

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


Proclamation Signed

Grand Jury To Hear Bonds' Murder Case

In a General Sessions hearing Friday, brothers, Terry and Sequna Copeland, and Renard Webster, all of Ripley, were bound over to the Lauderdale County Grand Jury to consider criminal charges in the August 9th death of Brian Bonds, son of Haywood County Sheriff Melvin Bonds. The Copelands were charged with first degree murder and Webster, facilitation of first degree murder. The Affidavit of Complaint states that shots were fired into a vehicle on Highway 19, near the Lauderdale Middle School, occupied by Bonds and three other people with at least two rounds striking Bonds, resulting in his death. Witnesses identified the three men as being in a Dodge Ram maroon and tan truck.

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

HES Book Fall Book Fair Held



STUDENTS at Halls Elementary School participated in the fall book fair September 10th through 17th in the library. They shopped before school and during their library class time. Parents were able to come before school and on "Family Night", September 15th. Several contests related to the theme, Book Fair Safari, were held. Contest winners are pictured with their prizes.

The school collected over \$10,000, with part of the money paying Scholastic Books for the books and merchandise. The school's profit was \$2,743.40, which is money for the library. It will be spent on books, AR tests, audiovisual materials, and other items needed in the library. Last year two new computers were purchased with book fair profits. So far, 159 new Accelerated Reader tests were purchased and installed and over 350 new books.

NOTICE

The Town of Halls Board of Mayor and Alderman adopted the following ordinance at a regular meeting Monday, October 6, 2008:

ORDINANCE #08-06:

AN ORDINANCE TO PROHIBIT THE OPERATION OF HEAVY OR LARGE VEHICLES ON CITY STREETS.

WHEREAS, there are currently vehicles operating on certain streets within residential areas that due to either their size or weight create safety hazards, interfere with the comfort and well being of the public and may injure the surface and foundation of said streets

WHEREAS, the general safety and public welfare of the citizens of the town and the maintenance of an acceptable condition of municipal streets require that the size and weight of certain vehicles be prohibited on particular streets within the corporate limits.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT ORDAINED by the Board of Mayor and Alderman of the Town of Halls, Tennessee as follows:

Section 1. It shall be unlawful for any person to operate a motor vehicle, having a rated gross weight of more than 15,000 pounds over or upon any street, ally or thoroughfare within the corporate limits of the town unless the street, ally or thoroughfare is part of state or federal highway system.

Section 2. The following categories are exempt from the prohibition of this ordinance:

(a) The operation of heavy trucks upon any street where necessary to the conduct of business as a destination point within the town.

(b) The operation of heavy trucks owned or operated by the town, any contractor or material man, while under contract to the town.

(c)The operation of school buses and buses used to transport persons to and from a place of worship. (d)The operation of emergency vehicles upon any

street in the town. Section 3. Any violation of this ordinance shall be pun-

Section 4. All ordinances and resolutions in conflict herewith are to the extent of such conflict hereby re-

ishable by fine not to exceed fifty dollars (\$50).

Section 5. The ordinance will take effect 60 days from final passage, the public welfare requiring it
