1903, the CSL&NO would file a petition in Circuit Court to condemn part of the grave yard for railroad purposes. Their right-of-way was 50 feet on each side of their track, but they were building a double track from Fulton, Kentucky, to Memphis and wanted a part of Maplewood. The trustees understood that they didn't want to put a track on the grave yard property, but wanted it only for fill because it would be cheaper to get dirt there than to haul it from somewhere else.

The trustees, of course, were incensed, and pointed out that the part of Maplewood the railroad wanted to condemn would ruin a large and valuable part of the cemetery, taking a number of valuable burial lots and the driveway across the east side of the property—the only driveway by which lot owners on that part of the cemetery could reach their lots. The railroad, they said, owned 35 acres less than a mile from the grave yard from which they could get all the dirt they wanted, or they could condemn the farm land on the east side of their track. There was 30.4 acres. no law, they continued, by which the railroad was authorized to "invade the sanctum of the dead in a public burying ground," and "surely no member of the General Assembly would ever introduce or have passed any such statute."

The trustees said that if they were mistaken about the railroad's wanting their property only for fill but wanted to put their railroad on it, they must protest all the more vigorously, because the railroad was already too close to the cemetery. When trains passed while a funeral was being conducted, horses frequently became frightened, and the minister often had to suspend the services until the train passed. For that reason they would never have chosen that location for a cemetery except that no other property was available near Ripley.

Apparently, the trustees had cooled down by July 9, for on that date they had a meeting (the five mentioned earlier were joined by J. N. Wardlaw and R. D. Jenkins) in which they agreed to sell to the railroad a 50-foot wide strip on the east side of the graveyard property for \$350. There were conditions, however: CSL&NO mustn't place their tracks within 45 feet of the new cemetery property line; they must build a right-of-way fence on the new line; and they must make no excavation or barrow pits on the 50-foot strip. The railroad agreed, and bought the

Insect Sting Allergy

Spring is upon us, and with Spring comes Mother Nature's blooming of trees and eruption of clover in the grass. Also, with Spring, comes the presence of insects. The most common allergic reactions come from stings from bees, wasps, and ants. The degree of allergy widely varies; however, most individuals experience only mild symptoms such as local itching and minor swelling.

The majority of stings cause discomfort resulting in local pain, some swelling and redness at the site of the sting, and itching. The severity of allergic reactions varies from person to person. Most reactions cause local swelling and itching. A severe reaction (Anaphylaxis) could be fatal. Anaphylaxis involves swelling of mouth and throat (airways), difficulty breathing, and a decrease in our blood pressure and heart rate.

Signs of Anaphylaxis:

- rash and intense itching in areas other than the sting site
- swelling of the face / eyes
- swelling of the lips
- difficulty breathing
- hoarseness
- dizziness or fainting


Severe reactions generally occur within minutes, but may occur up to 24 hours after the sting. If you experience symptoms of a severe reaction, this is a medical emergency, go to the nearest Emergency Department for treatment.

There are self-injectable devices (Epi-Pen) available for individuals with known severe reactions. See your physician regarding any allergic reactions and available treatments.


Be sure to wear shoes while walking in the grass. Be observant for bees and wasps.

Insects come with Spring and Summer, but we can enjoy the outdoors while taking safety precautions.




