- Have a professional check your home heating system both for energy efficiency and carbon monoxide. Buy a carbon monoxide detector for any nearby living spaces and affix it near the ceil-

- Never use a kerosene heater. If a space heater is needed, use only an enclosed heating element ganization, such as Underwriters

- Nearly half of a home's heat loss is through the roof. Make sure your attic has insulation with an R-value of at least 45.

- Weather strip windows and doors to maximize your heating

Outdoors: - Clean gutters of debris and fall leaves to prevent

ice build up that can back up under the roof line.

- Swimming pools should be drained to the manufacturers recommended water level and winterized with the recommended pH level and chlorine. Drain skimmer. heater filter, pump and piping. Disconnect and store any water slides or diving boards and secure the fence and gate around the pool.

- Be sure to close the interior shut-off valve of any exterior water faucets and then drain any remaining water from the exterior faucet itself. Disconnect any hoses and drain out any remaining water. Insulate exterior faucets and pipes to help prevent freezing.

Military Honors



MILITARY FUNERAL HONORS are available for every eligible veteran in Tennessee through the Tennessee Army National Guard's Honor Guard Program, a project begun in 2003 which has grown tremendously as more veterans and families have become aware of it.

Only about 300 services were performed annually when the Military Funeral Honors Program began five years ago. In 2008 officials expect there will be more than 6,000. A total of 22,600 services have been performed by Honor Guard team members since 2003.

Tennessee is projected to lose approximately 13,000 vet- **Observe xxx** erans a year. In order to meet the increasing demand for military funeral honors, the Guard has partnered with Veterans Service Organizations across the state to provide every eligible veteran with military burial ceremonies. They conduct workshops and training sessions for these groups in addition to briefings with community leaders, funeral homes and community VA officials.

Currently the program has over 140 National Guard soldiers, each of whom is trained to Arlington Cemetery's "Old Guard" standards. These tasks include flag folding, pall bearing, rifle volleys, flag presentation and sounding of Taps. 



Sorghum Toxic After Prost Hits

While the cool weather is usually good for grasses like tall fescue and orchard grass, a forage expert with the University of Tennessee Extension cautions livestock producers regarding sorghums after a

sorghum-sudan hybrids and johnsongrass can be toxic after a frost," said Dr. Gary Bates, professor of plant sciences and forage specialist with UT Extension. "Frost causes the release of prussic acid, or cyanide. Grazing sorghums that have been frosted has the potential to be deadly." Pearl Millet does not produce prussic

To minimize the potential Bates recommends these management practices. First, do not graze sorghums for two weeks after a non-killing frost and secondly, utilize sorghums as hay after a frost. Prussic acid usually dissipates in 7-10 days following a frost, but extra care should be taken to avoid potential poisoning. Making hay out of the forages will minimize the potential for poisoning.

IRS Checks For Local Residents Drug Raid

The Internal Revenue Service has 7,815 checks worth about \$5 million waiting for Tennesseans. Several Lauderdale County residents are included who can receive their check by just giving a corrected address.

The checks include Economic Stimulus Payments (ESPs) and regular tax refunds. Note, there is a deadline of November 28th to do a change of address for an ESP.

Below is a list of people from Lauderdale County. Once a year, the IRS is allowed to disclose these taxpayers' names in hopes of uniting them with their money.

If they have moved away, maybe someone might contact them and let them know they have money waiting. If they still live in the area, this will serve as a reminder to them to contact IRS with a good address so they can collect their money.

The Internal Revenue Service is looking for Tennessee taxpayers who are missing more than 5,800 economic stimulus checks totaling about \$3.3 million and nearly 2,000 regular refund checks totaling about \$1.7 million that were returned by the U.S. Postal Service due to mailing address errors.

Nationwide, more than 279,000 economic stimulus checks totaling about \$163 million and more than 104,000 regular refund checks totaling about \$103 million were returned to the IRS.

"Just a simple address update will allow the IRS to get this money into the hands of its owners," said IRS spokesman Dan

All a taxpayer has to do is update his or her address once. The IRS will then send out all checks due.

It is crucial that taxpayers who may be due a stimulus check rials. update their addresses with the IRS by Nov. 28, 2008. By law, economic stimulus checks must be sent out by Dec. 31st of this year. The undeliverable economic stimulus checks average \$583.

The "Where's My Stimulus Payment?" tool on IRS.gov is the quickest and easiest way for a taxpayer to check the status of a stimulus check and receive instructions on how to update his or her address. Taxpayers without internet access should call 1-866-234-

The regular refund checks that were returned to the IRS average \$884 in Tennessee. These checks are resent as soon as taxpayers update their address.

Taxpayers can update their addresses with the "Where's My Refund?" tool on IRS.gov. It enables taxpayers to check the status of their refunds. A taxpayer must submit his or her social security number, filing status and amount of refund shown on their 2007
