Part I Margaret Voss Allen's Memories of Growing Up in Lauderdale County

Recently we saw an essay that Margaret Voss Allen wrote several years ago. It was so well written and so accurately descriptive of the life we rural children of the 1930's and '40's led, that we asked for her permission to share it with Yesteryear readers. Happily, she consented.

Margaret was the daughter of W. B. and Mabel (Furr) Voss; she and her late husband, Don Allen, lived in Alabama for their ages) got a red wagon, or fifty-two years until their retirement. They returned to their roots near Concord in 2002.

Growing up in Lauderdale County, Tennessee By Margaret Voss Allen

LAUDERDALE COUNTY. Most of you readers know where it is-bounded by Tipton, Haywood and Crockett Counties, and by the Hatchie, Mississippi, and Forked Deer Rivers. Mostly rural. I grew up there in the 1930's and 1940's. These are some of my recollections of a life so gentle compared to life anywhere today as to seem almost a dream.

My parents were farmers, like their parents and their parents and their parents and their parents who settled in Lauderdale County in the early 1800's when it was still part of Tipton County. My parents' farm was near Gates in the Concord community. Gates is right on old Highway 51 between Ripley and Halls. We had a cutesy chant back then about the names of the towns located on the Highway: "After leaving Ripley, we went Flippin round the Curve, thru the Gates, down the Halls, to Dyersburg." Of course, back then, precious few trips were ever made to any of those little towns. And to go all the way to Memphis! Well, that was something else. We did go to Memphis a few times—to the zoo and to the Fair. Occasionally Mother and Daddy would go there to see a sick relative, but we children rarely made such a trip. When we did, we would all look for the old HumKo building, our first landmark. Once we got that far, the excitement would really build for the sights we were going to see. They would also take us to Covington some years to see the Christmas lights and parades. I remember how BIG the old Coca-Cola Bottling Company building looked back then, decorated with all the Christmas lights.

Christmases at home were all excitement and anticipation. Daddy always went to the woods to cut the live cedar tree that had been spotted months before, usually by Mother. It was trimmed with mostly home-made decorations such as popcorn garlands and paper-ring garlands cut from brightly-colored composition paper. But no matter how little money, there were always strings of tinsel and a star at the top, and then Mother jump ropes, puzzles, skates to his three sons. Service Award Presented



MAJ. GEN. GUS L. HARGETT, JR., right, Lauderdale County native, is awarded the nation's highest peacetime award, the Distinguished Service Medal, "for exceptionally meritorious service in positions of great responsibility", by Lt. Gen. Thomas G. Miller, left, Commanding General, First U.S. Army, in a ceremony December 1st at Tennessee National Guard Headquarters in Nashville. Hargett plans to retire as Tennessee's 74th Adjutant General on December 31st.

Maj. Gen. Hargett was appointed to Tennessee's top military position in 2002 and reappointed by Governor Phil Bredesen in 2003. The Adjutant General is responsible for the supervision of the Military Department of Tennessee which includes the Army National Guard, the Air National Guard, the Tennessee Emergency Management Agency, and the Tennessee State Guard. The Military Department comprises more than 14,000 Soldiers, Airmen, and civilian employees.

The Distinguished Service Medal is awarded to any person who, while serving in any capacity with the United States Army, has distinguished himself by exceptionally meritorious service to the government in a duty of great responsibility. The criteria for the Distinguished Service Medal specifies that, "The performance must be such as to merit recognition for service which is clearly exceptional."

Maj. Gen. Hargett has served 47 years with the United States Army and Tennessee National Guard in various positions of increasing responsibility, culminating as the Adjutant General of Tennessee. Under his leadership the Tennessee National Guard faced the most challenging time in this nation's history, mobilizing nearly 20,000 Soldiers and Airmen in the Global War on Terrorism since September 11, 2001.

A portion of Maj. Gen. Hargett's citation for the Distinguished Service Medal reads; "Through his masterful balance of compassion and strength, Major General Hargett's decisions were always driven by the welfare of both the individual Soldier and the organization. His steadfast leadership and sincere concern for every Soldier and Airman in the Tennessee National Guard were evidenced in his every action. With an estimated 170,000 horses annually needing something done to take care

of their not being wanted any longer, what do you do with them? Some estimates put the number as high as 100,000 for horses abandoned in parks, on land of unknowing farmers and about anywhere they can be unloaded. Slaughter plants once took care of this problem, but the last three horse slaughter plants in this country were closed in 2008 due to legislation and over-the-top regulations supported by wellmeaning humane groups. The removal of 84 horses

recently from a Middle Tennessee farm due to charges of alleged animal cruelty has brought a lot of attention to this state of a problem that is larger than the scope of those 84 horses. Some have said "sanctuaries" are needed to assimilate these animals and even the animal rights movement groups acknowledge there are too few in operation to handle this number. Plus the care standards at existing facilities now in operation are not set by USDA, and are lower than those at dog and cat shelters, meaning that those horses will not live out their years in the most pleasant conditions. It is projected that a minimum of an additional 2,700 such "sanctuaries" will be needed with horse slaughtering being done completely away with in this country.

There are those who support doing away with any form of horse slaughter with intent to prevent cruelty. But, how humane is it to abandon them to starvation, predation and disease, which will happen if a person's out go exceeds his income while providing for a horse that no longer is as much fun as it use to be. Humane care comes in many ways and a lot of understanding must be taken to deal with the unwanted horse population in this country.


